A MESSAGE FROM FATHER CYRAIN:

Last Sunday, we celebrated the feast of all feasts. Our Easter celebration was so great, the joy so intense, that for the longest time, the liturgical books nicknamed this Sunday, the first Sunday after Easter, "Low Sunday." This Sunday always paled next to the high celebration of Easter.

Soon after the turn of this millennium however, the late Pope John Paul II, inspired by the graces granted the Polish visionary, Sr. Faustina Kowalska, lifted "Low Sunday" to the height of Divine Mercy Sunday. Fittingly so. At the end of the Easter Octave, the full, eight-day liturgical celebration of Easter, the Church looks back at the Paschal Mystery, the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Lord, indeed all the events leading to this, and sums it all up in a grateful celebration of the Lord's divine mercy.

We live in a sinful world when the mercy of God is more necessary than ever before. Scripture says: "Where sin abounds, grace abounds all the more." So, there is an absolute, overwhelming abundance of grace that is available to us today because there is an overwhelming abundance of sin in the world today.

But that is not the only reason the devotion to the mercy of God is so necessary. It is necessary today, more than ever, because people don't believe in the mercy of God. They don't believe that God really loves them because they don't believe that they can be loved. So, the Lord comes to us, time and again.

We pray repeatedly, "Lord, have mercy." But before we utter this prayer, God is already showing us mercy. Looking back over the Easter celebration, let us be profoundly aware of that. As Pope Francis said in his Easter Message, "Renewed by God's mercy, let us become agents of his mercy, channels through which God can water the earth, protect all creation and make justice and peace flourish."


Saint Anthony Parish has long supported the Haven by collecting non-perishable food in the basket at the entrance to the church. Thank you for your contributions.

UPPER VALLEY BAROQUE PRESENTS MONTEVERDI'S "VESPERS": Upper Valley Baroque is thrilled to present Claudio Monteverdi's "Vespers", described as "a towering masterpiece of the early Baroque". UVB's professional chamber choir and orchestra will bring this dramatic and varied work to life at Saint Denis Catholic Church in Hanover on Saturday, April 29, 2023 at 7:00 pm (a few tickets are left for this performance) and the Chandler Center for the Arts in Randolph on Sunday, April 30 at 3:00 pm. (many tickets are left for this performance). Monteverdi's 1610 Vespers of the Blessed Virgin is one of the greatest Roman Catholic religious choral works of all time. With his Vespers, Monteverdi created the bridge from Late Renaissance music to Early Italian Baroque music. He placed the religious texts (5 Psalms, 5 other scriptural passages, religious poetry, and an incredible final Magnificat) at the center of his artistic creation. REMINDER REGARDING OUR CEMETERIES: Families are responsible for adhering to the following rules and regulations.

- All monuments, grave markers, planters and flower containers are the responsibility of the family.
- One monument is allowed per lot. All monuments shall be placed on foundations. Any corner markers are to be flush with the ground.
- Other structures including benches, fencing, curbs or cornerstones are not permitted on grave sites or along the boundaries of the cemetery.
- Flowers or bushes may not be planted directly in the ground; they must be in planters placed directly to the right and/or to the left of the monument. A hanging planter may be on a hook with the hook in the ground directly adjacent to the monument with the plant directly over the monument.
- Gravesites are to be kept free of dead or faded decorations. These are not to be disposed of on cemetery property. Cemetery personnel may remove items that are deemed outdated, broken, unsafe for maintenance operations, or otherwise not in keeping with the serenity of the grounds.
- All flowers and decorations are to be removed by October 31st for fall cleanup. New items may be placed after November 15th. All items are to be removed by April 15th for spring cleanup and new items may be placed after May 15th.
- Visiting times are during daylight hours, dawn to dusk. Loitering is not permitted.
- Water will be turned on by May 15th and shut off by October 31st, temperatures permitting.

Deacon RJ Dourney to be speaker at next Vermont Catholic Professionals Networking Breakfast

ne of the newest permanent deacons serving the Diocese of Burlington will be the guest speaker at the next meeting of Vermont Catholic Professionals, offering his thoughts on bringing Catholic values to the board room or the work place.

Deacon RJ Dourney, ordained last year, also will offer personal testimony to the power of Catholic networking.

"Over the past 30 years as an executive, I have encountered some of the most hostile, non-Christian environments and managed to remain true to my Catholic faith while succeeding in a business," said the seasoned entrepreneur and executive

who has successfully developed multiple companies throughout the United States, Europe, Central America and Asia including the development of more than 2,000 restaurants. "Though some doors have been closed to me through the years, many more have been opened by God as a result of following a few simple rules."

He will share these rules while also sharing the impact Catholic networking has had on his career and life. "Still today I benefit from the groundwork I laid through Catholic networking over 25 years ago

which has been a financial benefit and spiritual grace," he said.

A veteran CEO, the Deacon has served as a key executive of both public and privately held companies including Applebee's, Cosi, Chili's and The Upper Crust Pizzeria. He also is the founder of Hearthstone Associates, formerly one of the largest privately held restaurant companies in New England.

The founder of Fortis Advisors, Deacon Dourney and his team consult for real estate and senior living community developers, investment bankers, technology and restaurant companies, helping move their businesses to the next level.

He serves on the board of directors of public and private companies and is currently chairman of Zullee Mediterranean Grill and TOMS King, one of Burger King's largest franchisees.

"We must see the business world as the perfect platform to encourage others to walk towards our Lord Jesus Christ," he said. Deacon Dourney is a Distinguished Fellow at Catholic University where he serves on the board of advisors for the Ciocca Center School of Entrepreneurship.

He attended Villanova University where he studied business and economics. He regularly guest lectures at Harvard Business School, Boston College and Catholic University.

"Early in my career I realized I had a choice regarding living my faith. I could live our Catholic values at home, church and with friends and then be secular at work or I could be true to my faith at all times. I chose the latter," he said. "This has at times both alienated me and drawn me

closer to people at work. But regardless of how difficult it has been, I have never regretted being a follower of Christ at work and at home."

At work he has never hidden his faith, and as a result there have been numerous times when people in his work life wanted to talk about faith. They had lost their way, and when they saw how comfortable he was being Catholic they asked to talk with him. "Very often it has been as if others simply wanted someone else to walk through the door of being openly Catholic first and they

would follow," he said.

Deacon Dourney is in full-time ministry as a deacon, serving at St. Charles Church in Bellows Falls, Our Lady of the Valley Church in Townshend and Chapel of the Snows at Stratton Mountain. He also is engaged in prison ministry and supporting Deacon Phil Lawson as he leads the Diocese's evangelization and "Building Vibrant Parishes" work.


Join us for a 2.3 mile walk from St. Joseph, Isle

Put disappointments behind

Learn a lesson from the experience of the apostle we've come to know as "doubting Thomas." Insisting that our expectations be met is often the path to disillusionment and heartbreak. The way to peace is another route entirely. As Saint John Chrysostom taught, "So you want peace of heart? Then do not seek health, nor wealth, nor fame, nor power, nor luxury. Seek wisdom in God's sight, stick to the virtues, and nothing will be able to make you sad." Start by cultivating the seven big virtues: faith, hope, love, prudence, temperance, courage, and justice. And leave disappointment in the rearview mirror.

Reborn and renewed

Are Catholics "born again"? Yes, when we are baptized. In Baptism, we die with Christ, in that all sins are purified, and are reborn as children of God. Once done, it need not and cannot be repeated because by Baptism we are incorporated into Christ, configured to Christ, and sealed forever with the "indelible spiritual mark" of belonging to Christ. Catholics can, however, renew baptismal vows—and often do at Mass, especially during the Easter season, including the Easter Vigil Mass. Cherish this opportunity to restate your promises, profess your faith, and strengthen your commitment to Christ and church once again.

destructive pattern. God created us free and longs to see us free. Whatever fetters might have you tied down or wrestling in the dark at the moment, know that you can turn to God for release. Liberation is what God loves to bring!
