# Understanding the Holy Eucharist: A Sacred Encounter of Faith

In the heart of our Catholic worship lies the profound mystery of the Holy Eucharist. It is not merely a symbol or a ritual but a sacred encounter with the divine presence of Jesus Christ. For us Catholics, the Eucharist is the pinnacle of our faith, the source and summit of our spiritual journey. Hence, we approach the Holy Eucharist with reverence, humility, and gratitude, recognizing it as the greatest gift of God's love to his Church.

At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the Holy Eucharist, transforming bread and wine into His body and blood, and commanded His disciples to "do this in memory of me" (Luke 22:19). This command forms the core of the Eucharistic celebration, known as the Mass, where we commemorate Christ's sacrifice on the cross and participate in the eternal banquet of the heavenly kingdom.

# **Need of Spiritual Reinforcement**

#### Introduction

The readings today challenge us to go courageously beyond people's expectations by doing good as Jesus did, instead of brooding over all the pain and suffering in the world that we cannot end. They invite us to explore the importance of The book of Job is a long didactic poem intended to refute work in our lives and to learn a lesson about work and its the ancient Jewish belief that God rewards the good and motives from Job, Paul, and Jesus. While the Gospel presents Jesus enthusiastically living out his Sabbath day of missionary work, the first reading details Job's attitude in striking contrast: in the midst of his long suffering, Job speaks of the tedium and futility of life, and he describe the miseries of human existence. Eventually, Job arrived at a place in his life where, in trust and in Faith, he finally is that He had allowed Satan to test Job's trusting surrendered himself, his undeserved but essential suffering, commitment and fidelity to God, even under extreme his work, and everything he had had and lost to the greater pressure, and Job had passed the tests. Only in the light of wisdom of God (Job 42:1-6). The second reading, on the Christ's sufferings and cruel execution, can we see the value other hand, reveals Paul as a true and dynamic follower of Jesus, ready to do something extra for his Lord. Knowing that he had been called to do more than just "preach" the Gospel, he resolved to preach it without recompense.

A prosperous and God-fearing man, Job suddenly experienced the successive, catastrophic losses of wealth, family, and health. The only explanation the author offers for God's permitting the innocent Job to suffer these losses of suffering in this life. Job's detailed account of the miseries of human existence contrasts with Jesus' work of healing as described in the Gospel. Job's account claims that the entire human condition is sad and hopeless, and he compares himself to a farm laborer who is forced to do degrading work for wages that barely keep him alive and who yearns for relief from the scorching sun. There is no peace, Job says, ultimate union with God. We learn from this reading that God listens to every human cry, even to the anger and dismay of the lament. We also learn that there is no struggle so great, no suffering so intense that it cannot be surrendered with confidence into God's capable, powerful hands.







As fellow diocesan prolifers head to Tallahassee this week on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 6 & 7, for Catholic Days at the Capitol, please pray we will be able to encourage legislators, as constituents, to vote favorably for all legislation that would protect human life from conception

to natural death. Full details of our efforts in Tallahassee will be reported in our next church bulletin on February 11, 2024.

At a recent visit to one of the three abortion facilities in Jacksonville, there was much activity. Approximately 40 women, young and mature, entered the facility. Interestingly, there were no "escorts" with their rainbow umbrellas, present to interfere with the praying pro-life witnesses. Many "blessing bags" were given to the moms as they exited the facility. Inside each bag is a snack, a Miraculous Medal and information on seeking assistance while pregnant and once the baby is born. The Women's Help Center is only one block away. There is also information on the Abortion Reversal Pill. We do not know when a "Mom" enters the facility, if she has the initial appointment for an ultrasound to determine the age of the fetus (Florida law requires a 24 hour waiting period after the ultrasound before the abortion, chemical or surgical, can be performed), OR if she is there for the actual procedure. On exiting, the Moms who have started a chemical abortion will be carrying a white lunch bag with the second pill - Misoprostol - which causes contractions and allows the fetus to leave the Mom - a miscarriage. This chemical abortion can still be reversed with high doses of progesterone, if prescribed by a Doctor or obtained from a pregnancy center within 24 hours after that first pill -RU486- which blocks progesterone and causes the uterine lining to break down, cutting off blood and nourishment to the baby. At my most recent day of praying at a facility in Jacksonville, I stopped to hand out a "blessing bag" to a woman waiting for her ride. She shook her head NO and muttered "I just had to do it". There are many reasons why Moms choose abortion. We can continue to PRAY that sexually active teens and adults will realize the awesome responsibility of conception and the joys of parenting.
