

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Connecting with the Disconnected

"How can we connect with the disconnected?" asked Bishop Eric Pohlmeier during his homily at the Deanery Mass, celebrated in our church on Wednesday, July 27, 2022. Recalling that the primary concern of pastors, parents, and other church leaders everywhere is how to connect with the disconnected, he said the many wonderful programs we have are not helping us to achieve this goal.

"The programs are wonderful for those who are already connected," he said. "But no program is going to help us for a different way that offers them a richness deep in connect with the disconnected." Hence, Bishop Pohl-

meier suggested following the model of Jesus. "It is a one-on-one approach rather than a program," he said. "To connect with the disconnected, we have to look at what Jesus did. Jesus brought people close to him, and their lives were transformed. Then he said, you go out, and you tell what happened to you."

The bishop said the essential building block for connecting with the disconnected, especially those in the family, is sharing our personal story of faith with others. He then asked us to consider the following questions: 1. What difference has Jesus made in your life? 2. If you have children, do your children know the answer to the first question?

Acknowledging that we Catholics are not usually ready with an answer to the first question, he encouraged us to reflect on this question seriously. He then asked the parents to share their answer to the first question with their non-practicing grown-up children before they ask them to go to church.

"Sharing faith is not a matter of telling others what they should do," Bishop Pohlmeier said. "Sharing faith is about speaking of God at work in our own life... To really share faith with somebody means I have to be versatile enough to adapt it to the situation. This takes some real reflecting to see how God has pervaded my life and how God wants me to build bridges with other people."

Saying that we all face many serious challenges in life, he asked us to see this as a common ground and share with others how we have learned to navigate life's difficulties because of Jesus. They may have biases of their own. But our common ground is that they are looking for what matters in life, he said. "Everyone is pursuing what they believe will give meaning to their life, what will bring them joy; that is part of our common humanity," he said.

"We have discovered something that really matters," he said. "So, to speak about our faith in terms of a pearl of great price that we have discovered is very different from telling somebody else that you should do this. So, we have to think about how valuable this life with Jesus is in our own story."


Cautioning that we should not be telling others what they shouldn't do, he said we should speak about the value of what we have found and invite them to look their heart they desire. We must be sharing and wit-

nessing this richness, he added.

"You are the building block we depend on your life and your story have a lot to offer," he said. "So, I ask you to reflect, to consider more deeply in such a way that we can share with others the story of God at work in you."

As Bishop Pohlmeier reminded us, sharing our story of faith with others is very important in getting them reconnected with the Church. Hence, let us often reflect on our story of faith and thus become aware of how God is at work in our lives, helping us navigate the many difficulties in life. Our constant awareness of how God is at work in

our lives will enable us to share our story of faith with others, especially with our family members, helping them reconnect with Jesus and his Church.

Conectando Con Los Desconectados

¿Cómo podemos conectarnos con los desconectados?" preguntó el Obispo Eric Pohlmeier durante su homilía en la Misa del Decanato, celebrada en nuestra Iglesia el Miércoles 27 de Julio de 2022. Recordando que la principal preocupación de los pastores, padres y otros líderes de la Iglesia en todas partes es cómo conectarse con los desconectados, dijo que los muchos programas maravillosos que tenemos no nos están ayudando a lograr este objetivo.

"Los programas son maravillosos para aquellos que ya están conectados", dijo. "Pero ningún programa nos ayudará a conectarnos con los desconectados". Por lo tanto, el Obispo Pohlmeier sugirió seguir el modelo de Jesús. "Es un enfoque individual en lugar de un programa", dijo. "Para conectarnos con los desconectados, tenemos que mirar lo que hizo Jesús. Jesús acercó a la gente a él, y sus vidas se transformaron. Entonces dijo, sal y cuenta lo que te pasó".

El Obispo dijo que el componente esencial para conectarse con los desconectados, especialmente con los de la familia, es compartir nuestra historia personal de fe con los demás. Luego nos pidió que consideráramos las siguientes preguntas: 1. ¿Qué diferencia ha hecho Jesús en tu vida? 2. Ŝi tiene hijos, ¿saben sus hijos la respuesta a la primera pregunta?

Reconociendo que nosotros, los Católicos, por lo general no estamos listos con una respuesta a la primera pregunta, nos animó a reflexionar seriamente sobre esta pregunta. Luego les pidió a los padres que compartieran su respuesta a la primera pregunta con sus hijos adultos no practicantes antes de invitarlos a ir a la Igle-

"Compartir la fe no es una cuestión de decirles a los demás lo que deben hacer", dijo el Obispo Pohlmeier. "Compartir la fe se trata de hablar de Dios obrando en nuestra propia vida... Para realmente compartir la fe con alguien significa que tengo que ser lo suficientemente versátil para adaptarme a la situación. "Todos buscan lo que creen que dará sentido a su vida, lo que les traerá alegría; eso es parte de nuestra humanidad común", dijo. "Hemos descubierto algo que realmente importa", dijo. "Entonces,

Conectando-se com o Desconectado

"Como nos podemos conectar com os desconectados?", perguntou o bispo Eric Pohlmeier durante a sua homilia na missa de Deanery, celebrada na nossa igreja na Quarta-feira, dia 27 de Julho de 2022. Lembrando que a principal preocupação dos padres, pais e outros líderes da igreja em todos os sítios é conectar com os desconectados, ele disse que todos os programas que temos, não ajudam a alcançar esse objectivo.

"Os programas são maravilhosos para quem já está conectado", disse ele. "Mas nenhum programa nos vai ajudar a conectar com os desconectados." Assim, o Bispo Pohlmeier sugeriu seguir o modelo de Jesus. "É uma abordagem pessoa-a-pessoa em vez de um programa", disse ele. "Para nos conectarmos com os desconectados, temos que olhar para o que Jesus fez. Jesus aproximou pessoas a ele, e as suas vidas foram transformadas." Depois ele disse, "agora vai, e diz o que te aconteceu."

O bispo disse que o ponto essencial para se conectar com os desconectados, especialmente os da família, é compartilhar a nossa história pessoal de fé com os outros. Ele então pediu-nos para considerar as seguintes perguntas: 1. Qual foi a diferença que Jesus fez na sua vida? 2. Se tem filhos, os seus filhos sabem a sua resposta para a primeira pergunta?

Reconhecendo que nós, católicos, geralmente não estamos prontos com uma resposta à primeira pergunta, ele encorajou-nos a reflectir sériamente sobre essa questão. Então pediu aos pais para compartilhar a sua resposta à primeira pergunta com os seus filhos adultos, não praticantes, antes de pedirem que fossem à igreja.

"Compartilhar a fé não é uma questão de dizer aos outros o que eles devem de fazer", disse o bispo Pohlmeier. "Compartilhar a fé é falar de Deus presente na nossa própria vida... realmente compartilhar a fé com alguém, significa que tenho que ser versátil o suficiente para adaptá-la à situação. Isso requer uma reflexão real para ver como Deus entrou na minha vida e como Deus quer que eu construa pontes com outras pessoas."

Dizendo que todos nós enfrentamos muitos desafios sérios na vida, ele pediu-nos para ver isso como um terreno comum e compartilhar com os outros como aprendemos a navegar nas dificuldades da vida por causa de Jesus. Eles podem ter seus próprios vícios. Mas o nosso ponto comum é que eles procuram o que importa na vida, disse ele. "Todos perseguem no que acreditam, que tráz sentido à sua vida, o que lhes trará alegria; que faz parte da nossa humanidade comum", disse ele.

"Descobrimos algo que realmente importa", disse ele. "Então, falar sobre a nossa fé em termos de uma pérola valiosa que descobrimos é muito diferente do que dizer a outra pessoa, você deveria fazer isso. Então, devemos de pensar como a vida com Jesus é valiosa na nossa própria história."

Pensando que não deveríamos dizer aos outros o que eles não devem de fazer, ele disse que devemos falar sobre o valor do que encontramos e convidá-los a procurar uma maneira diferente que lhes ofereça uma riqueza profunda no seu coração e que eles desejam. Devemos compartilhar e testemunhar essa riqueza, acrescentou.

"Você é o bloco de cimento da construção do qual dependemos – a sua vida e a sua história têm muito que oferecer", disse ele. "Então, peço que reflita, considere mais profundamente de tal forma que possa compartilhar com os outros a história de Deus que existe em si."

Como nos lembrou o Bispo Pohlmeier, compartilhar a nossa história de fé com os outros é muito importante para reconectá-los com a Igreja. Então, reflitam sempre sobre a nossa vida de fé e, assim, tornamo-nos conscientes de que Deus manobra as nossas vidas, ajudando-nos a navegar nas muitas dificuldades da vida. O nosso constante reconhecimento de que Deus trabalha nas nossas vidas permite-nos compartilhar a nossa história de fé com os outros, especialmente com os nossos familiares, ajudando-os a reconectarem-se com Jesus e sua Igreja.



Sunday Readings Explained- 160- Fr. Tony Kadavil



Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Wisdom 18:6-9; Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19; Luke 12: 32-48

Being Vigilant and Ready

Introduction

The central theme of today's readings is the necessity for trusting Faith in God's promises and vigilant preparedness in the followers of Christ to meet their God as their Judge and Rewarder at the time of their death. Fidelity in doing God's will is the best preparation for our death.

The first reading cites the Faith-filled preparedness of the ancient Hebrew slaves in Egypt before their mass exodus to the Promised Land. Their trusting Faith in their God's promises gave them hope. We are told how their Faith and Hope resulted in their liberation. With expectant Hope, the Hebrews obediently sacrificed the first Passover lamb and ate the first ritual meal, as prescribed by their God through Moses. They awaited their imminent release and were prepared for it. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 33), invites us to express our own confidence in God and declare our trust in His providence: "See, the eyes of the Lord are upon those who fear Him, upon those who hope for His kindness, to deliver them from death and preserve them in spite of famine. Our soul waits for the Lord, Who is our help and our shield' (vv 18-20).

In the Second Reading, taken from the last chapter of the letter to the Hebrews, Paul defines Faith as "the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). He tries to bolster the Faith of the Jewish Christians (the Hebrews), by appealing to the example of their ancestors, starting with Abraham, and reviewing the things they accomplished by Faith. In the Gospel, Jesus challenges his disciples to trust the Father's prom-

ise to give them eternal happiness in His kingdom. But they are to be prepared at all times, because the Son of Man will come at an unexpected hour, either at the moment of their death or at the end of the world. Using the master-thief parable, Jesus warns us to be on our guard so that the thief (the devil), may not steal our treasure of Divine grace by his temptations. Using the master-servant parable, Jesus reminds us that we always need to do the will of God by obeying Jesus' commandment of love, offering humble and sacrificial service to others.

First Reading, Wisdom 18, 6-9

The book of Wisdom was written about a century before the coming of Jesus, by a faithful, learned Jew living in cosmopolitan Alexandria in Egypt. One of his purposes was to bolster the Faith of fellow Jews living in a world indifferent, and sometimes hostile, to their beliefs. A favorite theme of the writer is how the **providence of God** has protected the Chosen People throughout their history, especially during the time of their enslavement in Egypt and during their Exodus to freedom and the Promised Land under Moses.

The author goes over these events in great detail. Our verses today interpret Exodus chapters 11 and 12 where, while the angel of the Lord was striking down the first-born of Pharaoh and other Egyptians, the vigilant Hebrew slaves were both obediently offering grateful sacrifice to the Lord and eating the meat of the lamb to fortify themselves for their coming escape. That night was the first Passover. Like those Jewish slaves in Egypt, we, too, have been called to cling to the Hope of a

future that may seem too good to be true, and we, too, are expected to be steadfast in our Faith, even when we see no signs of the fulfillment of God's promises.

Second Reading, Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

This passage is taken from the end of the Letter to the Hebrews. It contains the only explicit definition of religious Faith in the Bible: "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). Like our first reading, the Letter to the Hebrews was intended to bolster the Faith of the Jewish Christians (Hebrews), by appealing to the example of their ancestors who had believed in promises yet to be fulfilled. The chief example of strong Faith is found in their patriarch Abraham, a wealthy but childless pagan in Ur of the Chaldees (modern Iraq). Abraham heard the voice of God summoning him to a different land, where God promised to grant him many descendants.

By Faith Abraham left his homeland, accepted God's promise that his descendants would form a great nation, and was willing to sacrifice his son Isaac at God's command. Despite obstacles and setbacks, Abraham stayed obedient, "for he thought that the One Who had made the promise was trustworthy" (Heb 11:11). The first century Jewish Christians were ostracized from Temple worship (sacrifices, priesthood, rituals), of mainline Judaism. To bolster their Faith, the author provided a complex treatise showing that, in their new life in Christ, they were more than compensated for what they had lost. They were given the assurance that Christ's promises for his believers exceeded the promises given to their Jewish ancestors.

Gospel Reading, Luke 12: 32-48

Be ready for your death and Jesus' Second Coming: Today's reading from Luke 12 is one of three eschatological discourses in the Gospel. All three of the Synoptic Gospels record Jesus' concern for his disciples as he warned them to keep alert, to keep watch over themselves with careful attention. The passage is a collection of short parables, in which the chief characters are a master (representing the risen Jesus), and his servants (Jesus' followers). According to the Fathers of the Church, Jesus' words in this passage have two senses. In the narrower sense, the words refer to the Second Coming of Jesus, but in the broader sense they refer to the time of our own death, when God will call us to meet Him and to give Him an account of our life on earth.

Since the precise time of either coming is unknown to us, the proper attitude for Jesus' followers is constant watchfulness. "The secret to living out the theological virtue of Faith is to see that the here and now is the place and time in which God wants us to meet Him and to serve Him. It is not in the past, which is over. It is not the future, which we can only imagine and so is not real. The person in the state of grace who washes

the dishes well, because it is his job, and who offers this work to God for the sake of his neighbor, is living out the virtue of Faith and is prepared to meet Christ." (St. Jose Maria Escriva).

Relationship by grace: In the first part of today's Gospel, Jesus tells us what our real treasure should be and how we may keep it safe. The treasure God offers is of far greater value and is more secure than any earthly treasure. Nevertheless, it is possible for us to lose this treasure if we do not guard it carefully. The treasure is the Faith-relationship with God, which the Lord offers us in Baptism, a share in His own Life (Sanctifying Grace) through which we begin, here on earth, to lead our eternal life in Heaven with Him. But this treasure can be stolen by the devil or lost by our lack of vigilance in the midst of our temptations. Jesus uses two comparisons to explain the nature of the vigilance required of us. We must be ready for action like an oriental servant and trimmed for service like an oil lamp.

The long flowing robes worn by people of the day were a hindrance to work. When a man prepared himself to work, he gathered up his robes under his girdle (belt) in order to leave himself free for activity. The reference to fastened belts and lamps burning ready (v. 35) also recalls the preparedness for action, which was legislated for Israel in the Passover ritual (Ex12:1). Just as the Israelites were to be ready to pass from slavery to freedom, so are the disciples to live in a state of alertness in order to recognize and accept the Passover which Jesus offers – from sin and death to forgiveness and life. The eastern lamp was often a cotton wick floating in a vessel of oil.

The wick had to be kept trimmed at all times and the lamp replenished with oil. Otherwise the light would go out. What Jesus teaches us through these comparisons is that our relationship with God the Father must be constantly replenished by our prayers, our Sacramental life, our reading of Holy Scripture, and our acts of charity. Since the Lord is committed to us in an unbreakable Covenant of love and fidelity, we must, assisted by His grace, respond with equal commitment, no matter how difficult that may be. In His love for us, God always gives us the grace and strength to remain faithful, and He will reward our faithfulness.

Steadfast Faith and eternal vigilance: In the second part of today's Gospel, Jesus exhorts his followers to be steadfast in their Faith and ever vigilant. He explains his point using three mini-parables. The servants of a master were entrusted with the management of the household. In Jesus' day, although stewards were slaves, they had almost unlimited power. A trusted steward ran his master's house and administered his estate. When his master was not at home, the steward was everyday, although stewards were slaves, they had almost unlimited power. A trusted steward ran his master's house and administered his estate. When his

master was not at home, the steward was ever-vigilant. He prepared himself for his master's return at any time of the day or night by always doing his duties faithfully. Jesus illustrates the same point using another miniparable of the wise servants waiting for the return of their master after a wedding feast.

Jesus teaches us the need for constant vigilance, using yet another mini-parable, that of the thief and the treasure. We should not lose our treasure of Divine grace like the man who awoke one day to discover that a thief had stolen his wealth during the night. These parables are addressed to all believers to encourage "wakefulness" and preparedness. We must be vigilant like the servant in the parable waiting for his master's unexpected return or like the wise homeowner who was well prepared for the unexpected break-in of a thief. Since the time of our death is quite uncertain, we, too, must be ever ready to meet our Lord at any

moment. He should find us carrying out our tasks of love, mercy, and service, rather than leaving things undone or half-done. He should also find us at peace with God, with ourselves and with our fellowmen (Eph 4:26).

Irreparable Mistakes: Jesus then presents the parable of the unwise steward as a warning to us. The unwise steward made two mistakes. (i) He said, "I will do what I like while my master is away. "Like him, we often forget that our Lord is always with us, and that we will be accountable to him on the day of reckoning. Misuse of an office for one's own advantage or the abuse of others will bring about severe punishment, for the returning Lord will place that servant "with the unfaithful." (ii) He said, "I

have plenty of time to put things right before the master comes." Nothing is as fatal to the accomplishment of a task as procrastination. Jesus also warns us that knowledge and privilege bring responsibility with them. Today, looking back on two thousand years of Christian history, we find it difficult to expect Christ's second coming during our lifetime. But we are sure to meet him at our death. Since the date and time of our death are also unknown to us, we should always be ready to give him an account of our lives.

What kind of steward does God expects us to be? God expects Christians to be accountable, faithful, productive stewards of God's grace and His gifts to us of creation, life, body, talents, skills, wealth and possessions. Negatively, in order that the Lord will find us responsible, faithful and productive stewards when he comes in glory, let us avoid some of these pitfalls and mistakes while awaiting the second coming of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior: First, complacency in that Jesus' return is not yet imminent. Second, idleness or sloth--doing nothing. Third, gross negligence in the

performance of duties. Fourth, procrastination -- always postponing to another day what can be done today. Fifth, abuse of power and position and squandering of resources. Sixth, the *mañana* habit- starting our work, but fading away and quitting; a lack of perseverance. (The name is taken from the quip, "Mañana may translate to "tomorrow," but it really means "not today!"). Positively, let us religiously perform the tasks require of us and fulfill our role as stewards of God's gifts and graces: First,n we need to protect, preserve and conserve all Gods' gifts entrusted to us. Second, we need to develop to the maximum all the spiritual, material and physical resources entrusted to our care. Third, we need to communicate and share all the fruits and benefits rising from the gifts and talents we have preserved, developed and cultivated.

Good stewards will be generously rewarded, while bad stewards will be severely punished and will suffer a

great loss. The reward or punishment will be proportioned to the powers, gifts, opportunities, and knowledge of the offenders. As Scripture says: "everyone to whom much is given, of him will much be required"; cf. Mt 5:19-20; 7:21-22; 25:41-46; Jas 2:14. Whenever Jesus comes, will he find us

responsible, faithful, productive stewards or lazy, abusive, unfaithful stewards? Can we give him a good account of our stewardship?

Life Messages

1. We need to be vigilant and ready to face the Lord. One of the traditional means for remaining alert is prayer. The most important element in prayer is listening to God – an attitude of attention to the "tiny whispering sound" of the Lord (1 Kgs 19:11-

12). Such attentiveness demands that we set aside a quiet time every day during which we can tune our ears to the Divine sounds of love, harmony, and peace. Let us recall the words of the Book of Revelation: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will enter his house and dine with him and he with me" (3:20).

2. We need to wait for the Lord. "Waiting for Christ to return" means working for the coming of the Kingdom of God. This means doing God's will by rendering humble service to others by combating poverty, by ending the hatred that divides us, by establishing peace among individuals and nations, by curbing the pride that causes us to become confrontational, and by building social structures that respect the dignity of individual humans. We must wait for the Lord in our daily lives by learning to see Jesus in the least of our brothers and sisters. In other words, we must be prepared to serve Jesus in whatever form he takes. What we frequently discover in "serving" other people is that God comes to us through them.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection

Whether you are just beginning your stewardship journey or have been living a stewardship way of life for years, today's readings invite us to ask ourselves an important question to ponder.

The question is this: "What do you treasure?" Of course, we all know the "right" answer: we treasure our faith, our family, and our friendships. But Jesus tells us in the Gospel passage from Luke how we can discover the real answer to this question. He says, "For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

To discern what we really treasure, we need to do a

check on our hearts. We can each ask ourselves, "Where do I spend the majority of my energy? Where do I find my thoughts dwelling? How do I choose to spend my time when I find myself with a few spare moments? What do my spending habits reveal about my what is important to me?

As Christian stewards, we are called to live our lives in grateful response to all that God has given us. Do I recognize and treasure these gifts?


