

Gospel Meditation

Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Active and contemplative. At work and at rest. These are dynamics we all face in our lives, and if we're honest, we might not always balance perfectly! In this Sunday's gospel, our daily tensions play out in two sisters. Mary "sat beside the Lord at his feet listening to him speak."

Martha, on the other hand, is "burdened with much serving." This, as it turns out, is not necessarily "the better part."

All of us reading this engage in some sort of labor. We have different trades or careers. We have responsibilities as family members, some of which may take up most of our time. In the time of scripture, showing hospitality to guests was one of the most important values in society. Our work is important. Jesus himself spent decades as a carpenter. So what's the problem with Martha? Martha is burdened, anxious, and worried. Not only that, she resents her sister's choice. "Tell her to help me," she demands of Jesus.

How easy it is to get very busy doing good things. We need to provide for our families and plan for retirement. We need to make sure children are clothed, fed, and educated. Our committees, ministries, and sports schedules need to stay on track. However, without a balance of work with rest, without contemplation in the midst of our action, we will miss the point. While many parts are required for our life in the world to function, the better part is our relationship with God. This week, make time in your busy schedule to sit at Jesus' feet. Maybe this is 20 minutes with scripture, participating in a daily Mass, or a quiet walk alone in the park. Receive what Christ wants to speak to you.

And from Our Pastor...

As this is an important topic, I am publishing last week's letter again, in case any parishioners did not see it.

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Two developments in the last six or so months have convinced me that we as parishes need to rethink our Mass times and availability. Currently, we offer eight Mass time slots, four at Christ the King, and two each at IHM and St. Patrick's. There are three Masses run simultaneously with another Mass (4 PM at IHM with 4 PM at St. Patrick, 7:30 AM at CTK with 8 AM at IHM, and 10 AM each at both CTK and St. Patrick), meaning we always need two priests.

The first development is the Mass count we did in May. Our average numbers for those three weeks were as follows: Christ the King - 693, IHM - 199, and St. Patrick - 120. Thus 1,012 people a week come through our doors at one of our eight Masses. These are some of the highest numbers in the diocese and thank God for that! It truly is a blessing to see so many people on our weekends. It's also a reminder that all we do as a parish centers around the Sunday Eucharist, the point at which the highest number of people come through our doors. At the same time, 8 Masses for 1,000 people seems a lot. Our largest Masses are the 4 PM IHM, 7:30 and 10 AM at CTK, and the 10 AM at St. Patrick. Many of our other Masses are not half full. It gives us pause to think about our schedule and how we best serve our people.

The other development is more personal and has to do with coverage of these Masses. Under our current system we need two priests here every Saturday and Sunday. This is starting to prove difficult. It is getting harder and harder to find coverage when one of us needs to be away, gets the flu, is on vacation, or has an emergency calling us away. This last possibility happened to me recently and I almost needed to cancel some Saturday Masses. I am pretty sure we will need to cancel some Masses on a weekend in August in which we cannot find coverage. While Fr. Tinney is a big help to us, he also fills in at other parishes.

With this letter I am announcing a process for a new Mass schedule to be implemented soon. Our new schedule will reduce our Masses from 8 to 6 every weekend, and none of those six Masses will be simultaneous. The new schedule will allow one priest to cover it in the event of an emergency or coverage cannot be found.

This week I am explaining the rationale for the changes that are coming; in the weeks to come I will give some options. It's important that we all see the demographic shifts and reasons for changing up what we're doing. It's not about preserving "my" Mass; it's more about seeing the future and how we can face it together. Fuller churches make for better celebrations of the Eucharist. That's where we're heading.
