A MESSAGE FROM FATHER CYRAIN:

As Christians we view life as a pilgrimage to the house of the Father. And Jesus in our gospel passage today reminds us that it is a journey home, and ultimately, God is our home. We belong to Him and will only be truly home when we are with Him.

Access to this home is not a walk in the park, however. It is marked by pit stops and detours. It is seldom a straight and smooth path. Our sinful pursuits fool us into believing that we can find home elsewhere. Because of this, we lose our way as Thomas articulates it: "Lord, we do not know the way."

If we feel lost, not knowing which path to take, overwhelmed by the many voices of the world calling us to different directions, then we should find comfort in Jesus who is the Way. If we walk His path, He will lead us home.

If we feel confused, unsure of what to believe in, especially in a world where fake news and so-called alternative facts are being strategically peddled, we find assurance in Jesus who is the Truth.

If we feel tired and weary, drained by the culture of death that pervades our society, we should find strength in Jesus who is the Life. We should be nourished by His presence.

Jesus, the Way, the Truth, and the Life, has promised to bring us home and assures us: "I will come back and take you to myself, so that where I am, you also maybe." The question however is: "Do we want to go home?"

Like St. Augustine perchance we need to lay bare: "You have made us for yourself Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you!!!



REMINDER REGARDING OUR CEMETERIES: Families are responsible for adhering to the following rules and regulations.

- All monuments, grave markers, planters and flower containers are the responsibility of the family.
- One monument is allowed per lot. All monuments shall be placed on foundations. Any corner markers are to be flush with the ground.
- Other structures including benches, fencing, curbs or cornerstones are not permitted on grave sites or along the boundaries of the cemetery.
- Flowers or bushes may not be planted directly in the ground; they must be in planters placed directly to the right and/or to the left of the monument. A hanging planter may be on a hook with the hook in the ground directly adjacent to the monument with the plant directly over the monument.
- Gravesites are to be kept free of dead or faded decorations. These are not to be disposed of on cemetery property. Cemetery personnel may remove items that are deemed outdated, broken, unsafe for maintenance operations, or otherwise not in keeping with the serenity of the grounds.
- All flowers and decorations are to be removed by October 31st for fall cleanup. New items may be placed after November 15th. All items are to be removed by April 15th for spring cleanup and new items may be placed after May 15th.
- Visiting times are during daylight hours, dawn to dusk. Loitering is not permitted.
- Water will be turned on by May 15th and shut off by October 31st, temperatures permitting.

Eucharistic Adoration & The Mass

s I'm reading the Eucharistic Testimonies that are coming in from around the Diocese, I'm continually struck by and grateful for the impact that both the Mass and Eucharistic Adoration have had on the lives of many Catholics. Today, I want to highlight the important relationship between the Mass and Eucharistic Adoration — whether that adoration happens in



front of a closed tabernacle or during Eucharistic Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance.

To be clear, the Church speaks of the preeminence of the celebration of Mass over all other activities in which the Church engages, including Eucharistic Adoration:

The celebration of the Eucharist is the center of the entire Christian life. ... 'The other sacraments, all the ministries of the Church, and the works of the apostolate are united with the eucharist and are directed toward it. For the holy eucharist contains the entire spiritual treasure of the Church, that is, Christ himself. ...'

— Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside of Mass (HCOM), 1.

Speaking specifically of the worship outside of Mass that one offers to Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, the Church says that "the celebration of the eucharist in the sacrifice of the Mass ... is truly the origin and the goal of the worship which is shown to the eucharist outside of Mass" (HCOM, 2). In other words, the worship that we offer in Adoration outside of Mass both flows from and returns to the celebration of Mass.

How, then, does our time in Adoration flow from the Mass? Simply put, our personal prayer in Adoration is an extension of our personal prayer that we offer at Mass. Indeed, in the Mass, we offer our "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving" in union

with the Sacrifice of Christ who offers Himself in a sacramental way back to God the Father. Our prayers and petitions are offered on the altar and are taken up into Christ's very prayer to God the Father. That our prayer — our "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving" — can be continually offered in the presence of Christ in the Eucharist in Adoration outside of Mass is truly a gift. I use the image of the

votive candle that is lit at Mass which symbolizes our prayers continuing even though the Mass may have ended and we leave the Church. In a sense, those attending Adoration become the candle; their prayer becomes an extension of the prayers offered at Mass. In this way, our prayers in Eucharistic Adoration can never be seen as separate from what we do at Mass; our prayer at Adoration flows from our prayer at Mass.

How does our time in Adoration return us to the Mass? Adoration always points us back to the Mass because it is in the Mass that our prayers become most effective and it is in the Mass that we find sacramental union with God. It is true that Adoration allows us to pray in the presence of Christ in which we feel spiritually united to God, but Adoration should cause us to hunger for more — for sacramental communion with God. At Mass, not only do we pray in the presence of Christ, but our prayers are joined to the prayer and Sacrifice of Christ. In that joining, we find that full spiritual and sacramental communion which is expressed by receiving communion.

Let us always be mindful, then, that our prayer of Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament is an extension of what we are called to do at Mass and should always leave us yearning for that spiritual and sacramental union that only the miracle of the Mass can offer us.

5-Day Silent Retreat • St. Anne's Shrine, Isle La Motte

Retreat begins Sunday, June 11 at 7 pm and concludes Friday, June 16 at 1 pm.

The Society of St. Edmund will be conducting a 5-Day Directed Retreat in the Ignatian tradition. Using principles from the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola, retreatants are invited

to contemplate scripture passages in a silent environment, celebrate daily Eucharist and meet with a Spiritual Director each day. Spiritual Directors are specifically trained for this type of retreat and will serve as companions

Appointed to the task

We see them in some of our parishes standing near the presider at Mass: men dressed sort of like priests but with a diagonal or odd-looking stole. What are deacons for, we may wonder? Deacons assist priests in visiting the sick and provide service in the parish community. They can preach, witness marriages, perform Baptisms, and preside at funeral services outside of Mass. While they're ordained clergy, they may also be married and serve without pay. The permanent diaconate is a special call for those "filled with the Spirit and wisdom." Sanctity can't be rushed

Of the approximately 10,000 canonized saints, there are only 11 from the United States, and only three of those were U.S.-born. Of course, part of the reason is that the United States is a relatively young country. Give it time, Blessed Teresa Demjanovich would likely say, because she believed her calling was to remind everyone that they are called, regardless of vocation, to be a saint. Born in New Jersey in 1901, Demjanovich is one of a growing list of American candidates for sainthood and the first to be beatified on American soil. She was a Sister of Charity for only two years before dying at the age of 26. Take to heart her message that everyone is called to a life of holiness and aspire to join her on that list.

Advantage from adversity

On this day in 328, 30-year-old Saint Athanasius was elected the new bishop of Alexandria. If that seems young, it was. Even though he helped win the day at the Council of Nicea—taking on Arius and others who denied Christ's full divinity—his elevation as bishop instigated years of struggle with political and ecclesial foes. At issue: Athanasius' stubborn refusal to water down anything in the Nicene Creed. Thus, in the 45 years Athanasius served as bishop, he was exiled a total of five times, 17 years in all. May Athanasius provide a lesson for us all about turning adversity into advantage. While in exile, he did much writing—including a definitive biography of Saint Anthony that would influence other future saints, including Augustine.

A mighty pen

On this day in 1990 the famed Southern writer Walker Percy died, one of the clarion voices of reason in the troubled climate of his day. He lived through Jim Crow, being born near the height of it, and wrote with the power of his deep Catholic faith to issues of the day. A graduate of medical school, Percy would in the end become

one who probed minds and hearts with the pen—including his own. He famously said, "A fine writer's thoughtful analysis of his own trials and errors is valuable indeed." May we emulate his admirable introspection.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 15:1-6; John 15:1-8 (287). "Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing."

Rejoice and be glad!

Doesn't everyone seek a bit of joy? Jesus tells his disciples, "Remain in my love ... so that ... your joy may be complete." Our tradition uplifts those who are joyful even amid setbacks. The concept of the Paschal Mystery points to resurrection—joy—hidden in even the darkest times. Pope Francis often encourages church leaders to show some joy, and he reminds the faithful that God "created us because he wants us to be happy." Jesus' first miracle enabled wedding guests to drink wine and celebrate. Does your faith in God bring you joy? Let others see it.

Here's to good friends

Saint Teresa of Ávila had a deep understanding of the value of friendship, not only with God but with one another. "What a great favor God does to those he places in the company of good people," she wisely wrote. Negative people can actually affect your well-being on every level: spiritually, mentally, emotionally and physically. Numerous studies conclude that surrounding yourself with good people boosts self-esteem, helps you bear stress and grief more effectively, encourages healthy behavior, and increases your chances for a longer and happier life. Your time is a valuable—and limited—resource. Surround yourself with friends and associates who will do you good. Then return the favor.

Holy East and West

When's the last time you called a priest "Swami" instead of "Father"? If the priest was today's commemorative, Benedictine Father Bede Griffiths, you would be correct using the title. Griffiths (1906-93), a British-born priest, was sent to India in 1955 to establish a Benedictine monastery. There he studied Indian spirituality and incorporated into the monastery cultural elements of a Hindu ashram. He became known to his congregants as Swami Dayananda, a name that means "bliss of compassion." Watch a three-minute trailer of the film documentary of Father Bede's life and teaching, *A Human Search*.
