
To Cathy Day, to her team of kitchen angels, and to everyone who made monetary

### Saint John Neumann

Feast day January 5

As a boy, John Neumann lived in Bohemia, which is now part of Czech Republic. He studied hard, for he wanted to be a missionary priest in America. By the time he was twenty-four, he had learned six languages and had completed his studies for the priesthood. He was not ordained,

however, because his bishop thought there were

enough priests in his country. So John Neumann decided to leave for America, hoping to be ordained there. He said goodbye to his parents and brother and sailed for the United States. When he arrived, he had one suit of clothes and one dollar in his pocket. Three weeks later, the bishop of New York ordained him.

Father John's first work was with the German-speaking people in mission parishes near Buffalo, New York. He was not considered very handsome, and some people disliked him and his ways. Priests at that time traveled on horseback and went long distances to care for people in neighboring towns and villages. People laughed at the clumsy way Father John rode. Because he was short, his feet did not reach the stirrups. Children made fun of him. John remained silent, however, and continued going about teaching religion, visiting the sick, and training teachers.

Father John felt the need for community life, so he entered the Redemptorist Order. He was the first Redemptorist to make vows in the United States. He became the superior of the American branch of the order. When Father John was forty-one years old, he became the fourth bishop of Philadelphia. Still, some people did not welcome him. They did not care for his accent and his plain style. Besides these people, John had to deal with an anti-Catholic group that was burning convents and schools. Because John felt he wasn't capable of doing his job, he asked for a smaller diocese, but he was told to stay.

John started Catholic schools in his diocese, for he believed it was very important for children to be educated and taught the ways of Jesus. In eight years Philadelphia's two Catholic schools grew to one hundred schools. John brought many teaching orders to his diocese. He published two catechisms and many articles.

Bishop John Neumann died of a heart attack while he was walking down the street.

Throughout his life, John Neumann went about his work quietly and humbly. No special honors were given him. He was even unpopular. Only after his death did people begin to talk about their humble, good bishop who worked so hard for God

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### St Elizabeth Ann Seton


St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (28 August 1774 in New York City – 4 January 1821) was the first United States-born canonized Saint in the Roman Catholic Church. She was the foundress of the Sisters of Charity of Saint Joseph, the first community of religious women founded in the United States. Her establishment of Saint Joseph's Academy and Free School for girls paved the way for the parochial school system in the United States later in the nineteenth century.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was born into a prominent Episcopalian family in New York City, August 28, 1774, the second of three daughters of Dr. Richard Bayley and Catherine Charlton Bayley. Catherine Bayley's father was Dr. Richard Charlton, rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church on Staten Island. Dr. Bayley was a physician and professor of medicine (anatomy) at King's College (now known as Columbia University).

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton came from a Protestant background, converted to Roman Catholicism, and was a co-worker with John Carroll in the formative years of the Catholic Church in the new nation of the United States. She was one of the most influential Catholic women in the early nineteenth century; her legacy and influence continues in the twenty-first century.

Elizabeth married William Magee Seton, scion of a wealthy New York mercantile family with international connections, January 25, 1794, at the home of her sister, Mary Bayley Post. Five children were born between 1795 and 1802, Anna Maria, William, Richard, Catherine, and Rebecca. As a young society matron, Elizabeth enjoyed a full life of loving service to her

family, care for the indigent poor, and religious development in her Episcopal faith, nurtured by the preaching and guidance of Rev. John Henry Hobart, an assistant at Trinity Church. She and her sister-in-law, Rebecca Mary Seton, became known as the "Protestant Sisters of Charity."



As the eighteenth century drew to a close, a double tragedy visited Elizabeth. Political and economic turmoil took a severe toll on William Seton's business and on his health. He became increasingly debilitated by the family affliction, tuberculosis. Hoping to arrest the disease, Elizabeth, William, and Anna Maria embarked on a voyage to Italy. On their arrival in Leghorn (Livorno), they were placed in quarantine; soon after, December 27, 1803, William died. At age twenty-nine, Elizabeth had become a widow with five children.

For the first time Elizabeth experienced Roman Catholic piety in her social equals. She was deeply impressed, especially, by the doctrine of the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. She returned to New York in June 1804, full of faith turned to religious conflict when the Setons heard of her inclinations.

After almost a year of searching, she made her profession of faith as a Roman Catholic in March 1805, a choice which triggered three years of financial struggle and social discrimination. To support her children, she opened a school in New York City. The good reputation of the school resulted in an invitation of several priests of the Society of Saint Sulpice to open a school for girls next to Saint Mary's Seminary. In June, 1808 she moved with her family to Baltimore to open the school.

During her years in Emmitsburg, Elizabeth suffered the loss of two of her daughters to tuberculosis, Anna Maria in 1812 and Rebecca in 1816. By that time, she herself was weak from the effects of the disease. She spent the last years of her life directing St. Joseph's Academy and her growing community. She died of tuberculosis January 4, 1821, at the age of forty-six.

### Vermont Catholic Professionals to meet on Wednesday, January 19

“Perfection of the life or of the work?” will be the topic of the next keynote speaker at the Vermont Catholic Professionals networking meeting.

The speaker, Laurie Brands Gagne, is the retired director of the Edmundite Center for Peace and Justice at St. Michael’s College in Colchester.

Her presentation will be on Jan. 19.

The title comes from a poem by William Butler Yeats entitled “The Choice.”

“I’ll be talking about the importance of that choice and what it means to integrate one’s work-life with one’s whole life as a Christian,” said Gagne, of South Burlington, who worships with the St. Michael’s College community.

Gagne received her doctorate in systematic theology from the University of Notre Dame and taught religious studies for many years at Trinity College of Vermont. While at Trinity, she wrote *The Uses of Darkness: Women’s Underworld Journeys Ancient and Modern*, which was published by University of Notre Dame Press (2000) as well as a number of articles on philosopher/mystic Simone Weil and the spiritual journey.

When Trinity closed in 2001, she began a new phase of her career teaching “Peace and Justice” at St. Michael’s College.

Outside the classroom, Gagne was an activist, beginning a nationwide campaign on behalf of Congolese women in 2010 and helping to found the Vermont Ibutwa Initiative, a non-profit that assisted women who are survivors of rape in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Now retired, she has edited a book on Simone Weil (“Love in the Void”), serves on Burlington’s Mater Christi School Board of Trustees and gives workshops for the Catholic Nonviolence Initiative.

Continuing her activism, she served as a member of Meta Peace Team, an unarmed force for civilian protection, for a

month in Palestine in 2018 and conducted a fact-finding trip to Ibutwa’s projects in South Kivu, DRC in 2019.

Among her awards, Gagne received from Trinity College in Burlington the Sister Katherine O’Donnell Outstanding Faculty Award (1988) and from St. Michael’s, the Vermont Campus Compact Award for Excellence in Community-Based Teaching (2012).

“I would advise Catholic professionals to take the time to share their faith with each other and how it might apply to their work. Without support, it is easy to let merely professional goals override the goals we all should be striving for, namely, wisdom and love,” Gagne said.

The purpose of Vermont Catholic Professionals — founded in 2018 — is to join Catholic men and women and others with shared values from the business and professional communities to encourage intellectual discussions, to foster professional and faith-based relationships and to inspire service and charity to the community in Vermont. Events take place quarterly with a professional development speaker that is relevant

to the business and professional communities in Vermont.

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Lift up Your Hearts:

A Look at the Liturgy of the Mass

### The Profession of Faith or The Creed


As we consider the last two elements in the Liturgy of the Word (the Profession of Faith and the General Intercessions), we recognize a subtle shift. Up to this point, the Liturgy of the Word has been primarily God moving towards the Church through the Word of God. Confronted with the great presence of God in Scripture, what can the Church do but respond in faith (Creed) and prayer (General Intercessions). These last two elements in the Liturgy of the Word are the Church's response to God's Word. As God moves towards us in Scripture, so too do we move toward God in professing our faith and offering prayer.

The earliest form of the profession of faith can be found in baptismal liturgies and still survives today in the Rite of Baptism. This is the simple question-and-answer form. "Do you believe in God? Do you believe in Jesus Christ? Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?" The way these questions were asked varied from place to place. In some places, the one to be baptized faced west toward the horizon of the setting sun,

the horizon from which the sun disappears, and light vanishes, to renounce the darkness. "Do you reject sin? Do you reject Satan?" The minister would then turn the person to face east, toward the place where the sun rises, and ask the remaining questions about belief in God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. In other places, the person would already be standing in the water, and after the answer to each question, the person would be plunged into the baptismal waters - "I baptize you in the name of the Father/and of the Son/and of the Holy Spirit."

As the basic beliefs of Christianity were challenged by various groups, the bishops began to meet in Councils to organize statements of belief - or creeds. The earliest is the Apostles Creed, formulated at the Council of Nicea in 325 AD. The Apostles Creed is an option that can be recited at Mass today. (It can be found at #143 in the hymnal.) More commonly, we hear the Nicene Creed (#142 in the hymnal). As the early Church's understanding of doctrine and

dogma developed, its creeds became more refined and elaborate. The Nicene Creed is a further development of the Apostle's Creed and was formulated in 381 during the Council of Constantinople. These creeds were not recited in liturgies right away, though. It wasn't until the sixth century that the Creeds would become a common element in liturgy. Prior to that time, only the questions asked at baptism served as a profession of faith. Although many other creeds have been written since the first two Councils of the Church and may even be used by certain churches, the Nicene Creed remains common to all the great Churches of both East and West to this day.
