Gospel Meditation

Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Have you ever seen a celebrity? Have you ever met a political representative? Did the encounter leave you with newfound acting or musical abilities? Did it give you a grasp of the intricacies of the latest city ordinance or controversial law? Talents, expertise, and skill are

hard-won traits, not rewards that spread by contact. Our life of faith is also not so easy.

"We ate and drank in your company and you taught in our streets!" In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus notes that it requires moral strength to enter the kingdom of God. It's not mere proximity to righteousness that saves. Rubbing elbows with the righteous is not the same as being truly holy ourselves.

Unfortunately, we can have this attitude in many areas. It's easy to see who may seem "first" in the eyes of the world. This occurs in our workplaces and among our public figures. It can also happen in our schools, local parishes, and the larger Church. For some of us, the temptation to have the popularity and prestige rub off on us can be fairly strong. If only we are in the right place with the right people, surely others will associate us with what they possess!

But salvation is worked out in each individual life. It is our task not merely to show up, but to be transformed. And the truly transformed may not be everyone we expect. "People will come from the east and the west and from the north and the south... some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last." Some who seem first in reputation now may be last in the kingdom of God. Others who appear now on the furthest fringes of society – but better imitate the lowly holiness of Jesus – will be first in his kingdom. What are your concerns? Proximity and reputation? Or prayerful righteousness?

Get to Know Jesus

When I speak and write, I mention my family quite often. Those of you who have been reading these reflections for the past 5+ years – or who have read my books – may think you know them. When I travel, I do get asked about my family by those who have entered my life through the words on a page. My hope is that by sharing stories about my family and life the reader gets a chance to see himself or herself in the story as well. Then the point being made in the article or reflection can take on stronger meaning because it hits home. However, no matter how much I write about my family and how much you

read about them, you will only have a glimpse as to the real people. It will take an actual relationship with one of them to get you to the point where you can say you know them.

That is the same way with Jesus. First, more Catholics need to read more and learn more about Jesus. Bible studies should be the norm and not the exception in our lives. Second, too many of us in the Church can explain who Jesus is from our past formation classes and reading, but we do not actually know him. Jesus is not a topic, a theological term, or simply an historical figure. He is a real being who is alive! He is not dead, but alive! He calls us to do more than read about him. He calls us into an intimate relationship with him. We grow in relationship with Jesus by worshipping at the Mass, spending time with him in adoration, resting in him in the quiet, and by having the Jesus in us meet the Jesus in others. If you do not know him personally, get to know him. I would love for you all to meet my family in person someday, but I would much rather you get to know Jesus instead.

And from Our Pastor...

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

"I, then, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit, as you were also called to the one hope of your call; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." These words of St. Paul as found in the letter to the Ephesians (4:1-6) resonated with me last weekend as I announced the new Mass schedule to take effect in a few weeks, especially when talking to the congregations at those Masses that are not on the new schedule.

Parish life is the door through which most people experience their Catholic faith. It is in our church buildings that we celebrate the sacraments, marry off our children, baptize our babies, and pray for our dead. In a church building, we seek guidance from God for our daily living and we bring our sin and suffering for healing and forgiveness. It is hard to imagine our lives without that church building in which so many important moments have occurred. Yet, when Paul wrote that letter to the Ephesians quoted above, there were no church buildings. They weren't even thought of yet. Masses were celebrated in people's homes. The Church was not a building but the baptized faithful. That is still today's theology, even with church buildings.

As many of you know, I grew up at Sacred Heart Church in Bennington. It closed in 1995, just 27 days after my First Mass! Having been formed in and attended thousands of Masses in that church building, I was only able to celebrate one Mass in there myself. The two parishes in Bennington were amalgamated into one Catholic community, all attending the former St. Francis de Sales Church. There was a lot of anger and pain over this. But now, almost 25 years later, the people have mixed together and they are all one parish. It is one community of faith, in the vision of St. Paul: "...One Lord, one fatih, one baptism; one God and Father of all..."

We are one community of Catholic faith, no matter which church building we attend. A parishioner reminded me last week of this when he said, "Father, if I can't make it to one church, I can go to one of the others. It's the same Lord in the tabernacle, the same Mass, in this case the same priests, the same sacraments, and the same prayer being said." Certainly, a deep and profound theological statement! "...One Lord, one fatih, one baptism; one God and Father of all..." says St. Paul.

We continue our journey to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and as we learned last week in the Letter to the Hebrews (12:1-4) that journey is like a race. I likened it to the Tour de France. Hills, valleys, peaks and gullies await us. The journey may take us to a different Mass and perhaps a different church building. But it's the same Lord who calls and is present in each church, and is present in your heart and soul. Always remember the words of St. Paul! There is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." Amen!

The sins of the past

he Diocese of Burlington this week published a report listing the names of diocesan clergy who, since 1950, have had a credible and substantiated allegation of sexual abuse of a minor made against them. With one exception, all of these acts occurred more than 20 years ago. None of these priests are in ministry; most of them are deceased. While most of these allegations took place at least a generation ago, the numbers are still staggering; the victims of these priests are still bearing the wounds of what happened to them. Until now, the scope of all of this has been our "family secret."

Family secrets can be toxic. Harmful past experiences — unspoken, unaddressed, and known only by a few — fester like neglected wounds. The innocent victims of the family secret are often made to feel ashamed about what happened as no one seems to listen to them or even, sadly at times, believe them. While these secrets remain hidden, those who have been hurt are often unable to find the healing they need, especially if those who harmed them are still "part" of the family, even if only in memory.

The Church is not immune to this reality. We often talk about the Church as a family, as a community of faith in which we are brothers and sisters in our love for God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We are supposed to be a people of love, a place of hope, and a community of healing. But that is not always the case. This is especially true with the significant number of cases involving the sexual and physical abuse of children by clergy, not just here in Vermont, but in the entire Church. These "sins of the past" continue to haunt us. These shameful, sinful, and criminal acts have been our "family secret" for generations. While there has been significant action by the Church here in Vermont and in the United States to address the issue of

the sexual abuse of minors by clergy and the cover-up of those crimes by those in authority, the whole sordid tale of what happened in decades leading up to the U.S. bishops' 2002 Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People has not been fully aired. That is why I have asked that this report be compiled and published.

When I arrived in Vermont four years ago as the 10th bishop of Burlington, I promised to continue the Diocese's efforts to address past abuses of children by clergy, to work toward healing for those who have experienced abuse, to maintain a zero-tolerance policy for any individual with a substantiated allegation of sexual abuse, and to be transparent about the prevention, handling, and response to the sexual abuse of minors. In order to do so, it is clear to me that we must be fully honest about these sins of our past. If only a list of priests with credible allegations of sexual abuse of a minor had been released 15 years ago, perhaps we would be farther along our collective path of healing. But for many reasons, this was not able to happen.

In November 2018, as part of my personal commitment and that of the Diocese of Burlington to transparency regarding abuse by clergy, an independent, volunteer committee of four lay men and three lay women assembled to review clergy personnel files pertinent to any past allegation of abuse of a minor and to create a list of priests who have been credibly accused of sexually abusing a minor. Working completely independent of the Diocese, the committee only met with me twice, in the beginning and at the end of the process. I am grateful to the individuals who served on the file review committee, volunteering more than eight months of their

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time to thoroughly review files and materials and to compile a report of their findings. As promised, I am publishing the committee's report as it was presented to me without any edits or changes. It can be viewed at vermont-catholic.org/promise.

In addition to confronting the sins of the past, we must remain vigilant in ensuring these sins do not occur in the future. I have listened to the stories of victims of clergy sexual abuse and will continue to do so. They need to hear over and over again that we believe them. They also need to know that we are doing everything we humanly can to make sure this does not happen again. The Church in the United States has put in place policies and procedures to make the Catholic Church one of the safest places for children today. In 2002, the Diocese of Burlington adopted the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which requires: mandatory reporting of all abuse allegations to civil authorities; removal of credibly accused clerics from active ministry; background checks of all priests, staff and volunteers; training to recognize and prevent abuse; and many other proactive steps to ensure the safety of all members of our Church family. As a result of our rigorous efforts, since 2002 there has been only one credible and substantiated claim of abuse against a priest in the Diocese of Burlington. There are no priests in ministry in Vermont who have had a credible and substantiated allegation made against them.

As has been the case for the past 17 years, I, along with the clergy, staff and volunteers of the Diocese, are committed to supporting and caring for all victims of abuse and will continue to work to ensure safe environments for all God's people — especially children, youth and vulnerable individuals— in which no form of harassment, sexual or otherwise, is tolerated. If you have been abused or if you suspect a minor or vulnerable person has been abused, contact the proper authorities immediately, including local law enforcement and the Diocese's Victim Assistance Line at 866-485-2488.

The greater family of the Catholic Church is in much need of healing. Together, we can mend our family's discord and, by the grace of God, ensure that these sins do not happen again.
