# When Life Crumbles

The Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis (1906-1975) was once the darling of the international media. Wherever he went, the paparazzi followed him. "All that really counts these days is money "he once said. "And the people with money that are royalty now" As he had already amassed enormous wealth when he was young, he was able to live like royalty throughout his life. A TV movie was made about him in 1988 under the title, The Richest Man in the World.

Onassis was born in a wealthy family in Smyrna in modern -day Turkey. He got the best possible high school education of his time. However, due to the Greek-Turkish War of 1919-1922, his family lost everything and fled to Greece for safety. Onassis stayed there with his family for one year before he migrated to Argentina in 1923 at 17. He immediately found a job as a telephone operator and studied for a degree in commerce and port-duty administration.

However, he did not wait to venture into business. While pursuing his studies, he started an Argentine importexport company and imported English and Turkish tobacco products, which made huge profits. He had learned the trade secrets by eavesdropping on the tobacco importers and telephone conversations when working as a telephone operator.

After becoming a citizen of Argentina in 1929, he started a shipping company and expanded his business worldwide. His freighters and tankers grew in number, and eventually, he became the owner of the world's largest privatelyowned shipping fleet, with 70 vessels. With his shipping business, he invested considerable amounts in Monaco and took possession of Monte Carlo Casino and the Monaco Yacht Club. In the meantime, he also started a whaling business off the west coast of South America, which was highly profitable.

In 1956, when the Greek airlines was in financial trouble, he took over its operational control investing millions of dollars. He ran this airline under the name Olympic Airways until 1974, when he relinquished his control, giving it back to the Greek government. It was often said that he was married to the sea, but the sky was his mistress. He always took pride in owning an airline.

Onassis was already world-famous when he married Jacqueline Kennedy, the widow of President John Kennedy, in 1968. His marriage to Jacqueline brought him additional publicity as it startled the world and made him the cynosure of all eyes. With more money than he ever needed and with glamorous Jacqueline on his side, he appeared to be the happiest man in the world. However, his whole world crumbled when his only son Alexander died in a plane crash on January 23, 1973. Nobody could console him, not even his daughter Christina, at his terrible

Onassis had everything money could buy, including the most lavish yacht in the world with marble floor bathrooms and gold-plated faucets. However, he had nothing to hold on to when his son met with a tragic death. He was devastated. After Onassis died on March 25, 1975 someone commented, "When he died, he was a sad, tired old man. He had no inner resources to deal with life's tragedies. He only had a placebo, his wealth, and it was not enough.

Yes, wealth was not enough to soothe the pain of his soul. Besides wealth, he had nothing to rely on when his soul was crushed. Like Onassis, many consider money the most important thing in life. Hence, they spend all their time and every ounce of their energy making money. Of course, we need money for our livelihood. Without money, we cannot meet our daily needs. However, money cannot meet all our needs, especially our spiritual needs.

Only God can meet our spiritual needs, especially when our soul is crushed, dragging us into despair. As we read in Psalm 46, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging."(1-3). The Psalmist knew how to hold on to God as his lifeline, not only in times of trouble but also at other times. When we have God as our lifeline, we will never be crushed, no matter what happens in life. On the contrary, we will overcome all our tragedies by finding new life in God. Moreover, our lifeline to God will bring us eternal life at the end of our life here on earth, which is the most important thing we need as this life is transient and lasts only for a moment compared

# Cuando La Vida Se Desmorona

El magnate naviero Griego Aristóteles Onassis (1906-1975) fue una vez el favorito de los medios internacionales. Dondequiera que iba, los paparazzi lo seguían. "Todo lo que realmente cuenta en estos días es el dinero", dijo una vez. "Y las personas con dinero que son la realeza ahora" Como ya había acumulado una enorme riqueza cuando era joven, pudo vivir como realeza durante toda su vida. Se hizo una película para televisión sobre él en 1988 con el título *El Hombre Más Rico del Mundo*.

Onassis nació en una familia rica en Smyrna en la actual Turquía. Recibió la mejor educación secundaria posible de su tiempo. Sin embargo, debido a la guerra Greco-Turca de 1919-1922, su familia lo perdió todo y huyó a Grecia en busca de seguridad. Onassis se quedó allí con su familia durante un año y ahi se emigró a Argentina en 1923 a los 17 años. Inmediatamente encontró trabajo como telefonista y estudió la licenciatura en comercio y administración portuaria.

Sin embargo, no esperó para incursionar en los negocios. Mientras realizaba sus estudios, fundó una empresa Argentina de importación y exportación e importó productos de tabaco Ingleses y Turcos, lo que generó enormes ganancias. Había aprendido los secretos comerciales escuchando a escondidas a los importadores de tabaco y conversaciones telefónicas cuando se trabaja como telefonista.

Después de convertirse en ciudadano Argentino en 1929, fundó una compañía naviera y expandió su negocio a todo el mundo. Sus cargueros y petroleros crecieron en número y, finalmente, se convirtió en el propietario de la flota de transporte privado más grande del mundo, con 70 buques. Con su negocio naviero, invirtió cantidades considerables en Mónaco y tomó posesión del Casino de Montecarlo y del Club Náutico de Mónaco. Mientras tanto, también inició un negocio de caza de ballenas frente a la costa oeste de América del Sur, que fue de muchas ganancias.

En 1956, cuando las aerolíneas Griegas estaban en problemas financieros, él se hizo cargo de su control operativo invirtiendo millones de dólares. Dirigió esta aerolínea bajo el nombre de Olympic Airways hasta 1974, cuando renunció a su control y se lo devolvió al gobierno Griego. A menudo se decía que estaba casado con el mar, pero el cielo era su amante. Siempre se enorgulleció de ser dueño de una aerolínea.

Onassis ya era mundialmente famoso cuando se casó con

Jacqueline Kennedy, la viuda del presidente John Kennedy, en 1968. Su matrimonio con Jacqueline le trajo publicidad adicional, ya que sorprendió al mundo y lo convirtió en el centro de todas las miradas. Con más dinero del que nunca necesitó y la glamorosa Jacqueline por su parte, parecía ser el hombre más feliz del mundo. Sin embargo, todo su mundo se derrumbó cuando su único hijo, Alexander, murió en un accidente aéreo el 23 de Enero de 1973. Nadie pudo consolarlo, ni siquiera su hija Christina, por su terrible pérdida.

Onassis tenía todo lo que el dinero podía comprar, incluido el yate más lujoso del mundo con baños con piso de mármol y grifos dorados. Sin embargo, no tenía nada a lo que aferrarse cuando su hijo tuvo una muerte trágica. Estaba devastado. Después de la muerte de Onassis el 25 de Marzo de 1975, alguien comentó: "Cuando murió, era un anciano triste y cansado. No tenía recursos internos para hacer frente a las tragedias de la vida. Solo tenía un placebo, su riqueza, y no era suficiente".

Sí, la riqueza no fue suficiente para calmar el dolor de su alma. Además de la riqueza, no tenía nada en lo que confiar cuando su alma fue aplastada. Al igual que Onassis, muchos consideran que el dinero es lo más importante en la vida. Por lo tanto, pasan todo su tiempo y cada onza de su energía haciendo dinero. Por supuesto, necesitamos dinero para nuestro sustento. Sin dinero, no podemos satisfacer nuestras necesidades diarias. Sin embargo, el dinero no puede satisfacer todas nuestras necesidades, especialmente nuestras necesidades espirituales.

Solo Dios puede suplir nuestras necesidades espirituales, especialmente cuando nuestra alma está aplastada, arrastrándonos a la desesperación. Como leemos en el Salmo 46, "Dios es nuestro amparo y fortaleza, nuestro pronto auxilio en las tribulaciones. Por tanto, no temeremos, aunque la tierra se deshaga y los montes se desplomen en el corazón de los mar, aunque bramen y se turben sus aguas, y tiemblen los montes a causa de su bravura" (1-3). El salmista sabía cómo aferrarse a Dios como su salvavidas, no solo en tiempos de angustia sino también en otros momentos. Cuando tenemos a Dios como nuestro salvavidas, nunca seremos aplastados, pase lo que pase en la vida. Al contrario, superaremos todas nuestras tragedias encontrando nueva vida en Dios. Además, nuestra línea de vida con Dios nos traerá la vida eterna al final de nuestra vida aquí en la tierra, que es lo más importante que necesitamos ya que esta vida es transitoria y dura solo un momento en comparación con la eternidad.

# Quando a vida se desfaz

O magnata dos navios Grego, Aristóteles Onassis (1906-1975) foi o preferido dos jornalistas internacionais. Por onde passava, os paparazzi seguiam-no. "Tudo o que realmente conta nos dias de hoje é o dinheiro", disse uma vez. "As pessoas com dinheiro são agora realeza". Como já tinha acumulado enorme riqueza quando era jovem, ele foi capaz de viver como a realeza durante toda a sua vida. Um filme para TV foi feito sobre ele em 1988 sob o título, O Homem Mais Rico do Mundo.

Onassis nasceu numa família rica em Smyrna, na actual Turquia. Ele obteve a melhor educação secundária possível do seu tempo. No entanto, devido à Guerra Greco-Turca de 1919-1922, a sua família perdeu tudo e fugiu para a Grécia para segurança. Onassis ficou lá com a sua família por um ano antes de emigrar para a Argentina em 1923, aos 17 anos. Imediatamente encontrou um emprego como telefonista e estudou para se formar em comércio e administração portuária.

No entanto, ele não esperou para se aventurar nos negócios. Enquanto prosseguia nos seus estudos, fundou uma empresa Argentina de importação e exportação e importou produtos de tabaco Ingleses e Turcos, que produziram enormes lucros. Tinha aprendido os segredos comerciais através de escutas dos importadores de tabaco econversas telefónicas quando trabalhava como telefonista.

Depois de se tornar cidadão da Argentina em 1929, ele fundou uma empresa de navios e expandiu seus negócios em todo o mundo. Seus cargueiros e petroleiros cresceram em número e, eventualmente, ele tornou-se o proprietário da maior frota de navios privados do mundo, com 70 navios. Com o seu negócio em embarcações, investiu quantias consideráveis no Mónaco e tomou posse do Casino de Monte Carlo e do Mónaco Yacht Club. Entretanto, iniciou também um negócio baleeiro ao largo da Costa Oeste da América do Sul, que era altamente lucrativo.

Em 1956, quando as companhias aéreas Gregas estavam com problemas financeiros, ele assumiu o controle operacional investindo milhões de dólares. Ele dirigiu uma companhia aérea sob o nome de Olympic Airways até 1974, quando ele cedeu o seu controle, devolvendo-a ao governo Grego. Dizia-se muitas vezes que era casado como mar, mas o céu era sua amante. Ele sempre se orgulhou de ser dono de uma companhia aérea.

Onassis já era mundialmente famoso guando se casou com Jacqueline Kennedy, viúva do Presidente John Kennedy, em 1968. O seu casamento com

Jacqueline trouxe-lhe publicidade redobrada, pois surpreendeu o mundo e fez dele o centro de todos os olhos. Com mais dinheiro do que alguma vez precisou e com a famosa Jacqueline a seu lado, ele parecia ser o homem mais feliz do mundo. No entanto, todo o seu mundo se desfez quando o seu único filho Alexandre morreu num acidente de viação em 23 de Janeiro de 1973. Ninguém podia consolá-lo, nem mesmo a sua filha Christina, pela sua terrível perda.

Onassis tinha tudo o que o dinheiro podia comprar, incluindo o iate mais luxuoso do mundo, com banheiros com piso de mármore e torneiras banhadas em ouro. No entanto, ele não tinha nada para segurar quando seu filho se deparou com uma morte trágica. Ficou arrasado. Depois que Onassis morreu em 25 de Março de 1975, alguém comentou: "Quando morreu, era um velho triste e cansado. Ele não tinha recursos internos para lidar com as tragédias da vida. Ele só tinha um placebo, a sua riqueza, e não era suficiente.'

Sim, a riqueza não era suficiente para acalmar a dor da sua alma. Além da riqueza, ele não tinha nada em que confiar quando a sua alma foi esmagada. Como Onassis, muitos consideram o dinheiro a coisa mais importante da vida. Por isso, gastam todo o seu tempo e cada grama da sua energia ganhando dinheiro. É claro que precisamos de dinheiro para o nosso sustento. Sem dinheiro, não podemos satisfazer as nossas necessidades diárias. No entanto, o dinheiro não pode satisfazer todas as nossas necessidades, especialmente as nossas necessidades espirituais.

Sómente Deus pode satisfazer as nossas necessidades espirituais, especialmente quando a nossa alma é esmagada, arrastando-nos para o desespero. Como lemos no Salmo 46, "Deus é o nosso refúgio e força, uma ajuda presente nas dificuldades. Portanto, não temeremos, embora a terra ceda e as montanhas caiam no coração do mar, embora as suas águas rugam e espumem e as montanhas tremam com o seu surto." (1-3). O salmista soube agarrar-se a Deus como tábua de salvação, não só nos momentos difíceis, mas também noutros. Quando temos Deus como nossa tábua de salvação, nunca seremos esmagados, não importa o que aconteça na vida. Pelo contrário, venceremos todas as nossas tragédias encontrando vida nova em Deus. Além disso, a nossa tábua de salvação para Deus nos trará a vida eterna no final da nossa vida aqui na terra, que é a coisa mais importante de que precisamos, pois esta vida é transitória e dura apenas um momento em comparação com a eternidade.



## Sunday Readings Explained - 200- Fr. Tony Kadavil



Easter Fifth Sunday, Acts 6:1-7, I Peter 2:4-9, John 14:1-12

# Jesus Is the Way, the Truth and the Life

#### Introduction

Today's readings tell us how the early Church accepted the challenge of keeping Jesus' memory alive in the Christian community by fashioning it into a serving and worshipping community (Acts 6:1-7), making of it a spiritual edifice built from the "living stones" of believers upon the "Living Cornerstone of Christ" (I Pt 2:4-5), and, thus, the Father's House (John 14:1-12). Linking the first two readings to each other and to the Gospel, the Refrain of today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 33) has us sing "Lord, let Your Mercy be on us, as we place our trust in You," because His Divine Mercy is the Source and binding power of our unity in Him here and hereafter. Today's Gospel gives us the image of the Church as a Church in glory in the Father's House. It also reminds us of the great truth that Jesus is the Way to God, that he is the Truth of God and that in him and through him we receive God's own Life. Today's readings demand from us real Faith not only in God the Father but also in Jesus precisely because he is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life" (Jn. 14:6), and he instructs us, "You have faith in God; have faith also in Me" (John 14:1).

#### First Reading, Acts 6:1-7

The first reading shows how and why the early Church developed social institutions and Church offices to keep Jesus' memory alive. It tells us how the apostles and early Christians, as a Church community, prayerfully and amicably solved a community problem. It is the famous account of the selection of the first deacons in the Church. The Greek-speaking widows complained that the Aramaic-speaking food-ministers were short-changing them at meals in favor of the Aramaic-speaking widows. The Apostles solved the problem by convening a meeting of "the whole community of the

disciples" and informing them that they should be the ones to work through their problem. Their task: "Select from among yourselves seven men of good standing, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to the task" of distributing the food (6:3). Note the names of the chosen seven: "Stephen, Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas and Nicolaus of Antioch." Every single one is a Greek! Luke tells us that the Church believed that if the Greeks in the community had a problem, then the Greeks in the community were important and gifted enough to solve their problem.

The Apostles ratified the choice of these community servants by praying over them and laying hands on them. The apostles' choice to solemnize the choosing by the ancient ritual of the imposition of hands on those chosen suggests something very interesting about service in the Church. The Apostles seem to be saying that the role of the community servant is worthy of what would become known as "ordination." That is, service is so important in the life of the Church, that we cannot be the Church of Christ Jesus if we're without mutual service. Word, and Sacrament, and Service, are the three constituents of the Church which Jesus founded, and the Holy Spirit brought to active life.

#### Second Reading, 1 Peter 2:4-9

The second reading gives us a view of the Church as a spiritual edifice built from "living stones" upon the "Living Cornerstone of Christ" (I Peter 2:4-5). Our Jewish ancestors in the Faith had once been slaves in Egypt, then nomads in Sinai, then settlers for a few generations, then exiles in Babylon. So the notion of a permanent home, one made (at least in part), of stone, held great appeal for them. Thus, it was natural for

Peter, while addressing the Jewish Christians, to use the stone metaphor to describe the place of Jesus in the plan of God. Peter quotes a famous line from Psalm 118 about the stone rejected by the builders becoming the cornerstone, and he contrasts those Jews who accept Jesus as their cornerstone with those who stumble on the stone. For all human beings, Jesus will either become a "cornerstone," binding all together, or a "stone that will make them stumble and a rock that will make them fall." Peter then addresses all Christians, both Jewish and Gentile, using the loftiest titles applied to Israel in the Old Testament: "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of His [God's] own.

Peter uses startling images like newborn babies, a living stone, holy priesthood, chosen race, royal people, God's chosen, God's own, etc., to promote in all Christians a new sense of identity within the community of

Faith. No one has ever expressed the dignity and importance of being a follower of Jesus more perfectly than Peter. We are, "a chosen race," because we have received the seal of the Spirit of God at our Baptism; "a royal priesthood," because we share in the priesthood of Christ himself, offering ourselves as living sacrifices by worshiping and serving God daily to help build his kingdom.; "a consecrated nation," because now Christians are set apart to live the new and everlasting covenant, called to be light and salt for the world; and, "God's possession," because we have been united with Him in Baptism, serve Him alone as our Master, and are ready to proclaim the Good News

of salvation, making it available to all who believe.

#### Gospel Reading, John 14:1-12

Context: The disciples are gathered together with Jesus on the last Thursday night of his life in the Upper Room for the Last Supper. The departing Jesus instructs them about how they may preserve his memory and carry on his mission. As his final hours on earth approach, Jesus prepares his disciples by explaining to them the full significance of what will happen. He will return to his Father and send them the gift of the Holy Spirit. And after dedicating their lives to leading others to Faith through the power of that Holy Spirit, they will be reunited with him in his Father's house. "I am going to prepare a living space for you, a mansion, a place for you for all eternity... I will come again and take you to that place."

Misinterpreted words of consolation: By reproducing the consoling words of Jesus, the apostle John probably intended to bring a note of comfort to a group of early Judeo-Christians struggling to maintain their identity around the close of the first century. John was attempting to give courage and hope to people who found themselves in the midst of a very nasty fight with their passionate and fanatical Jewish neighbors in the

Synagogue. They were frightened, vulnerable and defensive, and their survival as a community of Faith as well as their individual security and safety were in peril. It is clear that John's aim was pastoral, an attempt to comfort those friends of his who were afraid and who needed assurance. "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You have faith in God; have faith also in Me... "I am the Way and the Truth and the Life. No one comes to the Father except through Me."

Tremendous claim by Jesus: Centuries before Christ, the sages of India prayed every morning the "Shanti Mantra" ("Mantra prayer of peace") taken from Brihadaranyaka Upanishads (1.3.28), composed in 700 BCE, in the Sanskrit language: "From falsehood lead me to truth, from darkness lead me to light, from mortality lead me to immortality" ("Aasato Ma SathGamaya, Thamaso Ma JyothirGamaya, Mrtjyor Ma Am-

rithamGamaya").

Centuries later Jesus gave the answer to their prayer through his tremendous claim: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." In fact, Jesus took three of the great basic concepts of the Jewish religion and made the unique claim that in him all the three found their full realization. This means that he alone is the surest way to God. He alone, Son of God and Son of Man, can authoritatively and flawlessly teach us truths about God, and he alone can give God's life to us. John's central message is that Jesus is both the revealer and the Revelation of God.

If we wish to know who God is, what God thinks, and what God wants of us, we must attend to Jesus the

Word of God. "The Jesus of the Gospel does not only show us the way – his life of humble and generous servanthood is the way; he does not just philosophize about a concept of truth – he is the perfect Revelation of the truth about a God of enduring and unlimited love for his people; he is not just a preacher of futuristic promises – he has been raised up by God to a state of existence in God to which he invites all of us. In embracing the Spirit of his Gospel and living the hope of his Word, we encounter, in Christ, God Himself." (Connections).

Jesus is the Way: We go to God the Father who is Truth and Life through Jesus, and Jesus calls Himself the "Way" because He, the Only-begotten Son of God, is also Son of Man, the visible manifestation in human form of all that his Father is. To those who teach that all religions lead us to God or that religion used is immaterial provided man lead a good life, Jesus has the answer that he is the safest and surest way to God because he came from God and he can lead us to his Heavenly Father. The founders of other religions had either wrong ideas about the way to God or they were not sure guides. Lao-Tse (604-531 BC), the founder of Taoism said: "Get rid of all desires, you will have

It is to be a person of Truth and Life who is totally identified with the vision and the values of Jesus. The medieval monk *Thomas à* Kempis the author of Imitation of Christ explains Jesus' statement, "I am the Way and the Truth and the Life" thus: "Without the way, there is no going; without the truth, there is no knowing; and without the life, there is no living.'

He teaches us that God is a loving, merciful, providing and forgiving Father. He also teaches us the truth that our Triune God lives in each one of the believers. Jesus is the Truth also because he has borne testimony to truth, demonstrating through his life and death the love of God for human beings. Truth here is that complete integrity and harmony which Jesus himself revealed, not only in what he said and did, but in the total manifestation of his life and person. Jesus is the Truth, the Word of God. To seek the truth elsewhere is to stumble and fall, to deal in falsehood and lies.
