From the Office of the Secretary:

Firstly, HAPPY EASTER! What did Pope Saint John Paul II say? "We are an Easter people and Alleluía is our song". The world thinks Easter is over, except for any candy that hasn't been consumed yet. But the Catholic Church continues to CELEBRATE EASTER for a full fifty days. That's the 40 days that Jesus spent on the earth between his Resurrection and his Ascension into Heaven plus the nine days between His Ascension and the coming of the Holy Spírit on Pentecost and yes, that makes 49 but then the NEXT day is the 50^{th} day and the end of the Easter Season. How did you celebrate Easter Sunday this year? When I was growing up, we always had a baked ham, mashed potatoes, cinnamon rolls, ice cream for dessert. How about you? What really communicates "celebration" to you? Are there special foods, or particular activities, or specific places to go or things to do? Think about those things and then think about carrying them out over the next six weeks of the Easter Season. How do you extend the celebration? In Year C, we've been reading from the Gospel according to St. Luke. Maybe something as simple as reading the Passion and Resurrection narratives from his or one of the other Gospels. Possibly using Lectio Divina to ponder on a single paragraph or passage. Perhaps carry on a discipline from Lent, like limiting TV time or refined sugars as an on-going sacrifice. at a recent retreat, the speaker suggested that we ought to continue our Lenten fast until Pentecost as a preparation for a greater inflowing of the Holy Spírít in our hearts. Think about it,

and let's celebrate Easter for the next six weeks!

And on a completely different note, please continue to remember your Spiritual Adoptee in your prayers.

Fr. Gratton suggested that we create a permanent record of the offerings, prayers, and sacrifices we all are making for our Spiritual Adoptees. Two separate processes are in place for this.

ONE: notebooks have been set out at each CHURCH to record, on a weekly basis, the prayers we have prayed, as well as the other things we have offered on behalf of our Adoptees.

TWO: we are planning a memorial quilt, or possibly multiple quilts, for the year that we are praying, offering, and sacrificing on

the behalf of our Spírítual Adoptees. Again, each week, take a scrap/swatch of fabric from the stack provided, and, as a memorial of your prayers, etc., for your Spiritual Adoptee, add it to the "treasure box" provided. At the end of our year of prayers, offerings, and sacrifices, we hope to have enough fabric to create multiple quilts. Plans are in the works for an Angel lifting our prayers to God in Heaven, an image of Mary at prayer, and an image of an Incensor, like the one Fr. Gratton uses at Mass to Incense the Altar. A lot will depend on how many swatches are added to the Treasure Boxes. AND, if any of you just happen to have cotton fabric sitting in your personal stash,

consider making a donation toward our

memorial quilts. Cotton, only, please!

The Image of The Divine Mercy

In 1931, our Lord appeared to St. Faustina in a vision. She saw Jesus clothed in a white garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His garment in the area of the Heart, from where two large rays came forth, one red and the other pale. She gazed intently at the Lord in silence, her soul filled with awe, but also with great joy. Jesus said to her:

Paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I promise

that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over [its] enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I Myself will defend it as My own glory (Diary, 47, 48). I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I desire that this image be venerated, first in your chapel, and [then] throughout the world.

At the request of her spiritual director, St. Faustina asked the Lord about the meaning of the rays in the image. She heard these words in reply:

The two rays denote Blood and Water. The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls. These two rays issued forth from the depths of My tender mercy when My agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross. Happy is the one

who will dwell in their shelter, for the just hand of God shall not lay hold of him. By means of this image I shall grant many graces to souls. It is to be a

> reminder of the demands of My mercy, because even the strongest faith is of no avail without works.

These words indicate that the Image represents the graces of Divine Mercy poured out upon the world, especially through Baptism and the Eucharist.

Many different versions of this image have been painted, but our Lord made it clear that the painting itself is not what is important. When St. Faustina first saw the original image that was

being painted under her direction, she wept in disappointment and complained to Jesus: "Who will paint You as beautiful as You are?".


In answer, she heard these words: "Not in the beauty of the color, nor of the brush lies the greatness of this image, but in My grace".

So, no matter which version of the image we prefer, we can be assured that it is a vehicle of God's grace if it is revered with trust in His mercy.


- 2. On the first bead, say one of the Opening Prayers - St. Faustina's Prayer for Sinners: "O Jesus, eternal Truth, our Life, I call upon You and I beg Your mercy for poor sinners. O sweetest Heart of my Lord, full of pity and unfathomable mercy, I plead with You for poor sinners. O Most Sacred Heart, Fount of Mercy from which gush forth rays of inconceivable graces upon the entire human race, I beg of You light for poor sinners. O Jesus, be mindful of Your own bitter Passion and do not permit the loss of souls redeemed at so dear a price of Your most precious Blood. O Jesus, when I consider the great price of Your Blood, I rejoice at its immensity, for one drop alone would have been enough for the salvation of all sinners. Although sin is an abyss of wickedness and ingratitude, the price paid for us can never be equaled. Therefore, let every soul trust in the Passion of the Lord, and place its hope in His mercy. God will not deny His mercy to anyone. Heaven and earth may change, but God's mercy will never be exhausted. Oh, what immense joy burns in my heart when I contemplate Your incomprehensible goodness, O Jesus! I desire to bring all sinners to Your feet that they may glorify Your mercy throughout endless ages." (Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, 72)
- OR: "You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us." (Diary, 1319)
- Repeat three times "O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You!"
- 5. On the next three beads (these would be used for the Hail Mary when reciting the Rosary) recite
 - Our Father (on the first bead)
 - Hail Mary (on the second bead)
 - The Apostles' Creed (on the third)

- 6. The first bead of each decade: The Eternal Father: "Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."
- 7. On the 10 Small Beads of Each Decade: "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- 8. Repeat 6 & 7 for the four remaining decades
- 9. Conclude with Holy God (Repeat three times)
 "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One,
 have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- 10. Optional Closing Prayers "Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. (Diary, 950) Amen

A Prayer for Divine Mercy:

O Greatly Merciful God, Infinite Goodness, today all mankind calls out from the abyss of its misery to Your mercy — to Your compassion, O God; and it is with its mighty voice of misery that it cries out. Gracious God do not reject the prayer of this earth's exiles! O Lord, Goodness beyond our understanding, Who are acquainted with our misery through and through, and know that by our own power we cannot ascend to You, we implore You: anticipate us with Your grace and keep on increasing Your mercy in us, that we may faithfully do Your holy will all through our life and at death's hour. Let the omnipotence of Your mercy shield us from the darts of our salvation's enemies, that we may with confidence, as Your children, await Your [Son's] final coming — that day known to You alone. And we expect to obtain everything promised us by Jesus in spite of all our wretchedness. For Jesus is our Hope: through His merciful Heart, as through an open gate, we pass through to heaven (Diary, 1570). Amen

The Fatima Message:Now is the Time to do Our Part

n July 1917, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to three children at Fatima in Portugal and offered a series of messages for the conversion of the world to Her Immaculate Heart so as to seek an end to war and the dawn of world peace. Over the years, devotion to Our Lady of Fatima and her message has flourished in the Church. Still the dream of world peace has been a fleeting one.

In response to the recent onset of war in Ukraine, Pope Francis on March 25, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, renewed the consecration of the world, most especially Russia, to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. In union with all of the Catholic bishops and peoples of the world, he called for each

of us to offer prayers, penance and worship for the sake of world peace. Our Lady made quite clear in her messages at Fatima that the salvation of our world requires the work of us all.

One of the most important aspects of the Fatima message was Our Lady's request for the First Saturday devotion. In the July 13, 1917, apparition at Fatima, Our Lady said to the children, "God wishes to establish in the world devotion to my Immaculate Heart ... I shall come to ask for the Communion of Reparation on the first Saturdays." She came expressly with the request for this devotion when she later appeared to one of the three children to whom she had appeared earlier, Sister Lucia, on Dec. 10, 1925.

The First Saturday Devotion

(five consecutive First Saturdays of each month)
With the intention of making reparation for the offenses against the Immaculate Heart, we are asked to:

- Go to Confession (may be eight days before or after)
- Receive Holy Communion (can be received at a Saturday evening Mass)
- · Pray five decades of the rosary
- Keep Our Lady company for 15 minutes while meditating on one or more mysteries of the rosary (in addition to praying the rosary)

The Great Promise

Our Lady promised to assist all those who will practice the devotion of the first Saturday on five consecutive months with the graces necessary for salvation at the hour of their death. This is not a guaranteed passage into heaven; our cooperation with grace is always required.

Regular practice of the First Saturdays is a sign of our devotion to the Immaculate Heart and a desire on our part to make reparation for our personal and corporate sin. It also offers us an opportunity to pray for the souls in purgatory. Our Lady said at Fatima, "Many people go to hell because there is no one to offer sacrifices for them."

Practicing the First Saturday devotion monthly helps atone for their sins, consoles the Immaculate Heart of Mary and is a spiritual act of mercy.

Respect Life Ministry — What Is Article 22?

Planned Parenthood and its abortion allies continue to push aggressive abortion legislation at the national level and in all 50 states in the country. The Legislature of Vermont has approved Proposal 5, now called Article 22. Article 22 is a proposed amendment to the Vermont Constitution that will permit abortions — for any reason, through all nine months of pregnancy

— up to and including the day of birth. Article 22 will be on the 2022 Vermont General Election ballot in November for an up or down vote by Vermonters. If Article 22 passes, we will have NO ability to protect the life of the unborn. Vermont will then be the first state in the country to explicitly deny unborn children the right to life in its constitution.

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
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
