

Easter Sunday

Mary Magdalene, known as "Apostle of the Apostles", had set out in the darkness to finish what could not be done three days earlier. When Jesus died so close to the Sabbath hour, there was not time to prepare Jesus' body by the customary anointings and wrappings. Indeed, there had only been time to wrap the body in a sheet which we have come to know as the Shroud of Turin. She came on Sunday morning to do the whole job. This was a complex task involving washing the body, covering it with various oils and powders, thus "anointing" it, and finally wrapping the entire body in cloth and sealing it.

Mary Magdalene would not have been anticipating an encounter with the risen Lord on the morning she set out to be near Him who released her from complete darkness and demons. Many of us have fought the same kinds of battles as Mary Magdalene did in her worst state. How many have lost their battle to some addiction because they never knew the power of the resurrected Lord..

This Easter morning, Mary would not be able to complete the burial ritual. On arrival, she discovered an empty tomb. Other Gospels have differing accounts. In John's Gospel, Mary encountered the Risen Christ as a gardener. In other Gospels, Mary arrived at the tomb with other women and was greeted by angels. Why would there be different accounts of the same story which seem to contradict each other?

Mary Magdalene was a historical person. Every Gospel account has her going to the tomb early on Easter morning. However, the Gospels are not always interested in giving historic accounts. This is not the biography of Mary Magdalene. Instead, each Gospel is making a theological point. In today's Gospel, John was making an ecclesial statement: Mary was the first to announce what seemed like the theft of Jesus' body. Peter and John raced to the tomb wondering if Jesus' words that He would rise were, in fact, true, or was this the work of grave robbers. Notice, John arrived first, but he slammed on the brakes before entering the tomb because Peter, who had been appointed the 'key bearer' of the faith, had more authority. John allowed Pope Peter to examine the evidence of faith first. Would robbers neatly fold things and tidy up the place if they robbed it?

Both disciples entered the tomb as skeptics, both reemerged from the tomb as believers. The Easter message to the world is to have faith. Let us enter into the death and resurrection of Christ that we may also reemerge from the tomb experiencing new and fuller life.

Calvary Cemetery is a final resting place for our loved ones. In order to keep our grounds beautiful and safe we ask that the following rules be observed.

NO WIRE OR GLASS ORNAMENTS

These pose a safety hazard to the maintenance crew.

NO SOLAR LIGHTS

These are beautiful, but they are also light weight and blow over. They can be very dangerous if a mower blade hits them.

NO IN-GROUND PLANTING

Flowers and shrubs are beautiful, but also need a lot of care. Many might maintain them but many will not.

NO DOGS

This has always been a rule of this cemetery, as it is in all cemeteries.

FLORAL DECORATIONS

One floral decoration is allowed per family plot. Please keep this to a reasonable size. When the decoration becomes unsightly it will be removed by cemetery personnel.

All decorations should be removed from the cemetery prior to the closing date which is now November 15th.(Burials may take place after this time at the discretion of the cemetery staff.)
