

SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST. BLAISE, *Bishop & Martyr* Feast Day: February 3

St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. History has it that a mother came to him with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:

Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Does prayer change the way you live your life?

Oftentimes, prayer is seen as nice. Or an activity for old people. But certainly not vital for understanding my daily mission. Culturally, I think we have been sold on the idea that *I make myself*. When I am my own god, I have no need for prayer.

Jesus confronts this very idea in our Gospel today. He is seen as valuable and powerful. Simon receives immediate benefit of being Jesus' disciple: Jesus heals Simon's mother-in-law. Then, the whole town benefited from his presence and they were willing to follow him easily. We are told, "The whole town was gathered at the door" (Mark 1:33).

In the midst of this place of value and power, we are told, "Rising very early before dawn, [Jesus] he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed" (Mark 1:35). Simon and his companions could not stand this. We are told Simon "pursued" him, which, in Greek, is typically in the context of "pursuing your enemy." Through prayer, Jesus came back to his core responsibility: "He told them, 'Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come'" (Mark 1:38).

Think about the fundamental change in Jesus' action and how it changed his value and power. From Peter's perspective, Jesus made an immediate and provable impact upon his life. He controlled access to His power and value. Preaching in another town had no immediate value for Peter. Preaching required faith; healing proved Jesus' value without the need for faith.

Even though Jesus is the Son of God, he went off to pray. He knew that his life flowed out of the inner relationship with God, his Father. Of all people, Jesus could have taken on the assessment: "I am my own god, I have no need for prayer." Yet, he knew he was God only in relationship to the Father and united through the will of his Father.

Jesus prayed. That is a really big deal. There is an acknowledgement that the realities of our daily lives can lead us to lose our purpose or to cause us to start thinking about ourselves as gods. [G]gods do not need to pray to anyone else but themselves.

Prayer does not have to be hard; prayer simply has to be in relationship with God. This is why "Our Father" is so critical. It places us from the very beginning in relationship with God our Father and confirms "Thy will be done." Praying Our Father is no small task and it gives us that ability to find a "deserted place" in the midst of our day.

Let us help one another pray.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism

Baptism is the basic Sacrament of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit, and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. With the new birth through water and the Word, we are freed from sin and regenerated as sons and daughters of God. First Reconciliation & First Communion

These sacraments are typically celebrated when a child is 7 or 8 years old, or in second grade. At St. Columbkille, we have a firm belief that since Reconciliation and Communion are part of everyday Catholic living, preparing for these sacraments at home within the family is essential. We are guiding families in a way that not only provides parents with the tools they need to prepare their child, but also walking with them to learn how to use those tools in their daily Catholic family life.
