Gospel Meditation

The Most Holy Trinity
by Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS (LPI)



If God is one, how can he be three? The most intelligent theologians have racked their brains over the problem, and the most prayerful ones have surrendered to the mystery. How it can be, we can't explain. But what it means, we can join! Our God is an

ever-unfolding relationship. Theologians speak of the immanent and economic Trinity. The Trinity is immanent in the sense that the Persons are close and entirely sufficient within God's self. In other words, God doesn't require us for him to exist. The word economic is rooted in the Greek word for management of a household or family. The Trinity is economic

in the sense that God has invited us to be part of him. He's growing the family! We see the dynamic here in today's gospel.

Jesus says the Spirit "will take from what is mine and declare it to you" and that "everything that the Father has is mine." There is relationship here. Jesus speaks (and is) the word of the Father. The Holy Spirit speaks what he hears from the Son. The Father gives everything to the Son, and the Spirit speaks that inheritance over us. God invites us into the Trinitarian family!

The doctrine of the Trinity isn't something to brush off as overwhelming. After all, "the Spirit of truth... will guide you to all truth." This occurs most perfectly in the Church, who protects all that has been revealed by God in scripture and tradition. We can trust the declarations of her theologians and learn from the lives of her saints. The Trinity may be a mystery, but, by the grace of God, we can have real truth about who God is and how we can love like him.

Totus Tuus 2019

This summer, Christ the King is again hosting the Catholic youth camp, Totus Tuus ("Totally Yours"). The camp has two sections, one for those entering grades 1–8, and one for those entering grades 9–12. Last year, we had over 60 participants!

The diocese organizes the program, and send a teaching team of seminarians and college-aged students, who do a great job combining enrichment in the faith with a ton of energy and fun. The day includes catechetical instruction, daily Mass, songs, games, and recess. I've worked with the Totus Tuus programs in the past, and have always found them to be engaging and fun, as well as a great way for the students to grow in their love for God. The dates for the program are as follows:

The grade school camp is from 9 AM to 3 PM, Monday, July 22, to Friday, July 26.

The high school camp is from 7:30 PM to 9:30 PM, Sunday, July 21, to Thursday, July 25.

The price is \$60 for a grade student, and \$25 for a high schooler. For families with multiple students, the maximum cost is \$150. Please make checks to Christ the King Parish.

And from Our Pastor...

Dear Friends and Parishioners:

This is the time of year in which we celebrate a lot of spring burials. For those not native to New England, most of our cemeteries are impassable during the winter months and as the ground freezes it becomes impossible to dig graves. So those who die in the winter are often buried in the spring. We have a lot of funerals here, so any spring can usher in a large number of burials. I had four such burials in two days last week.

I like cemeteries. I like to walk around in them, read gravestones, pray for the dead, and imagine the days when these people were alive. Every gravestone represents a life (and possibly more than one). This was a person who lived, worked, raised a family, played, prayed, and contributed to society. Who was this person? What was this person like? Was this person a scoundrel or a saint? Or a mix of both? In a cemetery, they all look equal! Did these families know each other? Were they related in some way? These are the types of questions I ask myself as I walk around reading the names, dates, and other information sometimes found on gravestones.

I walk through cemeteries filled with hope. At every Mass, we pray as part of the Creed that we believe in the "resurrection of the dead." In the committal prayers of the Church, we ask the Lord to "grant that our brother/sister may sleep here in peace until you awaken him/her to glory." At St. Anselm's Monastery in Manchester, N.H., there is a graveyard for their deceased monks. Each stone reads "Here will rise..." and then the name of the monk. We believe that through God's grace our bodies and souls will be reunited, and thus the resurrection of the dead.

At committals, I often will take a moment and invite the people to think about the holiness of this burial ground. It is important that they come here, to this grave, to grieve, laugh, cry, talk, and mourn. There is a human need to connect with our deceased loved ones, and cemeteries give us an opportunity to do that. It is not morbid to do so. On the contrary, the beautifully manicured lawns and scenery of a cemetery can give us a moment of quiet and peace in the presence of the remains of our loved ones.


In Ezekiel 37:12, God tells the Israelites he will "...open their graves and raise them [up]..." It is what Jesus Christ did for us in his death and resurrection. I have spent a great deal of time recently mostly at Calvary and Evergreen Cemeteries in Rutland. I always wonder about the lives of those buried there. Every gravestone is a life lived here on earth, awaiting the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Death is not the end! God will open our graves and we will rise from them. That's the good news of our faith!

The Inland See June 15-21, 2019 FOR THE DIOCESE OF BURLINGTON



"Direct the Church in Vermont during this time of preparation for the Diocesan Synod."

From the very beginning of the synodal process the dynamic has been to seek-listen-discern: to seek input from all, to listen to all and to discern with all who are part of our Church. In the first stage of the process, "listening sessions" took place in each deanery and parish. Input also was sought through on-line and mail surveys. All of this data was collated and presented to the Synod Preparatory Commission that distilled the many and various responses to ten possible priorities. Once again, we returned to the parishes and deaneries seeking further input on which of the ten priorities would be rated as most important. The process proved to be dialogical, back and forth from the Diocese to the parish and back again. Finally, three priorities were established by the bishop and preparatory commission and the actual synod sessions were convened.

The delegates to the Diocesan Synod, men and women from each parish or parish cluster as well as many of the clergy of the Diocese, came to the synod meetings ready to "discern the signs of the time wisely, that we may joyfully proclaim the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ" (Synod Prayer). These delegates were not daunted by the tasks and challenges that we face now and in the future in the Diocese of Burlington. Instead, they were and are believers who are ready to "go out to the highways and hedgerows and make people come in" (Luke 14:23) that God's house may be filled. As they listened to one another, what became clear was how much the delegates love the Church. Their words were filled with passion for their faith and hope for the future. The dialogue and deliberations that took place in the sessions confirmed more and more that people need to hear the Good News of God's mercy, the Good News of Christian hope and the Good News of salvation in and through Jesus Christ and His Church.

From our synodal deliberations, three key pastoral priorities emerged, each of them related to the mission of the Church:

Evangelization — call people to faith;

Building and supporting vibrant parishes — give people a place where faith lives; and

Communications — proclaim a message that can be heard, received, understood and accepted.

While we continue to engage in what we are already doing as the Church in Vermont, these three priorities will be primary foci that will direct the pastoral mission of the Church throughout the years to come. The recommendations provided at the end of each section of this document provide concrete actions toward the fulfillment of our three priorities that will be undertaken in the next few months. It is important to note that the recommendations from the synod are intentionally broad, as the actual convening of the synod was only the first step in the work ahead. What is most important is the follow-up and implementation of the recommendations. It is in this process that the details will be clarified and actions will be taken.

The Scriptures offer clear direction as we move forward as a Diocese. The first is a simple method for how each of us, no matter what our place in life may be, can be missionary disciples: "Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope" (I Peter 3:15). The second is the reason for our hope for the future: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). He is the one constancy in our lives. In Him "we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). May we never fail to trust in the Lord; with Him, "all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26).


