Students can do	 Read a story about the Stations of the Cross that you have at home or listen to the Bible story in the resource below. Pray the Stations of the Cross with the video in the resource below. Pick one or two or more stations that you are interested in and draw a picture and explain why the station is important to you. Write your own prayer to go with the station. 	Make Empty Tomb Rolls together Symbolism of Empty Tomb Rolls: Large Marshmallows – body of Jesus Melted Butter – oils of embalming Cinnamon and Sugar Mix- spices used to anoint Christ's body. Crescent Roll – the wrapping of Jesus' body or the tomb. Oven – the tomb Cavity in bun – the empty tomb or the empty cloths INSTRUCTIONS: 1. Separate rolls into eight triangles. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Dip each marshmallow into butter, roll in cinnamon-sugar and place on a triangle. Pinch dough around marshmallow, sealing all edges. Make sure to seal well or all the marshmallow will escape. 2. Dip tops of dough into remaining butter and cinnamon-sugar. Place with sugar side up in greased muffin cups. It helps to use jumbo muffin tins so that the juice doesn't overflow.	1. Learn about shadows by watching the video in resources below. 2. Jesus' followers surely felt that they were in a shadow on the day after Jesus' death, but hope remained. Choose a word that can remind your child of the hope they have in Jesus, such as love, hope, or forgiveness. 3. Instruct them to draw the word in bubble letters on paper and cut it out (see the photo below). 4. Have each child stand in front of a bright light or outside and hold the poster as shown to create a shadow. 5. Take pictures of both a big shadow and a small shadow. Hope always remains in Jesus. What will students do?			 Find an object (an apple, a cup, a book) in your home and set it on a table in front of you. Look at it carefully! Make a drawing of it, adding as many details as you can. You'll probably find yourself looking back and forth from drawing to object over and over again. Write your initials at the bottom. (Notice how Abrecht Durer stacked his initials.)
