A MESSAGE FROM FATHER CYRAIN:

The gospel episode of Peter walking on the water, and sinking after a while, contains two important lessons for us. The first concerns Peter's faith. It was still a weak faith, but it was nevertheless genuine. It enabled him to step out of the boat in the middle of the sea and despite the huge waves, to walk on the water. Surely it shows an important truth: that with a modicum of faith, we can achieve extraordinary results.

The second lesson is - Peter started to sink because he took his eyes off Jesus and focused on the rough sea. His faith wavered when he realized what he was doing. We may not walk on water, but we do walk through tough situations. If we focus on the waves of difficult circumstances around us without looking to Christ for help, we too may despair and sink.

Life is a perilous journey, and we need the help of Christ to guide us. Peter's mistake was that he turned to Christ in real prayer only in moment of crisis and in danger of drowning. When all is going well, like Peter, we rely on our own strength and when everything else fails, prayer is the last resort.

If we leave our relative security behind and follow Christ with conviction, we will never be casualties of any storm or rough sea.

ne of the most fascinating classes I had in graduate school was a course on the Eucharist. As we explored various Eucharistic prayers, it quickly became apparent that the prayer is meant to be understood as a unified whole, and our understanding of the Eucharist is diminished if we focus on only one or another part of the prayer.

I remember my professor posing this question: "How often do we pull out the Institution Narrative (the Consecration) as the most important part of the Eucharist Prayer? How often is the Consecration the point of focus so much so that it is separated from the rest of the prayer so that the rest of the prayer becomes a mumble of words?"

This really got me thinking, because I had thought of the Consecration as the moment in Mass. Understanding the fullness of the Eucharist Prayer, though, helps me set the Consecration in the proper context. Indeed, without the Consecration, the Eucharistic Prayer loses its meaning, but without the rest of the Eucharist Prayer, the Consecration loses its purpose.

The Eucharistic Prayer is an example of God's superabundant graces given to us. It is miracle enough to have the Real Presence of the Christ through the Consecration. It would be enough to have the Consecration at Mass because we could still talk about the Real Presence, and we could still receive the sacramental presence of Christ at communion. But without the rest of the Eucharistic Prayer — specifically — without the few lines that are spoken immediately after the Consecration, the

Real Presence of Christ simply remains on our altars.

That is miracle enough, but God desires — and does — more. Only in embracing the fullness of the Eucharistic Prayer do we understand that the Church — as the Mystical Body of Christ — does something with the Real Presence of Christ. In remembering the events of the Paschal Mystery — the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ — the Church offers that very presence of Christ back to God, the Father.

In calling to mind the events of the Paschal Mystery, we bring those same events to the present moment, and the Mystical Body of Christ offers all this, brought into the present moment in this particular Eucharistic celebration, to the Father. Here we have offering and sacrifice, and we begin to realize the Sacrifice of the Mass. Listen carefully, or you might miss it: "Therefore, O Lord, as we celebrate the memorial of the saving Passion of your son, His wondrous resurrection, and ascension into heaven, and as we look forward to His second coming, we offer you in thanksgiving this holy and living sacrifice" (Eucharistic Prayer III).

This is but one example of how the complete Eucharistic Prayer, taken as a single whole, offers a more complete picture of what happens at Mass.

May we more fervently join in the entire Eucharistic Prayer with our hearts and minds, remembering that through this prayer, the mission of the Church is accomplished.



Holiness becomes you

Maximilian Kolbe is best known for the manner of his death—he volunteered to die in the place of a stranger, who was a man with children, at Auschwitz during World War II. But his path to sainthood began at the age of 10 when his exasperated mother said to her troublemaker son, "I do not know what will become of you!" The Blessed Mother stepped in with a couple options—appearing to the boy in a vision and offering him purity or martyrdom. He gave her the surprising answer: "I choose both." Remarkable conversion, however unlikely, is possible—in others and yourself. Believe it!

Without a doubt, love reigns

Thanks to Thomas the Apostle—that so-called "Doubting Thomas"—Catholic tradition has its earliest account of Mary's Assumption. This tradition holds that, just as Thomas was elsewhere when the other apostles were visited by a resurrected Jesus, he'd likewise been away when Mary, surrounded by the apostles, drew her last earthly breath. As Thomas returned to Jerusalem, three days after Mary's burial, it is said that he saw her gloriously lifted into the heavens. This time, it was the other apostles' turn to doubt Thomas. With great skepticism, tradition tells us, they opened her tomb and found it empty. Pope John Paul II, quoting Saint Francis de Sales, insisted that Mary died "in love, from love, and through love." Love like Mary today.

Infectious faith

An oft-forgotten holy figure, Saint Roch died on this day in the 14th-century Holy Roman Empire, having lived a distinctive life from his birth. He is traditionally regarded as having been conceived by a miracle and later became an ascetic said to have

worked miracles. The patron saint of dogs, he is said to have been healed from the plague by a dog that brought him bread while he was recovering. He modeled for the world a divine confidence in the face of pestilence, which inspired great faith in God among his peers. Having survived a pandemic ourselves, will we trust God with our future as Saint Roch did?

Harvest is plenty

Farmers and home gardeners are often busy in mid-August if their crops have done well. It is a time of intense work: harvesting, processing, selling, canning. The spiritual parallel is often made: Our missionary impulse is to plant the seeds of faith in word and action, in hopes that the seeds bear fruit. When times seem difficult, it is heartening to look around for signs of fruit, of God's love made manifest. Take a moment to revel in the witness of a Christian you know who makes God's love visible.

At its height in the 1930s, 65 percent of the U.S. population went to the movies weekly. "Going to the movies" may now simply mean clicking on a streaming app, but watching films remains a popular weekend pastime. Over the years the Vatican has recognized film as a valuable art form deserving of "praise and support." With that in mind, in 1995, in honor of the 100th anniversary of cinema, the Vatican named 45 important films worthy of watching. Make your way through this fascinating list on a given weekend, and enjoy a guilty pleasure, without the guilt.
