

PASTOR'S REFLECTION

A not uncommon aspect of growing up is how we resist accepting advice from parents or peers—even one's children—until we are in a mess we can't get out of ourselves. Few of us have escaped learning some things "the hard way."

Perhaps that is why the Church has structured Lent as two halves. The readings during the weekdays from now until March 10 challenge us with the invitation to prayer, fasting, works of mercy, forgiveness, and turning from hardness of heart. We are focused on one's call to conversion: to notice the situation we are in and how efforts to avoid or overcome sin reveal our inability to do so on one's own. This brings us to "compunction:" a spiritual quality of having one's ego deflated, or "punctured", so we "remember that we are dust" and the good we want to do is beyond our own strength. We need a Savior!

The second half of Lent's weekday readings are taken from the Gospel of John. They present us with more of a "who is Jesus" as a healer and life-giver, and Who—if one believes in Him—can offer eternal life. This Jesus of Lent's concluding weeks leading up to Holy Week and Easter will confront and overcome even death as an aspect of the sin we struggle against. Jesus is the Savior we have come to know we need.

As we make our way into Lent this year, its important to truly challenge ourselves with, "what are the areas of sin that are my weaknesses?" Our failures will keep Lent from being just an exercise in self-discipline. Rather, they will send us in search of the one who wants to be our partner in conversion from sin. Drop in on daily Mass at times this Lent. You will encounter help in knowing how you need a Savior, and in knowing that Savior is Jesus Christ.

CATHOLIC Q&A

Can you recommend some good books for Lenten spiritual reading?

On more than one occasion, a coach being interviewed about his teamsuccessful or not--will be asked about the next step. The inevitable response includes something about getting back to basics. Reviewing the fundamentals of the sport strengthens performance and builds confidence.

The best Lenten reading takes us back to the fundamentals. If Lent is the time for the Church to be on retreat, then we should focus on the texts that help us deepen our understanding of our faith. Spend time reading one of the Gospels, and use a Scripture commentary to learn all you can about the passion of Jesus. Read about the lives of the saints, especially your patron saint and that of your parish. Finally, you can use the Catechism of the Catholic Church to learn more about the church's teachings and beliefs. The sections on prayer and the Mass are really great reflections.

Focusing on the basics really helps us take another step forward in our faith. We have not only a better understanding of what we believe and practice, but also why we believe. With that belief comes the confidence we need to be better, more faithful witnesses to Christ. ©LPi

SACRAMENTS

Baptism

Baptism is the basic Sacrament of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit, and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. With the new birth through water and the Word, we are freed from sin and regenerated as sons and daughters of God. First Reconciliation & First Communion

These sacraments are typically celebrated when a child is 7 or 8 years old, or in second grade. At St. Columbkille, we have a firm belief that since Reconciliation and Communion are part of everyday Catholic living, preparing for these sacraments at home within the family is essential. We are guiding families in a way that not only provides parents with the tools they need to prepare their child, but also walking with them to learn how to use those tools in their daily Catholic family life.
