

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This year, we follow Saint Luke's account of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus, and this Sunday we hear the splendid story of the visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. Most of Luke's account follows the Blessed Mother before her Son's birth and during his childhood, just as Matthew's account follows Joseph. This is a matter of focus, a complementary point of view. In the artwork below, we see Joseph and Zechariah, the husbands of Mary and Elizabeth, gazing in wonder upon the scene in which the unborn Jesus and John greet each other from within their mother's wombs.

It should not surprise us that Jesus, the Son of God, and John, his chosen herald, should recognize each other in spirit before earthly light covers their eyes. Their mothers, one Conceived without Original Sin and one who, though barren, conceives by the help of God, are pure vessels of devotion whose own flesh cannot veil the truth they bear.

We can and should trust what our eyes see in this world, but only to a certain point. We walk by faith, not by sight, as Saint Paul says (2 Cor 5:7), and while this does not mean closing our eyes to earthly responsibilities, it does mean that we can and should feel our way through this world by our God-given sense of trust in Jesus. Everything that we see, our bodies included, will eventually crumble, dissolve, and be rebuilt at the Second Coming of Christ in a spiritual manner perfectly coherent with what our faith sees now. So it is with the body of the Blessed Virgin Mary herself, which God assumes into heaven. So it will be with our bodies at the resurrection of the dead, so long as we greet Christ in faith now through the veil of flesh in which we walk.
