

Jesus singles out Peter by saying, "And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it" (Matt 16:18). This passage speaks of the pope's unique position within our church and I would like to encourage your reflection on God working through human beings.

Will another human being ever disappoint you? Yes! Our nature as human beings and the relationships we form are in constant need of reform. Yet God demonstrates this continuous want to work through human beings.

By the position of the "Pope" Peter, Jesus established a set of boundaries for where a structure and the person interacts. While many within our world see no value in this structure set up by Jesus, I would argue the structure acknowledges the bond between the human and divine.

- 1. God works through flawed human beings and transforms them. Following St. Peter through the Gospels is a rollercoaster ride, yet by the time we get to the Acts of the Apostles we find Peter transformed into the likeness of Christ. He becomes symbolic for all of us as disciples.
- St. Paul knows where to go with his complaints. Paul went to Peter early on in his ministry for approval of his work and then returned to complain about the practices of the church. Having one person representing the whole is critical for making the church real. The interaction between St. Peter and St. Paul, even in tension, formed a clearer picture of what God has revealed to
- 3. Our daily lives matter. Jesus' insistence on working through human beings gives meaning to our lives. By Jesus' selection of Peter, we have this famous transformation from fishing for fish to fishing for human beings (Matthew 4:18). I would guess that one of the joys of heaven will be the surprise of how God worked through us and the challenge of hell will be when we discover we refused.

Flaws and all, Jesus chose Peter to work through him in this world and gave us the concrete unifying component of our church. As all of us need to train our hearts to be closer to God, our church holds this bond and tension between the human and divine better than any other solution even as it needs reform.

## STAFF CORNER

"You know that Guardian Angel prayer is a prayer we often prayed when I was kid," 90 years "young" Loretta shared. Hey, I know that one, too! That is such a cool prayer! Let's pray, "Angel of God my guardian dear, to whom God's love commits me here, ever this day, be at my side, to light, to guard, to rule and guide. Amen."

As I share this conversation I recently had with an elderly homebound parishioner, I reflect on how I am brought closer to Christ through her. I am amazed at how age distance between two people really does not matter when it comes to the eternal importance within our lives. Common values are shared and brought to light despite our age gap. If one takes a pinch—yes just a pinch—of their time to visit a homebound parishioner, moments together become truly golden.

Who among us does not know the Guardian Angel of God prayer? A gift given to me through my personal experience of bringing the Body of Christ to parishioners is the bright light that has been unearthed of the shining smile from the person I visit. What about you? Have you ever considered being a Homebound Communion Minister? How about giving it a try?

Below is a description of what a Homebound Communion Minister does:

- Manifest faith and charity in union with Christ on behalf of the whole community toward parishioners who cannot be present at Mass with the Sacred Scripture and the Body of Christ.
- Visits take place right after the Mass you attend or on a day and time previously set up that works for both you and the homebound parishioner.
- Before visiting the homebound parishioner let this person know the day and time you will be stopping by.
- Pray and extend prayerful conversation together in a positive light during visits.

A complete guide is provided for Homebound Communion Ministers to follow along with further details, assistance, and training.

In union with the Body of Christ, our homebound parishioners are thrilled and appreciate our volunteers reverently uniting them to our Church altar of the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Lord.
