Cycles of Faith - 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time

What we say and how we say it reveals the true intentions of our hearts. The content and manner of our speech is a window into the recesses of our souls. Our consciences, attitudes, sentiments, weaknesses, and motives are displayed. As much as we think we can hide the truth of our lives from others, we cannot. Who we really are is not only expressed on our lips but is written on our faces. Jesus says precisely this, "For every tree is known by its own fruit." What does the fruit of our lives say about us?

Because we like to play the game of hide and seek with ourselves, in pretending that we are hiding we deflect attention others may give to us by becoming more critical of others. After all, the more time one can spend analyzing others' behavior the less time one has to look at his or herself. Often, the behaviors we abhor most in others are the very ones we are guilty of ourselves. We just don't know it yet. The more we put ourselves in the role of a judge, the more satisfaction and control we seem to achieve. Yet, what about ourselves? In focusing our attention on the beams in others' eyes, the aridity and barrenness of our lives goes unchecked. St. Ambrose reminds us that "no one heals himself by wounding another." Bringing our brothers and sisters down by being overly critical, serves no positive purpose.

But the one who knows how easy it is to fall into sin and weakness and how quickly errors in judgment can be made, knows the depth of true compassion, mercy, and kindness. Having recognized our own poor choices, misguided opinions, negative emotions, and ability to do horrendous things, we can be more sympathetic and understanding of where others may be. We are designed to be mentors and guides to one another. In walking the journey together, we can help each other become the best we can be. Humility is the order of the day and the primary virtue that prevents us from being hypocrites.

Saint Jude's Financial Summary for the 1st half of Fiscal Year Ending - 12/31/2021

- St. Jude's had a Net Loss of \$-3,605 during the six months of the 12/31/2012 compared to a Net Loss of \$-15,523 for the six months ending 12/31/2020, an improvement of \$11,918.
- Unencumbered cash reserves (Cash & Receivables Less Payables) were \$147,080 compared to \$155,026, a decrease of \$-7,946 or -5.1%.

Guidelines for Lent:

- --The time of Lent is to be observed by Catholics as a special season of prayer, penance and works of charity.
- --Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, in particular, are the most important penitential days of the liturgical year. They are days of both fast and abstinence. All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence.
- --The rule of **fasting** states that only one full meal a day can be taken. Two small meals, "sufficient to maintain strength", are allowed, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals breaks the fast, but drinking liquids does not. The rule of fasting obliges all Catholics from 18 to 59.
- --Abstinence refers to the eating of meat. The common estimation of the community is used to determine what falls under the category of meat. The rule of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years or older.
- --The **substantial** observance of the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious obligation.
- --Self-imposed fasting on the other weekdays of Lent is recommended. Abstinence on all Fridays of the year is also highly recommended.
- --Parents and teachers should see to it that, even those who are not bound by the laws of fast and abstinence because of age, are brought up in an atmosphere that is conducive to a sense of penance.

Ash Wednesday Distribution of Ashes

The following guidelines have been issued for the Diocese of Burlington concerning the distribution of ashes on Ash Wednesday:

- Imposition of ashes happens in the normal way, with the minister sanitizing hands before and after the ritual. Minister and participant MUST both wear masks.
- Those not comfortable with physical contact, but still want ashes may approach the minister AFTER the Mass/service, where the minister will impose ashes by sprinkling a small amount over the top of the head.

The faithful are reminded that there is **NO OBLIGATION TO RECEIVE ASHES** even if they attend Mass on Ash Wednesday. Ashes are an external sign of the interior disposition to contrition and penance. What is important is fostering the interior disposition.
