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Feast of the Assumption

When the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to Lucia, Francisco, and Jacinta on May 13, 1917, at Fatima, one of the first things she said was, "I come from heaven." Yes, she came down from heaven to visit those children. However, before she was in heaven, she was down here on earth like us. But she was taken up to heaven at the end of her earthly life.

Port Austin, Michigan, nine miles away from my home. I go to this church every year on that day to do honor to our Lady. It should be remembered that the Catholics do not worship the Virgin Mary; they worship only God. But they venerate Mary and pray to her."

Carl Jung (1875-1961) was a world-renowned Swiss psychiatrist who founded analytical psychology. Though

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary was declared a dogma of the Catholic Church on November 1950 by Pope Pius XII. When the Pope declared the Assumption as a dogma, he gave the following reasons: uninterrupted tradition about Mary's Assumption starting from the first century, the belief expressed in all the ancient liturgies of the Church, negative evi-

dence of the absence and veneration of a tomb of Mary, and the possibility of the bodily assumption of Enoch (Genesis 5:24) and Elijah (II Kings 2:1).

The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes the Assumption of the Virgin Mary in the following way: "Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly

glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death. The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians" (CCC# 966).

Even though Protestants, in general, do not accept the Assumption of the Virgin Mary, there have been changes in the attitude of many Protestants over the years. For example, the Anglican and Catholic theologians found common ground for belief in Assumption in their report in 2005, which said, "We can affirm together the teaching that God has taken the Blessed Virgin Mary in the fullness of her person into his glory as consonant with Scripture and that it can, indeed, only be understood in the light of Scripture. Roman Catholics can recognize that this teaching about Mary is contained in the dogma."

William Lyon Phelps (1865-1943) was a scholar, critic, and syndicated columnist who taught American and European literature at Harvard and Yale Universities. His writings had a significant impact on the American literary tastes of his time. Once, he wrote a column in a newspaper on the Assumption in which he said, "Although I am not a Catholic, I always attend a Catholic Church on this feast of the Assumption. Since 1928, the nearest Catholic Church to where I live in August is

Port Austin, Michigan, nine miles away from my home. I go to this church every year on that day to do honor to our Lady. It should be remembered that the Catholics do not worship the Virgin Mary; they worship only God. But they venerate Mary and pray to her." Carl Jung (1875-1961) was a world-renowned Swiss psychiatrist who founded analytical psychology. Though he was not a believer, he was sympathetic to the teachings of Christianity. In his book, *Answer to Job* (1952), Jung talks about the declaration of the dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary as the most important religious event since the Protestant Reformation. Referring to the Assumption of the Blessed Mother, he writes, "One could have known for a long time that there has been a deep longing in the masses

for an intercessor and mediatrix who would, at last, take her place alongside the Holy Trinity and be received as the Queen of heaven and Bride at the heavenly court. For more than a thousand years, it has been taken for granted that the Mother of God dwelt there."

Jung was primarily looking at the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary from the perspective of our need for a Mother in Heaven to intercede for us. However, by do-

ing so, he genuinely acknowledged the reality of the Assumption of the Blessed Mother. We know through our faith that the Blessed Mother is always interceding for us in heaven before the Blessed Trinity. And her primary prayer is that we all receive the grace to join her in heaven to praise and glorify God for all eternity.

Hence, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a reminder for us that she is unceasingly praying for us in heaven. This should give us the confidence to ask her for her intercession daily so that we will reach heaven one day. Our Lady of the Assumption, pray for us.

Fiesta de la Asunción

Cuando la Santísima Virgen María se apareció a Lucía, Francisco y Jacinta el 13 de mayo de 1917 en Fátima, una de las primeras cosas que dijo fue: "Vengo del cielo". Sí, ella bajó del cielo para visitar a esos niños. Sin embargo, antes de estar en el cielo, estuvo aquí en la tierra como nosotros. Pero ella fue llevada al cielo al final de su vida terrenal.

La Asunción de la Santísima Virgen María fue declarada dogma de la Iglesia Católica en noviembre de 1950 por el Papa Pío XII. Cuando el Papa declaró la Asunción como dogma, dio las siguientes razones: tradición ininterrumpida sobre la Asunción de María desde el siglo I, creencia expresada en todas las liturgias antiguas de la

Iglesia, evidencia negativa de la ausencia y veneración de una tumba de María, y la posibilidad de la asunción corporal de Enoc (Génesis 5:24) y Elías (Il Reyes 2:1).

El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica describe la Asunción de la Virgen María de la siguiente manera:

"Finalmente la Virgen Inmaculada, preservada libre de toda mancha del pecado original, cuando terminó el curso de su vida terrena, fue arrebatada en cuerpo y alma a gloria celestial, y exaltada por el Señor como Reina sobre todas las cosas, a fin de ser más plenamente conformada con

su Hijo, Señor de los señores y vencedor del pecado y de la muerte.La Asunción de la Santísima Virgen es una singular participación en la vida de su Hijo. Resurrección y anticipación de la resurrección de los demás cristianos» (CIC# 966).

Aunque los Protestantes, en general, no aceptan la Asunción de la Virgen María, ha habido cambios en la actitud de muchos Protestantes a lo largo de los años. Por ejemplo, los teólogos Anglicanos y Católicos encontraron un terreno común para creer en la Asunción en su informe de 2005, que decía: "Podemos afirmar juntos la enseñanza de que Dios ha tomado a la Santísima Virgen María en la plenitud de su persona en su gloria como consonante con la Escritura y que, de hecho, sólo puede entenderse a la luz de la Escritura. William Lyon Phelps (1865-1943) fue un erudito, crítico y columnista sindicado que enseñó literatura Estadounidense y Europea en las universidades de Harvard y Yale. Una vez, escribió una columna en un periódico sobre la Asunción en la que decía: "Aunque no soy Católico, siempre asisto a una Iglesia Católica en esta fiesta de la Asunción. Carl Jung (1875-1961) fue un psiquiatra Suizo de renombre mundial que fundó la psicología analítica. Aunque no era creyente, simpatizaba con las enseñanzas del Cristianismo. En su libro Respuesta a Job (1952), Jung habla de la declaración del dogma de la Asunción de la Santísima Virgen María como el evento religioso más importante desde la Reforma Protestante. Refiriéndose a la Asunción de la Santísima Madre, escribe: "Uno podría haber

sabido durante mucho tiempo que había un profundo anhelo en las masas por una intercesora y mediadora que, por fin, tomaría su lugar junto a la Santísima Trinidad y ser recibida como Reina del cielo y Ésposa en la corte celestial. Durante más de mil años, se ha dado por sentado que la Madre de Dios habitaba allí".

Jung miraba principalmente la Asunción de la Santísima Virgen María desde la perspectiva de nuestra necesidad de una Madre en el Cielo que interceda por nosotros. Sin embargo, al hacerlo, reconoció genuinamente la

realidad de la Asunción de la Santísima Madre. Sabemos por nuestra fe que la Santísima Madre siempre está intercediendo por nosotros en el cielo ante la Santísima Trinidad. Y su oración principal es que todos recibamos la gracia de unirnos a ella en el cielo para alabar y glorificar a Dios por toda la eternidad.

Por lo tanto, la Asunción de la Santísima Virgen María es un recordatorio para nosotros de que ella ora sin cesar por nosotros en el cielo. Esto debería darnos la confianza para pedirle diariamente su intercesión para que algún día lleguemos al cielo. Nuestra Señora de la Asunción, ruega por nosotros.

Festa da Assunção

Quando a Santíssima Virgem Maria apareceu a Lúcia, Francisco e Jacinta a 13 de Maio de 1917, em Fátima, uma das primeiras coisas que disse foi: "Venho do céu". Sim, ela desceu do céu para visitar estas crianças. No entanto, antes de estar no céu, ela estava aqui na terra como nós. Mas ela foi levada para o céu no final da sua vida terrena.

A Assunção da Santíssima Virgem Maria foi declarada dogma da Igreja Católica em Novembro de 1950 pelo Papa Pio XII. Quando o Papa declarou a Assunção como um dogma, ele deu as seguintes razões: tradição ininterrupta sobre a Assunção de Maria a partir do século I, a crença expressa em todas as liturgias antigas da Igreja, evidência negativa da ausência e veneração do túmulo de Maria, e a possibilidade da assunção corporal de Enoque (Gênesis 5:24) e Elias (II Reis 2:1).

O Catecismo da Igreja Católica descreve a Assunção da Virgem Maria da seguinte maneira: «Finalmente, a Virgem Imaculada, preservada de toda a mancha de pecado original, terminado o curso da sua vida terrena, foi levada em corpo e alma à glória celeste e exaltada pelo Senhor como Rainha sobre todas as coisas, para que fosse mais plenamente em conformidade com o seu Filho, o Senhor dos senhores e

conquistador do pecado e da morte. A Assunção da Santíssima Virgem é uma participação singular na Ressurreição do seu Filho e uma antecipação da ressurreição de outros Cristãos» (CCC# 966).

Embora os Protestantes, em geral, não aceitem a Assunção da Virgem Maria, houve mudanças na atitude de muitos Protestantes ao longo dos anos. Por exemplo, os teólogos Anglicanos e Católicos encontraram uma área comum para a crença na Assunção no seu relatório de 2005, que dizia: "Podemos afirmar juntos o ensinamento de que Deus levou a Santíssima Virgem Maria na plenitude da sua pessoa para a sua glória como consoante com a Escritura e que ela só pode, de facto, ser entendida à luz das Escrituras. Os Católicos Romanos podem reconhecer que este ensinamento sobre Maria está contido no dogma."

William Lyon Phelps (1865-1943) foi um erudito, crítico e colunista sindicalizado que ensinou literatura Americana e Europeia nas universidades de Harvard e Yale. Os seus escritos tiveram um impacto significativo nos gostos literários Americanos do seu tempo. Certa vez, ele escreveu um artigo num jornal sobre a Assunção na qual disse: "Embora eu não seja Católico, sempre frequento uma Igreja Católica na festa da Assunção. Desde 1928, a Igreja Católica mais próxima de onde moro no mês de Agosto é Port Austin, Michigan, a nove quilômetros de distância da minha

casa. Eu vou a esta igreja todos os anos nesse dia para fazer honra a Nossa Senhora. É de lembrar que os católicos não adoram a Virgem Maria; eles adoram sómente a Deus. Mas veneram Maria e rezam a ela."

Carl Jung (1875-1961) foi um psiquiatra Suíço de renome mundial que fundou a psicologia analítica. Embora não fosse crente, era simpático aos ensinamentos do Cristianismo. No seu livro, Resposta a Jó (1952), Jung fala sobre a declaração do dogma da Assunção da Santíssima Virgem Maria como o evento religioso mais importante desde a Reforma Protestante. Referindo-se à Assunção da Santíssima Mãe, ele escreve: "Poder-se-ia saber há muito tempo que havia um profundo anseio nas massas por uma intercessora e medianeira que, finalmente, tomasse seu lugar ao lado da Santíssima Trindade e fosse recebida como Rainha

do céu e Esposa na corte celestial. Durante mais de mil anos, foi dado como certo que a Mãe de Deus ali habitava."

Jung repara principalmente para a Assunção da Santíssima Virgem Maria a partir da perspectiva da nossa necessidade de uma Mãe no Céu para interceder por nós. No entanto, ao fazê-lo, reconheceu genuinamente a realidade da Assunção da Santíssima Mãe. Sabemos, pela nossa fé, que a Santíssima Mãe

está sempre intercedendo por nos no céu diante da Santíssima Trindade. E a sua oração principal é que todos nos recebamos a graça de nos juntarmos a Ela no céu para louvar e glorificar Deus por toda a eternidade.

Por isso, a Assunção da Santíssima Virgem Maria recorda-nos que Ela reza incessantemente por nós no céu. Isso deve dar-nos a confiança para pedir-lhe diáriamente a sua intercessão para que um dia cheguemos ao céu. Nossa Senhora da Assunção, rogai por nós.

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, 1 Kings 19:9a, 11-13a; Romans 9:1-5; Mathew 14:22-33

God's Saving Presence in the Storms of Life

Introduction

The readings for this week speak of God's saving presence for His people and the need for trusting faith in a loving and providing God Who always keeps us company. The first reading tells us of how Elijah the prophet who had defeated the 450 false priests of Baal with the help of just such a trusting Faith in the power of Yahweh (then had to flee for his life), encountered the Lord God on Horeb. In the Responsorial Psalm (Ps 85), the Psalmist assures us, "Near indeed is His Salvation to those who fear Him, glory dwelling in our land." In the second reading, Paul laments and mourns over the Jews who,

having lost their Faith in Yahweh and His prophets, had rejected their promised Messiah, Jesus. The Gospel episode explains how Peter lost his trusting Faith in Jesus for a few seconds, failed his attempt to walk on water, but was rescued when he called on Jesus for help.

bled him to defeat and execute the 450 pagan priests of promise of God to Abraham would not go unfulfilled. Baal on Mount Carmel (1 Kgs. 18:16-40). Consequently, Queen Jezebel sent murderous henchmen after the prophet. Elijah, sustained by food provided by God through an angel, fled for forty days and nights. He finally reached Horeb, the mountain where God had earlier established His covenant with Israel under Moses. Elijah might have expected a spectacular miracle from God to protect and vindicate him, or an appearance of God with great power in thunder and lightning to bolster his Faith, like the one Moses had been granted on that very spot (Exodus 19:16-19). However, the presence of God was not in the spectacles of thunder, earthquake or fire but in "a tiny whispering sound." Elijah acknowledged God's presence by covering his face and coming out of the cave where he had taken shelter. He was controlled God's quiet sign of His presence, and was consoled, trusting that his God was helping and protecting him. Like Elijah, we can miss God's presence by limiting our



experience of Him to certain places and persons and forgetting that He is everywhere. The first reading reminds us that we have to experience God's presence in our lives and listen carefully to everything going on around us, because we encounter God in insignificant as well as spectacular events. Failure, as well as success, offers us the opportunity for growth in trusting Faith in a loving and providing God.

Second Reading, **Romans 9:1-5**

In the first eight chapters of his letter to the Romans, Paul describes the

Have you ever read the entire Bible or the entire Catechism? Does that seem too intimidating? Last year, Fr. Mike Schmitz, a Campus Minister in Duluth, Minnesota, THE BIBLE created a podcast series, "The Bible in a INAYEAR Year," that takes you through the entire

Fr. Mike Schmitz Bible in 365 days. Each podcast runs between 20 - 30 minutes.

This year, he has a new podcast, "The Catechism in a Year." Both follow a similar format – he provides a short introduction, reads from the Bible or Catechism, and then gives some thoughts, reflections, and explanations on what was just read. One avid listener, who is listening to the Bible podcasts for the second time around, remarked how beautifully Fr. Mike connects the Old Testament to the New Testament.

There is no cost, and you can listen at your own pace. There are two basic ways to listen. The first is to use a podcast app. We use *Castbox*, but it looks like the Audible app carries it as well. There may be others that work. Search for the series name (e.g., "Bible in a Year") and add it to your library. The second way is through YouTube. Search for and subscribe to the channel for the series you wish. YouTube runs all devices phones, computers, tablets, and smart TVs. Another advantage to YouTube is that the text of what Fr. Mike is saying is displayed as he speaks. I love that as I can absorb the information better. These podcast series are another great way to deepen your faith!

Decline to Sign Petitions for Dangerous **Pro-Abortion Ballot Initiative**

An extremely grave initiative is underway in Florida that seeks to erase Pro-Life protections by banning government regulation of abortion in our state constitution. A network of abortion activists are working to gather petition signatures to have a pro-abortion constitutional amendment placed on the statewide ballot in the November 2024 election. In order to do so, they need nearly 900,000 thousand signatures and are working right now in communities across Florida to collect them.

This amendment is deeply concerning because it will allow all abortions to be obtained until viability and includes a broad "health" loophole, essentially allowing abortion on demand up to birth. The amendment would hinder the Florida Legislature's ability to protect women and children from abortion. It could also naturally nullify current laws requiring parental consent before minors obtain abortions and a 24-hour waiting period prior to abortions, as well as the 15-week and 16-week abortion laws recently passed by the legislature.

Floridians should not sign the petition. Declining to sign is not impeding the democratic process; it is taking a stand against what would be a terrible state policy. The FCCB is following developments in the initiative process closely and diligently preparing to help defeat it. Continue your prayers for the protection of the Unborn and spread the word to your spheres of influence.
