St. Martin de Porres November 3

Difficulties can make a person bitter or better. St. Martin had his share of troubles, but he never let them turn him into a mean person.

Martin de Porres was born in Lima, Peru, the son of a white Spanish nobleman and a freed black woman from Panama. Martin's father resented his dark-skinned son and deserted the family when Martin and his sister were very young. Martin's childhood was full of abuse, neglect, loneliness, and poverty, but he knew that our heavenly Father loved and cared for him.

When Martin was twelve years old, his mother placed him as an apprentice to a barber/surgeon. Martin was overjoyed! He learned the remedies that helped sick and suffering people. Martin's days were filled with work in the hospitals, in the office, and in homes. At night he spent long hours in prayer and reading about God.

Martin became very good at his profession, and his name spread throughout Lima. He thought wearing a religious habit would help people to thank God for their cures. Because he did not feel worthy to be a religious or a priest, he decided tured holding a basket and to become a Dominican lay brother. After nine years his community asked him to be a full professed religious.

As a Dominican, Martin was busier than ever. He was head of the infirmary in the monastery, but he also cared for the sick throughout the city. It is said that Martin even kept a hospital for dogs and cats at his sister's house. At times Martin simply put his hand on sick or injured persons and God cured them. He did the lowliest tasks, such as cleaning and scrubbing. He begged for the poor people in the city, and often brought

clothing and food to them. He bought toys for poor, lonely children and raised money so that poor girls could marry. He founded an orphanage and a hospital, and he also ministered to the slaves brought from Africa. In all of this he was known for his humility. kindness, and gentleness.

Martin is sometimes piccollecting mice from church drawers. This is because of a story that Martin found a mouse in a trap in a church where mice had been nibbling the vestments. Martin told the mouse to tell his friends not to damage church things anymore and then freed the mouse. All the mice left the church.

People gave Martin the name of Martin of Charity. St. Martin is the Patron of social justice and public education.

St. Martin de Porres, pray that we may be known as people of charity!

Reflecting On Sunday's Readings

Zacchaeus probably wasn't much to look at. Obviously, he was "height impaired" for he had to climb a tree to get a glimpse of Jesus over the heads of the crowds. Society tends to favor the tall and good looking so he probably didn't get much respect, at least not enough to warrant a place at the front of the crowd. In addition, he was a tax collector, a not so noble profession in Zaccheaus' day. Tax collectors were invariably dishonest, gouging people for all they could get, and engaging in political graft to maintain their appointment. Zaccheaus probably felt like the comic Rodney Dangerfield, "I don't get no respect?" Fortunately, Jesus doesn't look only on the outward man but looks on our heart. In Zacchaeus, Jesus saw a genuine seeker of truth. No doubt years of dishonesty were weighing heavily upon Zacchaeus and when he heard rumors of this man Jesus, and his message of God's love and forgiveness, he had to find out for himself. So Zacchaeus climbed a tree to have a look. He illustrates the mark of a true seeker of truth, they will not let anything stand in their way to discover the real answer. Some people avoid an encounter with Jesus by hiding behind an excuse, such as the presence of hypocrites in the church. But a person must be smaller than the object they hide behind. Zacchaeus was short of stature but he was not small of heart. Jesus looked right through Zacchaeus' shortness and dishonest profession and saw a sincere, inquiring, heart. When Jesus invited himself to be Zacchaeus' guest for dinner, Zacchaeus jumped at the chance. Imagine what would not have happened if Jesus had only looked on the outward appearance. Perhaps the critics were right when they said that Jesus had gone to be the guest of a sinner, but they were premature in their analysis. By the time the dinner was over Jesus left as the guest of a repentant believer. Dietrich Von Hildebrand, in the book Transformation in Christ, said that "it

is in repenting our sins that we expressly repudiate evil and revert to God.' During that brief dinner hour Zacchaeus' life was converted and transformed. Recognizing Jesus as "Lord" he immediately repudiated the evil he had committed and restored it four times over. He had fully reverted to God. His was not a token belief, it was not a simple agreeing to articles of faith, or an academic formality of joining a church. His was a true conversion, repudiating evil and reverting to God, that set him on a path of spiritual and moral transformation. We can learn much from Jesus through this encounter. Do we relate to people, especially nonbelievers, on the basis of their outward appearance? Do their looks and manner of dress cause us to turn away with a scowl writing them off as unreachable? Do we avoid being invitational and welcoming because we don't want to associate with "sinners"? Jesus' life suggests that we need to look beyond what we see to ascertain someone's heart. Perhaps their tree climbing antics are not just a selfish desire to get a better look, but a real cry for help, a real inquiry as to whether there is hope. Let's not be a spectator like the Pharisees, standing apart, critical and uninvolved. We can extend an invitation to have a meal together to see if Christ living in us can reach out to their need. At worst, we will have had a meal with a "sinner," and at best we could be instrumental in helping the "sinner" begin the journey of becoming a repentant believer. "As a reaction to a very aggressive, manipulative and often degrading type of evangelization, we sometimes have become hesitant to make our own religious convictions known, thereby losing our sense of witness. Although at times it seems better to deepen our own commitments than to evangelize others, it belongs to the core of Christian spirituality to reach out to the other with good news and to speak without embarrassment about what we 'have heard and ... seen with our own eyes ... watched and touched with our hands' (1 John 1:1)."
