Why did Methodist Minister Allen Hunt, Ph. D., Join the Catholic Church?

Allen Hunt was a Methodist minister and the pastor of a mega-church with a membership of over 8,000 in Atlanta, GA, for several years. He was a nationally well-known preacher with his television program, *The Allen Hunt Show*. Hunt was not only a preacher but also a scholar with a Ph. D in *New Testament and Ancient Christian Origins* from Yale University. In January 2008, when he was at the height of his ministry, he resigned from the megachurch and became a Catholic.

Why did this famous Protestant minister become a Catholic? He became a Catholic because he wanted to receive the Holy Communion. Why did he like to receive the Ho-

ly Communion? He wanted to receive the Holy Communion because he genuinely believed in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Yes, he became a Catholic because of his great desire to receive the body and blood of Christ.

When he was ordained as a Methodist minister, he never paid any serious attention to the words of Jesus regarding the Eucharist, which we find in the sixth chapter of the Gospel of John. But while he was studying for a Ph. D. at Yale University, Sr. Rose, a Dominican sister, asked him why he did not believe in the teachings of Jesus regarding the Eucharist. The sister asked this question

when he was giving a series of talks to the Dominican sisters as requested by their retreat preacher, a Dominican priest, and a classmate of Hunt.

At that time, Hunt could not give a convincing answer to the question of the Dominican sister. However, that question made him think seriously about the words of Jesus regarding the Eucharist. Finally, he joined the Catholic Church after many years of study, reflection, and prayers. He joined the Catholic Church because he could not wait any longer to receive the life-giving body and blood of Jesus through the Eucharist.

In his autobiography *Confessions of a Mega Church Pastor*, he writes, "Eventually, deep in my heart, I knew Sister Rose was right. God offers Himself to you and me in the blessed body and blood. It really is true. This sacrament really is what Jesus said it is: the real presence of Jesus among us. In the Eucharist, Jesus comes to us and feeds us with himself."

When Hunt finally became convinced of the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, he left his job as the pastor of a mega-church, abandoning a huge salary and a high position in society. But today, unfortunately, there are a large number of Christians who do not believe in the words of Jesus regarding the Eucharist. And among those who believe, many do not have deep faith in the real presence of the Lord in the Eucharist.

In this context, we must remember that even during the

time of Jesus, many people did not believe in his words regarding the Eucharist. According to the gospel of St. John, chapter 6, it was after Jesus had multiplied food for them that they came back to him looking for more food. At that time, Jesus made his famous discourse on the Bread of Life.

During that discourse, Jesus said, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." At that time, the Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Then Jesus said to them, "Amen,

amen I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood will have eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is real food, and my blood is real drink."

Hearing this, some of his disciples said, "This is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?" Then they left Jesus and no longer followed him. Did he change his teaching when Jesus saw some of his disciples leaving him? No, he did not. On the contrary, he reaffirmed his teaching on the Bread of Life. Then he turned to

his Apostles and asked, "Do you want to leave too?" Immediately, Simon Peter said, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe that you are the holy one of God."

Even when some of the disciples of Jesus left him because of his teaching on the Bread of Life, the Apostles did not leave Jesus. They believed in the words of Jesus. That means they believed in the teaching of Jesus on the Eucharist, and they passed their faith in the Eucharist to us. And so we believe the Lord Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. Today, by celebrating the feast of Corpus Christi, we are really proclaiming publically our faith in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

As Catholic Christians, we truly believe that Jesus gives us his body and blood through the Eucharist for our nourishment. However, the big question is, do we really feel and acknowledge his presence when we receive him during the Eucharistic celebration? Do we really recognize his eternal presence in our midst in the form of the Eucharist?

The presence of Jesus is real in the Eucharist. When we receive the Eucharist, we are actually receiving the body and blood of Jesus. Today, as we celebrate the Eucharist, let us once again acknowledge his Real Presence in the Eucharist and receive him with true love and devotion. May God bless us all with a firm faith in the Real Presence of the Lord in the Eucharist. (Homily on the feast day of Corpus Christi, June 11, 2023)

Por Qué El Ministro Metodista Allen Hunt, Ph. D., Se Unió A La Iglesia Católica?

Allen Hunt fue un Ministro Metodista y Pastor de una mega-iglesia con más de 8,000 miembros en Atlanta, GA, durante varios años. Era un predicador conocido a nivel nacional con su programa de televisión, *The Allen Hunt* Show. Hunt no solo era un predicador, sino también un erudito con un Doctorado en Nuevo Testamento y Orígenes del Cristianismo Antiguo de la Universidad de Yale. En Enero de 2008, cuando estaba en el nivel más alto de su ministerio, renunció a la mega-iglesia y se convirtió al Catolicismo.

¿Por qué este famoso Ministro Protestante se hizo Católico? Se hizo Católico porque quería recibir la Sagrada Comunión. ¿Por qué le gustaba recibir la Sagrada Comunión? Quería recibir la Sagrada Comunión porque creía genuinamente en la Presencia Real de Jesús en la Eucaristía. Sí, se hizo Católico por su gran deseo de recibir el cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo.

Cuando fue ordenado Ministro Metodista, nunca prestó mucha atención a las palabras de Jesús sobre la Eucaristía, que encontramos en el capítulo sexto del Evangelio de Juan. Pero mientras estudiaba para un Doctorado en la Universidad de Yale, la Hna. Rose, una Hermana Dominica, le preguntó por qué no creía en las enseñanzas de Jesús sobre la Eucaristía. La Hermana hizo esta pregunta cuando estaba dando una serie de charlas a las Hermanas Dominicas a pedido de su predicador del retiro, un sacerdote dominico y compañero de clase de Hunt.

En ese momento, Hunt no pudo dar una respuesta convincente a la pregunta de la Hermana Dominica. Sin embargo, esa pregunta le hizo pensar seriamente en las palabras de Jesús sobre la Eucaristía. Finalmente, se unió a la Iglesia Católica después de muchos años de estudio, reflexión y oración. Se unió a la Iglesia Católica porque no podía esperar más para recibir el cuerpo y la sangre de Jesús que da vida a través de la Eucaristía.

En su autobiografía Confessions of a Mega Church Pastor, escribe: "Eventualmente, en el fondo de mi corazón, supe que la Hermana Rose tenía razón. Dios se ofrece a ti Jesús nos da su cuerpo y su sangre a través de la Euy a mí en el cuerpo y la sangre benditos. Realmente es cierto. Este sacramento es realmente lo que Jesús dijo que es: la presencia real de Jesús entre nosotros. En la Eucaristía, Jesús viene a nosotros y nos alimenta consigo mismo".

Cuando Hunt finalmente se convenció de la presencia real de Jesús en la Eucaristía, dejó su trabajo como pastor de una mega-iglesia, abandonando un gran salario y una alta posición en la sociedad. Pero hoy, por desgracia, hay un gran número de Cristianos que no creen en las palabras de Jesús sobre la Eucaristía. Y entre los que creen, muchos no tienen una fe profunda en la presencia en la Presencia Real del Señor en la Eucaristía. (Homilía real del Señor en la Eucaristía.

En este contexto, debemos recordar que aún en la época de Jesús, muchas personas no creían en sus palabras sobre la Eucaristía. Según el Evangelio de San Juan, Capítulo 6, fue después de que Jesús hubo multiplicado los alimentos para ellos que volvieron a él en busca de más alimentos. En ese momento, Jesús hizo su famoso discurso sobre el Pan de Vida.

Durante ese discurso, Jesús dijo: "Yo soy el pan vivo que descendió del cielo; el que come de este pan vivirá para siempre; y el pan que yo daré es mi carne para la vida del mundo." El que come mi carne y bebe mi sangre tendrá vida eterna, y yo lo resucitaré en el último día. Porque mi carne es verdadera comida, y mi sangre es verdadera bebida".

Al oír esto, algunos de sus discípulos dijeron: "Esta es una enseñanza dura. ¿Quién puede aceptarlo? Entonces dejaron a Jesús y ya no lo siguieron. ¿Cambió su enseñanza cuando Jesús vio que algunos de sus discípulos lo dejaban? No, no lo hizo. Al contrario, reafirmó su enseñanza sobre el Pan de Vida. Luego se volvió hacia sus Apóstoles y les preguntó: "¿Ustedes también quieren irse?". Inmediatamente, Simón Pedro dijo: "Maestro, ¿a quién iremos? Tu tienes las palabras de la vida eterna. Hemos llegado a creer que tú eres el santo de Dios".

Incluso cuando algunos de los discípulos de Jesús lo dejaron a causa de su enseñanza sobre el Pan de Vida, los Apóstoles no dejaron a Jesús. Creyeron en las palabras de Jesús. Eso significa que creyeron en la enseñanza de Jesús sobre la Eucaristía, y nos transmitieron su fe en la Eucaristía. Y por eso creemos que el Señor Jesús está realmente presente en la Eucaristía. Hoy, al celebrar la fiesta del Corpus Christi, estamos realmente proclamando públicamente nuestra fe en la Presencia Real de Jesús en la Eucaristía.

Como Cristianos Católicos, creemos verdaderamente que caristía para nuestro alimento. Sin embargo, la gran pregunta es, ¿realmente sentimos y reconocemos su presencia cuando lo recibimos durante la celebración eucarística? ¿Reconocemos realmente su presencia eterna en medio de nosotros en la forma de la Eucaristía?

A Razão porque o Ministro Metodista Allen Hunt, Ph.D., se juntou à Igreja Católica?

Allen Hunt foi um ministro Metodista e pastor de uma grande igreja com mais de 8,000 membros em Atlanta, GA, por vários anos. Ele era um pregador nacionalmente conhecido com o seu programa de televisão, *The Allen Hunt Show*. Hunt não era apenas um pregador, mas também um Professor com um Ph.D. no *Novo Testamento e Origens Cristãs Antigas* pela Universidade de Yale. Em Janeiro de 2008, quando estava no topo do seu ministério, renunciou à sua igreja e tornou-se Católico.

Qual a razão porque esse famoso ministro Protestante se tornou Católico? Tornou-se Católico porque queria receber a Sagrada Comunhão. Qual a razão porque ele gostava de receber a Sagrada Comunhão? Quis receber a Sagrada Comunhão porque acreditava genuinamente na Presença Verdadeira de Jesus na Eucaristia. Sim, tornou-se Católico por causa do seu grande desejo de receber o corpo e o sangue de Cristo.

Quando foi ordenado ministro Metodista, nunca prestou uma séria atenção às palavras de Jesus sobre a Eucaristia, que encontramos no sexto capítulo do Evangelho de João. Mas enquanto ele estudava para um Ph.D. na Universidade de Yale, a Irmã Rose, uma irmã Dominicana, perguntou-lhe a razão que ele não acreditava nos ensinamentos de Jesus sobre a Eucaristia. A irmã fez essa pergunta quando ele deu uma série de palestras para as irmãs Dominicanas, conforme solicitado por seu pregador de retiro, um padre Dominicano e seu colega da escola.

Naquela época, Hunt não conseguiu dar uma resposta convincente à pergunta da irmã Dominicana. No entanto, essa pergunta fê-lo pensar sériamente sobre as palavras de Jesus a respeito da Eucaristia. Finalmente, ele juntouse à Igreja Católica depois de muitos anos de estudo, reflexão e orações. Juntou-se à Igreja Católica porque não podia esperar mais para receber o corpo e o sangue vivificantes de Jesus através da Eucaristia.

Na sua autobiografia *Confessions of a Mega Church Pastor*, ele escreve: "Eventualmente, no fundo do meu coração, eu sabia que a irmã Rose estava certa. Deus oferece-se a você e a mim no corpo e sangue abençoados. É verdade. Este sacramento é realmente o que Jesus disse que é: a presença verdadeira de Jesus entre nós. Na Eucaristia, Jesus vem até nós e alimentanos consigo mesmo".

Quando Hunt finalmente se convenceu da presença verdadeira de Jesus na Eucaristia, ele deixou o seu emprego como pastor de uma imensa igreja, abandonando um enorme salário e um alto cargo na sociedade. Mas hoje, infelizmente, há um grande número de Cristãos que não crêem nas palavras de Jesus a respeito da Eucaristia. E entre os que crêem, muitos não têm fé profunda na presença verdadeira do Senhor na Eucaristia.

Neste contexto, devemos recordar que, mesmo no

tempo de Jesus, muitas pessoas não acreditavam nas suas palavras a respeito da Eucaristia. De acordo com o Evangelho de São João, capítulo 6, foi depois que Jesus multiplicou comida para eles que eles voltaram para Ele em busca de mais comida. Nessa altura, Jesus fez o seu famoso discurso sobre o Pão da Vida.

Durante esse discurso, Jesus disse: "Eu sou o pão vivo que desceu do céu; quem comer este pão viverá para sempre; e o pão que darei é a minha carne para a vida do mundo." Naquela época, os judeus brigaram entre eles, dizendo: "Como pode este homem dar-nos a sua carne para comer?" Então Jesus disse-lhes: "Amém, amém vos digo: se não comerdes a carne do Filho do Homem e não beberdes o seu sangue, não tereis vida dentro de vós. Quem comer a minha carne e beber o meu sangue terá a vida eterna, e eu o ressuscitarei no último dia. Porque a minha carne é comida de verdade, e o meu sangue é bebida de verdade."



Sunday Readings Explained - 205 - Fr. Tony Kadavil



Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time: Ex 19:2-6a; Ps 100: 1-2, 3, 5; Rom 5:6-11; Mt 9:36—10:8

Proclaimers and Healers

Introduction

The main theme of today's readings is that we are commissioned or sent, to transform others with the "Good News" of God's love, mercy, forgiveness, and salvation through Jesus His Son. The first reading gives Israel the good news that the God of Mount Sinai loves and cares for his people. God showed His continuing care for Israel by liberating the people from slavery in Egypt and by offering them a relationship in which they would be God's "special possession," "a kingdom of priests, a holy nation." Paul, in today's second reading, reflects on how Jesus in his life, death, and resurrection made manifest God's love and care for mankind.

According to Paul, the greatest proof of God's love and care for us was Jesus' willingness to die on behalf of sinful mankind and so make possible a new and better relationship with God. Today's responsorial psalm is permeated by a strong sense of God's loving care for His people as "the flock He tends." The Psalm affirms that the Lord is good, and that His kindness endures forever.

Today's Gospel is, in effect, a reminder from God to each one of us, saying, "You have received grace and talents from Me without charge, and so you have to give without charge through your simple, responsible and sharing lives." This, indeed, is the core of the priestly vocation and of the vocation of every Christian through his or her Baptism. Today's lesson marks a turning point in the establishment of the Christian Church as presented in the Gospels.

Up to this point in the story, Jesus himself was the focus of the healing, teaching, and controversy. With the commissioning of his disciples, others began to assume some of the responsibility for the new movement that heralded the kingdom of God. That new movement was destined to grow later, with increasing diversity, as it

extended beyond the borders of Galilee, into the Gentile world and became the Universal Christian Church.

First Reading, Exodus 19:2-6

All ancient religions assumed that the gods were distant from and indifferent to humans. The best people could hope for was that a few members, their priestly class, could deal with the gods on their behalf. In today's first reading God overturns that class distinction. In the instruction given to Moses, God wants all the members of His chosen people to be a kingdom of holy priests. God expects a whole holy nation to join in worship, not just a few holy members to perform sacred duties for the rest. God says that all His people are special, set apart, and holy, and that they should pay attention to their exalted position. A religion in which all the members are to be holy was a stunning innovation. This teaching was last repeated for Catholics at Vatican II, in "The Constitution on the Church," Chapter 5, "The Universal Call to Holiness in the Church," paragraphs 39-42. Hence we have no right to divide ourselves into the holy group and the ordinary group and reserve holiness only to the priests and the religious.

Second Reading: Romans 5:6-11

Paul eloquently reminds the gathered community of Romans that God has gone beyond all limits in loving them. Paul's point is that we were quite unworthy of the gift God gave us in Christ. Notice all the expressions of this unworthiness: "helpless, ungodly, still sinners, enemies." It's the contrast between our unworthiness and God's gracious generosity that is so remarkable. Paul argues that Jesus served and taught and healed and died for those who were sinners because they were essentially God's people, God's special ones, the holy nation, the ones set apart. As Jesus walked the streets and taught the crowds, he saw in each of them a sacred and holy child of God.

Gospel Reading, Mathew 9:36--10:8

Matthew has just told us of ten miracles Jesus performed; he has cured people both physically and spiritually. Jesus has "compassion" (9:36) on the "crowds" in their leaderless state, "like sheep without a shepherd"; he has announced that the completion of God's plan, his "harvest" (9:37), to return all to godliness, is about to begin. Now he instructs and commissions his disciples. The message of today's Scriptures is rather simple and to the point. God has moved toward us – and has loved us. God has reached out to nurture us, free us, and heal us through Jesus. We are lovable and good because God loves us and has chosen us as Jesus chose his apostles. Since Jesus loves the leaderless people, he chooses and sends the twelve apostles to awaken the people. He reminds the apostles that the harvest is very plentiful but the laborers are few. He instructs them to pray that the Lord will send laborers into His harvest.

Demonstration of God's mercy and compassion. Jesus

was moved with compassion at the world's pain and suffering, sorrow and grief, physical and spiritual hunger, isolation and loneliness, bewilderment and confusion. The Greek word used, esplanchnithe, expresses a compassion that springs from the deepest part of one's being, heartfelt compassion. Jesus' compassion for the crowds was based on his

perception that they were "harassed and helpless." Jesus uses two images to describe the common people of those days, namely, sheep without a shepherd and an abundant harvest in need of workers.

The Pharisees saw the common people as chaff to be destroyed and burned up. But Jesus saw them as a harvest to be reaped and saved. He realized that volunteers were needed to teach and heal the people because "The harvest is great, but the workers are few." and the people were "bewildered and dejected, like sheep who have no shepherd." (I Kgs 22:17; Jer 23:1-6; Ez 34:1-10; Mi 5:2-4). Jesus calls us to pray for common laborers in his Church. While God can use talented people, most kingdom-work is done by ordinary, nearly anonymous, behind-the-scenes disciples. The "sheep without a shepherd" are called the "the lost sheep of Israel," a phrase used by Moses when he transferred his authority to Joshua. This was a common

chose them, called them apostles, appointed them to be with him and sent them to villages and towns before he visited them as heralds to prepare them to receive his "good news." They were given his authority to love which included involvement in liberating people from the powers which oppressed them, whether physical or spiritual. The first instruction was: "Do not go out on the road to the Gentiles, and do not enter into any city of the Samaritans." This meant that they could not go north into Syria, east into the largely gentile Decapolis, or to south into Samaria. God wanted His Chosen people to hear the Gospel first. Besides, the apostles were not well-trained for preaching to the Gentiles. Thirdly, as a wise commander Jesus limited his objectives and refused to diffuse and dissipate his forces.

Message to be preached. 1) The preaching mission: "As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" The Kingdom of God is intended to be a society on earth, where God's will is as perfectly done

as it is in heaven. Since Jesus was, and is, the only person who ever perfectly did, and obeyed, and fulfilled God's will as it is done in heaven, the apostles were to invite people to see how their long expected "kingdom of God" was made visible and tangible in Jesus of Nazareth.

2) The healing mission: "Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, and

drive out demons." The Apostles have to convince the people that Christ came to give physical healing of bodies from diseases and spiritual healing of souls from sins. The spiritually dead are resurrected and revitalized by the *Good News* preached to them. Cleansing the lepers includes the actual healing of leprosy, as well as the cleansing the polluting influence of sins from minds and heart. Casting out demons also included liberating people from their evil habits and addictions which led them to sin.

Free use of the God-given talents: "Freely you have received;" says Jesus, "freely give." A Rabbi was bound by law to give his teaching freely and for nothing. The Rabbi was absolutely forbidden to take money for teaching the Law which Moses had received without cost from God. Jesus' instructions mean that the man of God must show by his attitude to material things that his first interest is God. But Jesus adds that the workman deserves his sustenance. Although a Jewish rabbi was not expected to accept payment, it was considered at once a privilege and an obligation to support a Rabbi, if he were truly a man of God. What Jesus really means is that a man of God must never be overly concerned with material things. At the same time the people of God must never fail in their duty to see that the man of God receives a reasonable support. Missionaries are to depend on the local hospitality of "worthy" (10:11) people, i.e., those in favor with God, and to "greet" (10:12)

them with the peace of God.



Life Messages

1. Be Jesus-Presenters: Like Homer Sewell who presents Abraham Lincoln, we also have an "association" of Jesus-Presenters which we call the Church. From this Body we each get guidance, encouragement, discipline, and inspiration to project the same person -- Christ Jesus and his "Good News," not in costume but in living out the Faith God has given us. Jesus continues to be active in our lives through the Bible and the Sacraments. He has promised that he will do whatever we ask in his name, meaning that he will answer us when we ask for help in revealing the power and character of God. In addition, the Lord God gives us the Holy Spirit, the One Who teaches us, and reminds us of all that Jesus has said to us. We are invited to become one with God and Jesus, and to let the Holy Spirit work through us. We are asked to perform the works of Jesus, and through these works to reveal the power and character of God to the world. If we accept this invitation and act on it, with God's grace people will look at us and say, "Jesus"

2. Be healers in the modern world: People can be sick in body as well as in mind. As Christian's sharing Jesus' mission, we can bring healing and wholeness to people with whom we come into contact. Although we cannot raise the dead, we can help people to recover interest and a zest for living. People can be physically alive but dead in many other respects. Cleansing the lepers means rehabilitating and bringing back fully into our communities all those who, for one reason or another, are marginalized, rejected, despised -- ostracized on the basis of race, nationality, marital status, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. In our day, demons act through all those suffocating and enslaving forces which dominate, manipulate, and restrict our freedom to live in truth and love. They include many elements of our contemporary society: the pressures to conform to what is in fashion, whether it be in clothes, activities, food, or drugs of all kinds, both prescribed and non-prescribed, and to bend to the active and attractive tendencies to hedonism, extreme individualism, greed, addictions, and violence of all kinds which mark the modern world, particularly in the West. Our abortion/euthanasia/divorce/litigation culture of death is simply one of the symptoms and effects of all this. We have to start by casting out these

demons from our own hearts first before helping others to true liberation.

- 3. "You received without payment; give without payment." Every thing we have is a gift of God. God's gifts to us are literally priceless, and the rest of these is Faith. All these gifts are meant to be used freely and liberally for the benefit of all. We are not in the business of sharing our Faith for the money or the admiration it brings. To paraphrase President John Kennedy: "Ask not what others can do for you; but what you can do for others." But God's freely given gifts must be used with care and responsibility. Exercised wisely, they can bring great joy and peace in life. They can be a means to care for others. We must always remember that our good works, the things in which we take pride, ultimately find their source in Christ, not in us.
- 4. Pray for priests who carry God's people on "eagle's wings.' Priests are with us at all the most important moments in our lives -- Baptism, marriage, forgiveness of sins, celebration of the Eucharist, sickness, death. Every priest could tell you personal stories of times when he prayed with the sick and they improved, or the times when he anointed the sick and they received new strength. Every priest could tell you many personal stories about the many people he helped when they were going through a difficult time. Every priest has helped to heal broken lives and has given encouragement. Every priest has been surprised to see the power of Jesus work mysteriously through him. Hence Bishops, priests, and deacons are in need of our prayer because they, too, have the same human limitations and weaknesses and temptations as everyone. When was the last time we prayed for Bishops, priests, or deacons? If we don't pray for them, why are we surprised if there are scandals? Bishops, priests, and deacons cannot survive without our prayers. Here are Bishop Sheen's words to priests, "You have souls at your fingertips." It is a question of praying to the Lord to give the Bishops, priests, and deacons the energy and enthusiasm to bring them in. We need to pray also for future priests as instructed by Jesus in today's Gospel by praying for an increase in the quality and quantity of those responding to the Holy Spirit's vocational call to priesthood and the religious life.


If you still have not had the opportunity to turn your pledge in, please do so by mailing it to the rectory office, delivering it to the office, or dropping it in the offertory basket.



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


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
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
