#### A MESSAGE FROM FATHER CYRAIN:

Of all of the Christian feasts, the feast celebrated today is the greatest! Today is a day for great rejoicing and it is a day for joyful hope. Today we rejoice with Jesus who has been raised from the dead and today we are assured of the life that we all hope for, the life that will never end.

Yes, we ask for the grace to rejoice with Jesus. As St. Ignatius puts it in his Spiritual Exercises, we ask for the grace "to rejoice and be glad intensely at so great glory and joy of Christ our Lord," or to put it in other words, we beg for the gift of being able to enter into the joy and consolation of Jesus in the victory of his risen life. For the days of Holy Week, we have accompanied Jesus in his suffering and finally at his death on the cross. The mood of those days has been a somber mood. True, the events of Holy Week are events that took place in the past, but just as we can recall many past events with the emotions those past events continue to stir up in us, we can recall the events of Holy Week in the same way. But today is different! The rejoicing of today at the raising of Jesus from the dead is not just rejoicing of something past. Christ who has been raised from the dead is alive today! The tomb of Jesus is empty not because a body has been stolen but because Jesus is alive, fully alive!

We rejoice therefore with Jesus, but not only that. We joyfully celebrate our own hope that just as Jesus rose from the dead and now lives forever, we too will one day rise, and we too will live forever. That is a promise the Lord gives us, and the resurrection of Jesus is God's pledge that the promise will be fulfilled. That is why we can pray as we do in our Eucharistic celebrations that we can "wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior Jesus Christ."

Today, Easter Sunday, we renew the promises of our baptism, and we renew the faith we have received. With rejoicing and hope we profess that we believe in Jesus Christ who rose from the dead and we believe in the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting! Easter Sunday! What a great day for rejoicing and what a great day for strengthening our hope! Alleluia!



**Food Items**: Canned Tuna, Canned Chicken, Pasta, Canned Vegetables, Pasta Sauce, Soups or Broths, Canned Tomatoes, Macaroni & Cheese, Canned Fruit, Peanut Butter, Rice, Canned beans (black & kidney), Shelf-stable Milk, Instant oatmeal, and Pasta Sauce.

**Personal Items:** Toothpaste, Shampoo, Shaving items (razors and shaving cream), Body wash, Deodorant (men's/women's), Toothbrush, Body Lotion, Diapers (sizes 3, 4, 5 & 6) and Pull-ups (sizes 3T-4T).

ASSISTANCE TO OUR NEIGHBORS IN NEED: As a parish, we have opportunities to support those in our community who are in need, both through our prayers and our financial help. Saint Anthony Parish publishes the Haven's weekly list of needs in the bulletin and has collected food weekly for them. This parish project helps people year-round. We also have a fund that allows us to provide individuals and families financial assistance for emergency needs such as fuel, shelter, and other essentials. **REMINDER REGARDING OUR CEMETERIES:** Families are responsible for adhering to the following rules and regulations.

- All monuments, grave markers, planters and flower containers are the responsibility of the family.
- One monument is allowed per lot. All monuments shall be placed on foundations. Any corner markers are to be flush with the ground.
- Other structures including benches, fencing, curbs or cornerstones are not permitted on grave sites or along the boundaries of the cemetery.
- Flowers or bushes may not be planted directly in the ground; they must be in planters placed directly to the right and/or to the left of the monument. A hanging planter may be on a hook with the hook in the ground directly adjacent to the monument with the plant directly over the monument.
- Gravesites are to be kept free of dead or faded decorations. These are not to be disposed of on cemetery property. Cemetery personnel may remove items that are deemed outdated, broken, unsafe for maintenance operations, or otherwise not in keeping with the serenity of the grounds.
- All flowers and decorations are to be removed by October 31st for fall cleanup. New items may be placed after November 15th. All items are to be removed by April 15th for spring cleanup and new items may be placed after May 15th.
- Visiting times are during daylight hours, dawn to dusk. Loitering is not permitted.
- Water will be turned on by May 15th and shut off by October 31st, temperatures permitting.

# Easter Message

from Bishop Coyne



Bright is the silver, bright is the gold, under the light of the Easter candles. Each face alights before the holy candles, that Christians bear in hand.

his excerpt from the poem "The Day of Easter" draws its imagery from the ritual celebration of the Easter mysteries within the Orthodox faith tradition. It echoes our own liturgy as well at the Easter Vigil: At the start of the celebration, the community enters into the dark church, lead by the light of the Easter candle, carrying their own small candles of light as we hear intoned three times, "Christ our light!" It is the movement from the darkness of the tomb into the light of dawn, the rising of the Day Star, Christ Himself, the light of the world, conquering death by His own death on the cross and now rising from the grave. He is our light and our salvation, the dawn from on high which breaks upon us "to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace" (Lk 1:79).

Over the centuries, many poems have been written in addition to the beautiful prayers, songs, and rituals of the Easter celebration in both the Latin and Orthodox rites. Sometimes these poems are captured in the hymns we sing within the Easter season, sometimes they sit within a secondary canon of imagination and faith. Among many, I came across the poem excepted above from the pen of the Greek national

poet, Dionysios Solomos, and was intrigued by the poem not only because of its imagery from within the Orthodox tradition but because it is an unfinished poem. Indeed, all of Solomos' poems, save one which became the Greek national anthem, are unfinished. It's not clear why he never finished his poems. There is no reason from history left to consider.

Still it hasn't stopped me from considering (as I am want to do) in the unfinished nature of this poem this truth we share — that while the Easter event of Christ's resurrection in itself was a complete moment of salvation, the offer of salvation that flows from His life, death, and resurrection to all of creation and to each one of us is not yet complete. Salvation is both a "now" and a "not yet," offered to us now but not yet completed in time. Still as we stand in our churches this Easter morn in the glow of the light of the paschal candle, we know that "Christ is our light" who can lead us out of darkness into His wonderful light through the Easter sacraments: the rebirth of baptism, our anointing in the Holy Spirit, and our celebration of Eucharist. That is, if we will let Him do so.

May God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit bless this day!



#### From hole to whole

Accounts vary. Sometimes Easter dawns with helpful instruction-bearing angels and a palpable earthshaking. In other narratives it's almost a stealthy affair: a yawning open tomb, the shroud deserted, its meaning unclear. So too we experience the Easters of our lives in a variety of ways: fervent or undecided, joyful or indifferent or possibly even sorrowing. The empty tomb is an invitation to faith, an absence that can be filled any number of ways. We pray for each other this day, that what is empty in any of us may be filled with hope and trust.

SOLEMNITY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD (EASTER SUNDAY)

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; Victimae Paschali Laudes; John 20:1-9 or Matthew 28:1-10 (42, 41) or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13-35 (46). "There was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven . . . rolled back the stone, and sat upon it"

#### Monday, Apr 10, 2023

#### God brings all things to completion

Who doesn't sometimes get impatient with God's plan for them? Consider that the waiting can not only be useful but also beautiful. "Trust in the slow work of God," wrote Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (who died on this day in 1955). He would know—this French Jesuit priest was forced to leave his teaching post and withdraw controversial statements in 1925 and was further condemned by the church posthumously in 1962. Decades later, leading cardinals started to see his ideas differently—favorably—and so did Popes Benedict XVI and Francis. "It is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability," Chardin wrote—so, like him, accept "feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."

MONDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:14, 22-33; Matthew 28:8-15 (261). "And behold, Jesus met them on their way and greeted them."

#### Tuesday, Apr 11, 2023

#### Wage peace

One of the most significant pillars of Catholic social teaching turns 60 today: *Pacem in terris*—in English, "Peace on Earth"—the encyclical written by Pope John XXIII to address the menace of nuclear war and the need to uphold international human rights, including racial equality and women's rights. Significantly, it stands as the first encyclical addressed to both Catholics and non-Catholics alike, drawing worldwide admiration for the church's willingness to confront the social and economic costs of the Cold War. "The social progress, order, security, and peace of each country are necessarily connected with the social progress, order, security, and peace of all other countries," he wrote. Let peace begin with you today.

TUESDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:36-41; John 20:11-18 (262). "Mary went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord," and then reported what he had told her."

#### Wednesday, Apr 12, 2023

#### Leave the battlefield behind

Most people know that the Civil War, which began on this day in 1861, was largely an unjust war fought in defense of slavery in the Southern United States (then, for a time, the Confederate States of America). What many do not know is that the first skirmish of the war,

the Battle of Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina, was led in part by a Catholic, Confederate Brigadier General P. G. T. Beauregard, a Creole Catholic born and raised on a plantation in Louisiana. After the failures of the Confederacy in the war, Beauregard returned to civilian life in his home region, advocating for black civil rights (including voting), societal unity, and also became an admirer of Abraham Lincoln. May we model repentance in the face of our sins and work always for the common bonds of humanity.

WEDNESDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 3:1-10; Luke 24:13-35 (263). "While he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened."

#### Thursday, Apr 13, 2023

#### Accountability matters

When the risen Christ appears to his dumbfounded disciples, he reminds them "that repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached in his name." Even the church itself must repent sometimes. The Catholic Native Boarding School Accountability and Healing Project is such an undertaking. Few expect rapid change, but this group of religious, church officials, and laypeople have named a "sin" the church's role in the federal efforts to dismantle Native American culture through boarding schools. That's a start. Learn more on this topic so you can be part of the healing.

THURSDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 3:11-26; Luke 24:35-48 (264). "Then he said to them, 'Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts?"

#### Friday, Apr 14, 2023

#### Time for breakfast

Comedian Steven Wright may have been on to something when he quipped: "I went to a restaurant that serves 'breakfast at any time,' so I ordered French toast during the Renaissance." For Christians, who wouldn't choose a morning meal prepared by Jesus on the banks of the Sea of Tiberias? In one of the most memorable stories in the Gospel of John, the disciples are treated to just such an amazing repast. The risen Christ's tender care to ensure that the disciples have a good breakfast is both achingly sweet and altogether practical. He knew that to continue his mission, the disciple would need not only the warmth of his love but the strength and focus a hearty breakfast provides. Take care of your physical and spiritual health so that, you too, may be prepared to carry on Christ's loving mission each day.

FRIDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 4:1-12; John 21:1-14 (265). "Jesus said to them, 'Come, have breakfast.'"

#### Saturday, Apr 15, 2023

#### More than mere appearances

It turns out that Jesus appeared in different forms after his Resurrection. In John's gospel Mary of Magdala, arguably one of the Lord's closest friends, thought he was the gardener. In Luke's gospel two disciples invite him to their house for dinner and haven't a clue who he is. In today's gospel from Mark, we read that "he appeared in another form." Makes you wonder whether it might still be going on. Jesus did say that we engage him in the least of others. In what form will the risen Christ appear to you today?
