

Our Lord said to blessed Margaret Mary, "If men would but acknowledge My love, that which I have done for them would appear trifling to me." ... Whence comes it, O Lord, that so few know and seek Thee? Alas! on Calvary two thieves suffered with Thee; both had the same Redeemer, the same example of patience before their eyes; for both Thy Blood flowed, but one alone profited by Thy mercy. Amongst those who surround Thy altar suffer not that any should be found so unfortunate as to resist Thy advances, and doubt in the mercy of Thy adorable Heart.

Christ came to destroy the works of the devil, not by powerful deeds, but rather by suffering from him and his members, so as to conquer the devil by righteousness, not by power; thus Augustine says that "the devil was to be overcome, not by the power of God, but by righteousness." And therefore in regard to Christ's temptation we must consider what He did of His own will and what He suffered from the devil. For that He allowed Himself to be tempted was due to His own will. Wherefore it is written: "Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert, to be tempted by the devil": and Gregory says this is to be understood of the Holy Ghost, to wit, that "thither did His Spirit lead Him, where the wicked spirit would find Him and tempt Him." But He suffered from the devil in being "taken up" on to "the pinnacle of the Temple" and again "into a very high mountain." Nor is it strange, as Gregory observes, "that He allowed Himself to be taken by him on to a mountain, who allowed Himself to be crucified by His members." And we understand Him to have been taken up by the devil, not, as it were, by force, but because, as Origen says, "He followed Him in the course of His temptation like a wrestler advancing of his own accord."

The Mass: It's Not a Spectator Sport

The Liturgy of the Word follows the collect. During the first reading, the Psalm and the second reading we sit listening to those who prepared for the preaching of the Gospel, *viz.* the Prophets of the Old Testament and the Apostles of the New. The Gospel is the preaching of Jesus Christ Himself. Because of the great dignity of the message it deserves to be proclaimed by one who has solemnly dedicated his life to it. At his ordination he was told: *"Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach."*

Before our Lord entered into His public ministry He retreated to the desert and prepared Himself with fasting and prayer. At the Mass the one who proclaims the Gospel, whether the priest or the deacon, makes a similar journey across the sanctuary. The deacon asks a blessing of the priest, the priest of God Himself; either one humbles himself in admission of his unworthiness: "Almighty God, cleanse my heart and my lips that I may worthily proclaim Your Holy Gospel." Such is the blessing for the one who proclaims the Gospel, and similarly each hearer should ask that God would cleans

e his/her heart to receive that which is about to be proclaimed. At the same time they stand, praising the Lord Jesus, and after attending carefully to the Gospel, they repeat that same praise at the end of the reading: *Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ!* This is said whether the word received is easy or hard. Meanwhile the priest or deacon kisses the book at the beginning of the passage where he had signed it with the cross, he prays in a low voice: *May the words of the Gospel wipe away our sins*. He had signed the book with the cross as a reminder that Christ confirmed the truth of all He said by His death on the Cross. The people rising to hear the proclamation can also be a reminder: we remember that at the word of Christ the sick rose, picked up their beds and walked; the dead rose and were brought to life again; the Prodigal son rose and returned to his father. We also rise; receiving the word of Christ into our hearts we intend to live that word, to the clory of God.

Next comes the homily. It shouldn't be the main focus of the Mass — what's coming next with the Liturgy of the Eucharist should take that place, but the homily should help to point us to our Lord's Sacrifice. St. John records in his Gospel that one day there came some Greeks, who approached the Apostle Phillip. They said to him: "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." This phrase has been traditionally inscribed on many pulpits throughout the world as a reminder to the one preaching that it's Jesus that we want to see. The people who listen can help make this happen too, by reviewing the readings before Mass, and praying for the one who will preach. Each one who has come to the Mass has been summoned there by Christ. Our Lord has something to say to each individual: the preacher preaches, but it's the Holy Spirit Who speaks His message in your ear, so, be sure to open them with prayer and preparation!

GIVE Your priest, O Lord, a mild and judicious eloquence which shall keep him from being puffed up and exalted above his brethren by reason of Thy gifts. Put into his mouth, I beseech Thee, words of consolation and edification and exhortation through Thy Holy Spirit, that he may be enabled to exhort the good to better things, and, by word and example, to recall to the straight way of Thy righteousness those who walk perversely. Let the words which Thou shalt give Thy servant, be like to sharp javelins and burning arrows that shall pierce and enkindle unto Thy fear and holy love the minds of all them that hear him. Amen. ~St. Anselm
