A MESSAGE FROM FATHER CYRAIN:

In today's feast of the Epiphany, the Church reminds us that the redemptive mission of Jesus is for all, not just for a select few. Born a stranger in Bethlehem, he is at home everywhere. Christianity has no nationality because it belongs to all nations. The Magi or wise men were the first to give witness to Christ's universal appeal.

As Christmas draws to a close, with faded hollies and sagging poinsettias, the Epiphany also reminds us of our journey into another year. Life is a pilgrimage, but we need not necessarily travel alone, fumbling in darkness in search of our destination. The Epiphany story concerns the wider world and the many varying circumstances of joy and sorrow in which we encounter Christ. He comes in people and places we least expect and at times when we are most unprepared for his company.

Nothing is ever the same again for those who have discovered his star and his light. The gospel of love and forgiveness is not something to keep quiet about, but Good News to announce to the world.

HAPPY NEW YEAR! January traditionally is a time when many of us to resolve to eat better and lose weight. But the New Year is also the perfect time to make some spiritual resolutions. Some possible resolutions could be to attend a weekday Mass, pray the rosary daily, or give up meat on Fridays.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY IS JANUARY 6TH: The Epiphany marks the arrival of visitors, identified in Scripture as the magi, to the place where Jesus was born. Although we know virtually nothing about them, we do know they brought three gifts:

- 1. Gold a symbol of wealth and power, identifies the recipient as a king.
- 2. Frankincense the crystalized resinous sap of a tree used as incense and as an offering, is symbolic of prayer.
- 3. Myrrh another resinous tree sap, was used in healing liniments and as an embalming ointment. Myrrh is an odd gift for a child—so, even at the beginning of Jesus' life on earth, this gift foreshadows his death.

May the wisdom of the Magi guide you to your own light.

anniversaries on the following Sunday, Feb. 11, with their parish priest.



Preparation of the Gifts

\pre-pə-'rā-shən |
'gifts\

The set of ceremonial actions at Mass preceding the Eucharistic Prayer and Holy Communion. Includes dressing of the altar; bringing forward the bread and wine; and the community's personal sacrifices taken up in the collection. Formerly called the Offertory. The community offers a song of praise for all these gifts as the priest washes his hands in a purification rite.

CONTEXT

The **Preparation of the Gifts** allows time for the preparation of our hearts. Like the Magi bearing gifts and doing homage to Majesty, we bring our gifts and our praise to the Table.

God has first blessed us with the gift of creation. Humans take those gifts given, wheat and grapes, and, using our creativity, make bread and wine. Then, we bring those gifts we have received and labored over to present them at the Altar/Table that they might be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. Finally, we receive them back in Communion. The procession of the **Gifts** says, in essence, "Behold the gifts God has given us!"

WHY IT MATTERS

We take great care preparing other festive tables for our most cherished gatherings. Could we do less for the table where the Real Presence of Christ will be made tangible for us?

From the General Instructions of the Roman Missal: The altar or Lord's table, which is the center of the whole Liturgy of the Eucharist, is made ready.... The offerings are then brought forward. It is a praiseworthy practice for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful (73).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Is Epiphany about giving or getting gifts?

"We three kings of Orient are/ bearing gifts we traverse afar." Nowhere in the gospels does it claim there are three kings. They are magi, hereditary priests of the ancient Medes and Persians. At least the carol gets one thing right: this wise group does bear gifts. Gold symbolizes wealth and power. Frankincense, used in prayer, represents the divine Presence. Myrrh prepares bodies for burial. It's an ominous sign that would make a startling gift. . . . But they were appropriate honors for the King of the Universe, the Divine Son, and the crucified Lord.

We also bear Jesus gifts at every Eucharist: bread, wine, and our financial sacrifice. "Made by human hands," these gifts are transformed and returned to us as the Body and Blood of Christ, and then redistributed for those in need.

More gifts come to us by way of this shared Table. Grace pours out on the assembly. Grace forgives sin, and rescues us from every evil. This is one gift you don't want to put at the bottom of a closet.
