

Helpers Along the Way

I Am David is a novel by Danish journalist Anne Holm (1922-1998). First published in Danish in 1963, this novel became an instant bestseller and has been translated into several languages, including English, German, French, and Konkani. By the time Anne died in 1998, two million copies of this book were sold worldwide. Walden Media of America made a movie under the same name in 2003.

The story begins in the aftermath of World War II in a concentration camp, presumably in Bulgaria. It revolves around 12-year-old David, who was taken from his mother and put in a concentration camp as a toddler. He has no recollections of anything outside the concentration camp. He was told the guards had killed his parents.

Ever since he came to the dreadful camp, fellow prisoner Johannes became his friend and guardian. However, he died of heart failure, leaving David alone. In the meantime, a guard was secretly helping him to stay healthy and safe. This guard orchestrated David's escape from the camp, giving him directions to Denmark. He did so because he was in love with David's mother, whom he had allowed to escape earlier. However, he did not tell her the whereabouts of David since she rejected his love.

As directed by the guard, David escaped from the camp in the dead of night and got into a truck going to Salonica in Greece. From there, he sneaked into a freighter going to Italy. However, a sailor found him hiding in the cargo hold. Instead of bringing him to the attention of the authorities, this kind-hearted sailor helped him escape when they arrived near Italy. With the lifebelt the sailor gave, David swam to safety.

David was out in the world for the first time in his life. When the people of the town he first reached began questioning him, he walked to the north to get to Milan. During this hazardous journey, some people helped him with food and money. While he received help from others, he also found opportunities to help others. Once, he saved a girl named Maria from a fire that accidentally broke out in a shed. This girl's family invited him to stay with them for a while. While he enjoyed staying with them, mainly because he became fond of Maria, David left them as he saw tensions rising in the family because of his presence.

His destination was Copenhagen, Denmark. So, he crossed to Switzerland from Italy, where he met Sophie, an artist who befriended him to do his portrait. Later, while having lunch with her, he noticed the picture of a woman who had written a book about her escape from the concentration camp. As Sophie narrated

the story of this escape, he realized it was his mother.

Without wasting time, he continued his journey to Denmark. On the way, a farmer exploited him when he sought food and shelter during winter. However, he broke free from him and finally reached Copenhagen, crossing East Germany. Finding his mother's address in a telephone directory, he knocked at his mother's door, who instantly recognized him as her son David. It was a reunion against all odds.

Our journey in life is often challenging and dangerous. Unless we receive help from others, we will never make it. Fortunately, we always come across helpers along the way, as David did during his long trip from the concentration camp to his mother's home. Of course, David had gone through hell in the concentration camp. However, even there, David had help from others, including Johannes and the guard. Through their support, he survived the perils of the concentration camp and found his way to freedom.

We all need helpers along the way as we journey through life, especially when facing severe challenges, hardships, and disappointments. This is a reminder that we should become helpers for others along the way, as seen in the life of David. While he received help from many on the road to freedom, he also did his share of helping people

along the way.

American author Fred Rogers writes, "We live in a world in which we need to share responsibility. It's easy to say, 'It's not my child, not my community, not my world, not my problem.' Then, there are those who see the need and respond. I consider those people my heroes." The whole world needs more heroes of this kind as most people continue to struggle through life.

Ayudantes En El camino

Yo Soy David es una novela de la periodista Danesa Anne Holm (1922-1998). Publicada por primera vez en Danés en 1963, esta novela se convirtió instantáneamente en un éxito de ventas y ha sido traducida a varios idiomas, incluidos Inglés, Alemán, Francés y Konkani. Cuando Anne murió en 1998, se habían vendido dos millones de copias de este libro en todo el mundo. Walden Media of America hizo una película con el mismo nombre en 2003.

La historia comienza después de la Segunda Guerra Mundial en un campo de concentración, presumiblemente en Bulgaria. Gira en torno a David, de 12 años, que fue separado de su madre y enviado a un campo de concentración cuando era un niño. No recuerda nada fuera del campo de concentración. Le dijeron que los guardias habían matado a sus padres.

Desde que llegó al terrible campo, su compañero de prisión Johannes se convirtió en su amigo y tutor. Sin embargo, murió de insuficiencia cardíaca, dejando a David solo. Mientras tanto, un guardia lo ayudaba en secreto a mantenerse sano y seguro. Este guardia orquestó la fuga de David del campo y le dio indicaciones para llegar a Dinamarca. Lo hizo porque estaba enamorado de la madre de David, a quien había dejado escapar antes. Sin embargo, él no le dijo el paradero de David ya que ella rechazó su amor.

Siguiendo las instrucciones del guardia, David escapó del campamento en plena noche y se subió a un camión que se dirigía a Salónica, en Grecia. Desde allí se coló en un carguero con destino a Italia. Sin embargo, un marinero lo encontró escondido en la bodega de carga. En lugar de llamar la atención de las autoridades sobre él, este marinero de buen corazón lo ayudó a escapar cuando llegaron cerca de Italia. Con el cinturón salvavidas que le dio el marinero, David nadó hasta un lugar seguro.

David salió al mundo por primera vez en su vida. Cuando la gente del pueblo al que llegó por primera vez comenzó a interrogarlo, caminó hacia el norte para llegar a Milán. Durante este peligroso viaje, algunas personas lo ayudaron con comida y dinero. Si bien recibió ayuda de otros, también encontró oportunidades para ayudar a otros. Una vez salvó a una niña llamada María de un incendio que se produjo accidentalmente en un cobertizo. La familia de esta niña lo invitó a quedarse con ellos por un tiempo. Si bien disfrutaba quedarse con ellos, principalmente porque se encariñó con María, David los dejó al ver que aumentaban las tensiones en la familia debido a su presencia.

Sin perder tiempo, continuó su viaje hacia Dinamarca. En el camino, un granjero lo explotó cuando buscaba

comida y refugio durante el invierno. Sin embargo, se liberó de él y finalmente llegó a Copenhague, atravesando Alemania del Este. Al encontrar la dirección de su madre en una guía telefónica, llamó a la puerta de su madre, quien al instante lo reconoció como su hijo David. Fue un reencuentro contra todo pronóstico.

Nuestro viaje en la vida es a menudo desafiante y peligroso. A menos que recibamos ayuda de otros, nunca lo lograremos. Afortunadamente, siempre nos encontramos con ayudantes en el camino, como le ocurrió a David durante su largo viaje desde el campo de concentración hasta la casa de su madre. Por supuesto, David había pasado por un infierno en el campo de concentración. Sin embargo, incluso allí, David contó con la ayuda de otros, incluidos Johannes y el guardia. Gracias a su apoyo, sobrevivió a los peligros del campo de concentración y encontró el camino hacia la libertad.

Todos necesitamos ayuda en el camino de la vida, especialmente cuando enfrentamos desafíos, dificultades y decepciones severas. Este es un recordatorio de que debemos convertirnos en ayudantes para los demás a lo largo del camino, como se vio en la vida de David. Si bien recibió ayuda de muchos en el camino hacia la libertad, también hizo su parte para ayudar a las personas en el camino.

El autor Americano, Fred Rogers, escribe: "Vivimos en un mundo en el que necesitamos compartir la responsabilidad. Es fácil decir: 'No es mi hijo, ni mi comunidad, ni mi mundo, ni mi problema'. Ajudantes ao longo do Caminho

I Am David é um romance da jornalista Dinamarquesa Anne Holm (1922-1998). Publicado pela primeira vez em Dinamarquês em 1963, este romance tornou-se imediatamente um best-seller e foi traduzido para várias línguas, incluindo Inglês, Alemão, Francês e Konkani. Quando Anne morreu, em 1998, dois milhões de cópias deste livro foram vendidas em todo o mundo. Walden Media of America fez um filme com o mesmo nome em 2003.

A história começa depois da Segunda Guerra Mundial num campo de concentração, presumivelmente na Bulgária. É acerca de David, de 12 anos, que foi tirado de sua mãe e colocado num campo de concentração quando era criança. Não se lembra de nada fora do campo de concentração. Foi-lhe dito que os guardas tinham morto os seus pais.

Desde que chegou ao terrível campo, o prisioneiro Johannes tornou-se seu amigo e guardião. No entanto, ele morreu de ataque cardíaco, deixando David sózinho. Entretanto, um guarda ajudou-o secretamente a manter-se saudável e seguro. Este guarda orquestrou a fuga de David do campo, dando-lhe instruções para a Dinamarca. Fê-lo porque estava apaixonado pela mãe de David, a quem deixara escapar mais cedo. No entanto, ele não lhe contou o paradeiro de David, uma vez que ela rejeitou o seu amor.

Conforme indicado pelo guarda, David escapou do acampamento durante a noite e entrou num camião que ia para Salônica, na Grécia. De lá, ele entrou sorrateiramente num cargueiro indo para a Itália. No entanto, um marinheiro encontrou-o escondido no porão de carga. Em vez de o levar ao conhecimento das autoridades, este marinheiro de bom coração ajudou-o a escapar quando chegaram perto de Itália. Com o cinto salva-vidas que o marinheiro lhe deu, David nadou em segurança.

David estava no mundo pela primeira vez na sua vida. Quando as pessoas da cidade onde ele chegou começaram a questioná-lo, ele caminhou para o norte para chegar a Milão. Durante esta perigosa viagem, algumas pessoas ajudaram-no com comida e dinheiro. Ao mesmo tempo em que recebia ajuda de outras pessoas, ele também encontrava oportunidades de ajudar os outros. Uma vez, ele salvou uma menina chamada Maria de um incêndio que acidentalmente começou num anexo da sua casa. A família desta rapariga convidou-o para ficar com eles durante algum tempo. Embora gostasse de ficar com eles, principalmente porque gostava de Maria, David deixou-os ao ver as tensões aumentarem na família por causa da sua presença.

O seu destino era Copenhaga, na Dinamarca. Assim, atravessou a Itália para a Suíça, onde conheceu Sophie, uma pintora que fez amizade com ele para fazer o seu retrato. Mais tarde, enquanto almoçava com ela,

reparou na imagem de uma mulher que tinha escrito um livro sobre a sua fuga do campo de concentração. Quando Sophie narrou a história dessa fuga, ele percebeu que era sua mãe.

Sem perder tempo, continuou a sua viagem até à Dinamarca. No caminho, um agricultor explorou-o quando ele pediu comida e abrigo durante o inverno. No entanto, ele libertou-se dele e finalmente chegou a Copenhague, atravessando a Alemanha Oriental. Ao encontrar o endereço de sua mãe numa lista telefónica, ele bateu à porta de sua mãe, que instantaneamente o reconheceu como seu filho David. Foi um reencontro contra todas as probabilidades.

A nossa jornada na vida é muitas vezes desafiadora e perigosa. Sem a ajuda dos outros, nunca conseguimos fazê-lo. Felizmente, sempre nos deparamos com ajudantes ao longo do caminho, como David fez durante a sua longa viagem do campo de concentração até a casa da sua mãe. É claro que David tinha passado pelo inferno no campo de concentração. No entanto, mesmo lá, David teve ajuda de outras pessoas, incluindo Johannes e o guarda. Através do seu apoio, sobreviveu os perigos do campo de concentração e encontrou o seu caminho para a liberdade.

Todos nós precisamos de ajudantes ao longo do caminho enquanto viajamos pela vida, especialmente quando enfrentamos grandes desafios, dificuldades e decepções. Este é um lembrete de que devemos tornar-nos ajudantes para com os outros ao longo do caminho, como visto na vida de David. Embora tivesse recebido ajuda de muitos no caminho para a liberdade, ele também fez a sua parte ao ajudar as pessoas ao longo do caminho.

O autor americano Fred Rogers escreve: "Vivemos num mundo em que precisamos de partilhar responsabilidades. É fácil dizer: 'Não é meu filho, não é minha comunidade, não é meu mundo, não é meu problema'. Depois, há quem veja a necessidade e responda. Considero essas pessoas meus heróis." O mundo inteiro precisa de mais heróis deste tipo, pois a maioria das pessoas continua a lutar ao longo da vida.

Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Isaiah 55:6-9; Philippians 1:20c-24, 27a; Mathew 20:1-16a

God's Generosity

Introduction Today's readings are all about the human sense of justice contrasted with the extravagant grace of a merciful and compassionate God. God rewards us, not in the measure of what we do, but according to our need and His good will. In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah reminds the exiles in Babylon that their God is more merciful than they are, and more forgiving. He is ready to pardon the infidelity which has resulted in their exile. Their merciful God will bless them with material and spiritual blessings. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 145) reminds us that, although "the Lord is just in all his ways," He is at the same time "gracious and merciful." In the second reading, Paul offers himself as an example of total submission, aided by God's grace, to His will. Paul is ready to live continuing his mission, or to die and join the Lord, whichever is God's will. There is Gospel or Good News in today's Gospel parable.

Today's Gospel tells us that it's never too late for God. A full wage is offered to each of us, whether one has served Him for a whole lifetime, or has turned to Him only at the eleventh hour. This story of the landlord's love and generosity represents God's love and generosity to us. The story shows us how God looks at us, sees our needs, and meets those needs. The question in God's mind is not, "How much do these people deserve?" but, "How can I help them? How can I save them before they perish?" It is all about grace and blessings. God's provisions for our spiritual lives will never run out, and when we share our blessings with others, we tap into the inexhaustible Divine supply.

First Reading, Isaiah 55:6-9


Prophet Isaiah reminds his people that if they really look at the circumstances of their lives, they will recognize God's hand in them. Chapters 40-55 of Isaiah record prophecies spoken about the end of the Babylonian captivity of the people of Judah, when they would return from enslavement to a devastated homeland. The

words were meant to give them Hope and to keep them from losing Faith in God. The whole of Chapter 55 promises both material and spiritual relief. Isaiah reminds the people that it was their years of ignoring their Covenant with God which had brought their world crashing down around them, leaving their cities destroyed, their Temple razed, their wealth pillaged, and their hopes dashed. But because of God's great love and mercy, His chosen people were to be forgiven. They would return home, their land would be restored to them, and their relationship with God would be reestablished. Isaiah reminds us that the God of Moses and of the prophets doesn't think in the same way that we do. God is more merciful than we are and more forgiving. As the Lord God says, through Isaiah "'My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways,' says the Lord." Perhaps we would have a better world if we were to adopt some of God's ways instead of asking questions like, "Why should the innocent suffer?" or "Why should cruel tyrants live and prosper?" or "Why should there be world-wide medical scourges like the Covid-19 pandemic?" Our Faith teaches us that, as a loving Father, God does and permits only that which is for our greater good. God is always near to us in this life, and if we remain near to Him on this earth, we can trust in His love and goodness to keep us near Him forever in Heaven.

Second Reading, Philippians 1:20-24,27

St. Paul wrote his letter to the Philippians either from a prison cell in Rome (AD 61-63), or possibly from Ephesus (AD 56). Paul was a latecomer in God's vineyard, preaching the Gospel. But he worked with zeal and interest to spread God's News of Redemption and Salvation for all. Philippi was a very privileged city of Macedonia and the site of the first Christian church in Europe. Although far from Rome, it was given the status of a Roman city. Its people didn't have to pay taxes to Rome and the people dressed as Romans

And spoke the language of Rome. But Paul had told them that once they became followers of Jesus, their true citizenship was not in Rome, but in Heaven. Their ways were not to be Roman ways, but the way of the Gospel. The Philippians had received the Gospel from Paul eagerly, and they supported him on his further missionary travels. So, he was very grateful, and his epistle gives them mature Pauline thought for a mature community, expressed in unusually personal terms. Today's passage is most intimate, indicating another difference between God's perspective and ours. Paul is trying to decide whether to prefer death (if he was in prison, he possibly faced execution), or life. In this reading, Paul speaks as one who has put on the mind of Christ. He says that he does not know whether he prefers to live or to die. The ordinary human point of view is one that greatly prefers life to death. But the perspective of God is different. Paul says that to die would be good because it would bring him into greater unity with Christ. On the other hand, to live would also be good because it would allow Paul to continue his work as an apostle. Having taken on the perspective of God, Paul is equally ready to live or die. Paul is an example of how grace operates. His own wishes are subordinated to the needs of the Philippians, and both Paul and the Philippians enjoy the privilege of believing in Christ and of suffering for him. Being a Christian means accepting God's word without explanation or justification. That is how "we conduct ourselves worthy of the Gospel of Christ."



Gospel Reading, Mathew 20:1-16a

The parable in today's Gospel is known as "the Parable of Workers in the Vineyard" or "the Parable of the Generous Landlord." Biblical scholar Daniel Harrington calls this "The Parable of the Good Employer" because the parable was probably addressed to Jesus' opponents who criticized him for preaching the Good News of the Kingdom to tax collectors and sinners. This remarkable and rather startling parable is found only in Matthew. It reminds us that although God owes us nothing, He gives abundantly what each person really needs.

Parable in a nutshell: The Kingdom of Heaven, says Jesus, is like landowner who goes out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. He rounds up a group at 6 am, agrees to pay them the usual daily wage and then puts them into action. At nine am, he rounds up another group. At noon, he recruits a third team, and then at three o'clock, a fourth. Finally, at 5 pm, he finds still more laborers who are willing and able to work. He sends them into the vineyard to do what they can before sundown. As the day ends, the landowner instructs his manager to pay one denarius each, the daily living wage, to all the workers, beginning with those who started at five in the afternoon. A. Aim of the parable: 1) To give a warning to the disciples: Jesus teaches his disciples not to claim any special honor or any special place because they are closely associated with him or because they are the first members of his Church. All the people, no matter when they come, are equally precious to God. Similarly, long-time Church

members should expect no special preference over recent members. (2) To give a definite warning to the Jews. As the chosen People of God, the Jews looked down upon the Gentiles. Jesus warns them that the Gentiles who put their Faith in God will have the same reward a good Jew may expect. Through this parable, Jesus intends to show the generosity of God in opening the doors of the Heavenly Kingdom to the repentant Gentiles and sinners on equal footing with the Jews. Matthew, by retelling this parable, may well desire to give the same warning to the members of his Judeo-Christian community who considered the converted Gentiles as second-class Christians. (3) To give Jesus' own explanation of His love for the publicans and sinners. Through this parable, Jesus describes, and reflects in his life, the loving concern, generosity, and mercy of God his Father for all His children.

B. Why this strange type of recruiting? The grapes ripened towards the end of September. It was the monsoon time of heavy rains. If the harvest were not finished before the rains started, the crop would be ruined. Hence, the vineyard owners recruited everyone willing to work, from the marketplace. The fact that some of them stood around until even 5 pm proves how desperately they wanted to support their families. One denarius or a drachma was the normal day's wage for a working man for his work from 6 am to 6 pm.

C. The seemingly unjust remuneration for work: This story illustrates the difference between God's perspective and ours. Perhaps it disturbs our sense of fairness and justice. We think of equal rights for all, or an honest day's work for an honest day's pay. Our sense of justice seems to favor the laborers who worked all day and expected a wage greater than that given to the latecomers. Perhaps most people would sympathize with the workers who had worked longer and seemingly deserved more. We can understand their complaint since, for most of us, salaries are linked to the number of hours of work. A skilled worker gets more than an unskilled worker. If workers have the same skills, the same hours of work and similar responsibilities, we expect them to get the same wages. But God does not see matters in the same way that we do. God thinks of justice in terms of people's dignity and their right to a decent life. In other words, God's perspective is that of the owner, who gave some of the laborers more than they earned. God's justice holds that the people who have come late have the same right to a living wage and decent life as those who have worked all day and, hence, all must be treated identically. We are laborers who have worked less than a full day. If God treated us justly, none of us would be rewarded. We have all been unfaithful to God in many ways; what we have earned from God is punishment. However, because God is generous rather than just, we all receive a full day's pay, even though we have not earned it. Jesus understood the value of all people, regardless of what the community thought of them. He gave all people equal value.

Hence, our challenge is to recognize and accept with gratitude God's Amazing Grace. We must remember that there is more to life than the logic of action and reward. There is the generosity of Life, that is, of the Trinitarian God, Who has made us His coworkers on this Earth of His.

D. Parable's teaching on the grace of God. This parable of the vineyard-workers illustrates very well our theology of grace and mercy. Pope Francis says: "The Church must be a place of mercy freely given, where everyone can feel welcomed, loved, forgiven, and encouraged to live the good life of the Gospel." The parable suggests that we can't work our way into Heaven, because by our own unaided strength we can never do enough natural good in this life to "earn" our everlasting reward, and because without His grace, we can do nothing of spiritual value. That is why God expects us to cooperate with His grace for doing good and avoiding evil. Salvation comes to us by God's grace and our cooperation with it, that is, by a blend of Faith and works. We are saved by receiving and using God's gifts of Faith, Hope, and Charity. At the same time, we are all in need of God's grace and forgiveness. Our justification comes from the grace of God. Grace is favor, the free and undeserved help that God gives us to respond to His call to become children of God, adoptive sons, partakers of the Divine Nature and of eternal life (CCC #1996). In God's Kingdom, we can be grateful that He chooses to be generous. What we really deserve for our sins is death. We learn also that in God's service we have different tasks to perform, and no matter how menial the task, we all get paid the same eternal reward. In God's eyes, we are all equal. At the end of the day, we are all paid the right amount. In the Church, we are all co-workers, and, hence, we all receive exactly what is right from a God Who is notoriously generous and lavish.

Paradox of grace: What really bothers us in the parable is God's equal rewarding of latecomers and newcomers. We are tempted to ask the question "Is it fair that we, the hard-working Christians, are going to be treated like these workers? Is the man who lives a life of sin but who converts on his deathbed going to get the same reward that we receive? Surely we must warrant at least a higher ranking in heaven on a cloud with the Apostle Paul or Moses or one of the

saints!" But the parable tells us that our Heavenly reward is not something we can "earn" because it is a free gift from God Who has made His rewards available to all who choose to receive His Gift of Faith in Christ Jesus. Is it fair that God offers and gives his grace to all? Fair is the wrong word. God does not deal with us "fairly" and it is a good thing -- we should be thankful God does not give us what we deserve! The word we are looking for is grace. The question should be "What is grace?" And the answer is, it is that "undeserved love" that God has shown us through the death and Resurrection of His only Son Jesus Christ. Robert Browning reminds us, "All service ranks the same with God: With God, whose puppets, best and worst, are we; there is no last or first." It is not the amount of service given, but the love with which it is given that matters. Those who carry out the will of God with love and humility will be acceptable before the Lord. So, Jesus says, "The first will be the last and the last will be the first."

Life messages

1. We need to follow God's example and show grace to our neighbor. When someone else is more successful than we are, let us assume that person needs it. When someone who does wrong fails to get caught, let us remember the many times we have done wrong and gotten off free. We must not wish pain on people for the sake of fairness, nor rejoice in their miseries when God allows them to suffer. We become envious of others because of our lack of generosity of heart. Envy should have no place in our lives. We cannot control, and dare not pass judgment on, the way God blesses others, only rejoice that He does so, just as He blesses us.

2. We need to express our gratitude to God in our daily lives. God personally calls each of us to our own ministry and shows us His care by giving us His grace and eternal salvation. To God, we are more than just numbers on a payroll. Our call to God's vineyard is a free gift from Him for which we can never be sufficiently thankful. All our talents and blessings are freely given by God. Hence, we should express our gratitude to God by avoiding sins, by rendering loving service to others, by sharing our blessings with the needy, and by constant prayer, listening and talking to God at all times.




