



The first step in producing any yearbook is picking a theme. Once the editors decide what direction to go, the color scheme, font, and overall design seem to flow from there. In August, Mr. Berkhout and the editors take a trip to Milwaukee to attend a workshop with Jostens, the publishing company. This is where we discuss new trends and techniques for the upcoming school year, as well as drawing ideas from other books. Jostens provides pamphlets like these, as well as a Look Book of design inspiration from across the nation.



You may have seen this sight in Mr. Berkhout's room this year. Before you start putting together a yearbook, you must decide what to put in it. These sticky notes allow the staff to get an idea of what is in the book, and move around pages and spreads.



It may seem a bit obvious, but the next step before you can put a book together is to get photos! On any given day, you can find Mr. Berkhout, Mrs. Schimpf, Alex Konop, or me snapping away. Often times we like to feature student reflections along with these photos, but that is all up to the editors and their vision for the book. Jostens uses a website to produce the pages of the yearbook. Here is an example of a two page spread that is not yet complete. The blue boxes are image placeholders, and the text that you see is actually in Latin. This text acts as placeholders for student reflections, captions, or short write-ups of events. Once you finish a spread, it's important to tag all the people in the pictures. This is how the staff formulates an index, as well as keep track of student coverage. The website is easy to learn and maneuver, so don't let that scare you if you decide to join yearbook!



Once all the work is done, it's time for the big reveal in August! Roncalli opts for a summer pick up date. This allows us to cover events that occur later in the year, such as graduation. As the editor, this is the most exciting part of the process. The once secret cover is finally revealed to the student body, and so are all the beautiful spreads that were made during the year. Last year we upgraded the dimension of the book, as well as the number of pages. This year we will keep those dimensions, but scale back to the normal number of pages.
