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

### What is the Role of Reconciliation in Your Life?

In our Gospel (Matthew 18:1-20), Jesus places a challenging and sophisticated demand upon us. He speaks of reconciliation both as a way of living and its sacramental nature.

His first step is profoundly personal. He says, "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone" (15). In another passage, Jesus rejects any attempt to bypass this personal responsibility for reconciliation (Luke 12:13-15).

Jesus moves to a progression of steps towards reconciliation: Try to reconcile through a small group, through the church, and finally through separation. Sin divides and reconciliation heals. Jesus calls for a lot of energy to be put into reconciliation.

Then, Jesus gives this profound gift: Reconciliation, through the Church, carries weight in heaven. He said, "Amen, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (18).

Obviously, the Church has reflected much about this responsibility and recognized it as one of the seven sacraments of the Church. The very structure of the sacrament can give us some guidance on making reconciliation a way of life.

It tells us that reconciliation is possible and normal. While I began this article by saying it is challenging and sophisticated, the ritual or structure provided by the Church gives us concrete steps for reconciliation.

- 1. **Preparation.** It is also called an "examination of conscience." Prayerfully asking, how have I sinned against God and others—radical honesty with self.
- 2. Create the opportunity for reconciliation. In other words, seek out the priest for the sacrament; seek out the other person for reconciliation. Avoidance does not turn into reconciliation.
- 3. Acknowledge your sin. At some point, we have to say "I am sorry." Culturally, among men at least, never saying you are sorry has become an indicator of power. It is a dangerous path.
- 4. Accept both forgiveness and penance. We seem to struggle with the finality of forgiveness. Can I really mean "I forgive you?" Only God can be complete in forgiveness but we are called to follow his path. Yet, the damage of sin also needs to be healed. Penance should be structured in a way that brings healing rather than reminder.
- 5. Praise God for Reconciliation! Can you imagine a world without reconciliation? Jesus offers reconciliation as a way of living and his Church gives us the concrete steps to make it a reality in our lives. May our celebration of the Sacrament give you the strength and the path to make reconciliation a way of life.

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


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
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
