



Dear Brothers and Sisters.

The summer holidays are now behind us and I hope that it was a time for you and your families to enjoy some rest and refreshment together, and that you feel recharged and ready for the year ahead as our schools get back up and running.

You will probably also be getting used to this time being the season for our annual update and appeal for our 'Friends Scheme' and our appreciation of your faithful and ongoing support of it.

Through your generous contributions we have been able to build up our pastoral ministry across a number of areas which I know are deeply important to you.

I particularly appreciate your support of our Youth programme and wish you could have been with us on our Diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes in July where a coach full of our young people, joined by our young adults, joined us to help our hospitality with our frail and elderly, transporting them from their hotels to the various pilgrimage venues. The Relics Tour follows upon our highly successful Carlo Acutis Eucharistic Miracles Exhibition last year which the Education team brought to all our Catholic schools in the Diocese and which had a profound effect on pupils and staff alike. Our Education team continues its close and fruitful relationship with our SPRED ministry which goes from strength to strength in providing an environment for our brothers and sisters with additional needs to experience the Church and to grow in their faith in preparation for the Sacraments.

INCOME GENERATION: ANNUAL APPEAL

30/31 August 2025

Good morning,

Thank you to N.N, for this opportunity to speak to you on a matter of importance for all of us as brothers and sisters in the Diocese of Paisley.

My Name is N.N. I am a member of the Diocesan Income Generation Team. It is my pleasure to be with you today to make this annual appeal on behalf of Bishop John and the priests of Paisley Diocese.

I ask you, please, to ensure that you collect a copy of the Annual Report as you leave church today. The information it contains is a brief presentation of facts and figures, collated by the Diocesan Finance Manager, showing the total income received by the Diocese from the parishes in response to Diocesan, National and International Appeals.

You will note in the Report that the income for each appeal increased from the previous year, helping to reduce further the expenditure of the Diocese. It is commendable that you continue to provide essential funding to ensure that the mission of the Church, locally and nationally, will continue to grow and flourish. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, it is reassuring to know that we are moving in the right direction and can look to the future with optimism and confidence.

Your generosity makes it possible to provide valued and much needed ministries in the Diocese: You help our Young People to grow in their understating of the faith and provide opportunities for them to come together to celebrate their faith; you support their education by providing invaluable resources for our schools through the excellent work of our Diocesan Education Department; you make it possible for people young and older with learning disabilities to celebrate the Sacraments in a unique way through SPRED which helps them to understand and celebrate their faith in a meaningful and joyful way; your prayers and financial contributions promote and support the Call to Priesthood and those who respond to that call; you show compassion and love for your Clergy when you provide for their needs in sickness and in old age.

VOCATIONS: A Closer Look

In the Diocese of Paisley, Vocations ministry may be separated into different areas: awareness; promotion; discernment and application; and seminary formation.

Vocations Awareness

Vocations awareness is concerned with making people more aware of the calling they receive in baptism. Many people experience life as an inchoate series of seemingly random events with little direction, purpose or meaning. The Catholic imagination offers a little more! As Pope Benedict famously reflected – 'Each of us is a thought of God. Each of us is willed. Each of us is loved. Each of us is necessary.'

In our vocations office, we seek to constantly articulate this vision by reminding people that God has a plan for their lives. We support this vision by creating educational and spiritual resources and constantly working on our social media platforms.

Vocations Promotion

Vocations promotion is the more purposeful suggestion of the priesthood, the diaconate and the consecrated life. It's the posters, newsletters, school programs, and retreat opportunities that continually propose the vocation of formally serving God in the Church. Every year we prepare and distribute materials at three points – National Vocations Week (generally in September), our January appeal for seminary applicants and Good Shepherd Sunday (generally in May).

Discernment and Application

The Diocese of Paisley has developed a programme to assist those who are discerning a call to Priesthood. This programme has been adopted nationally. If an enquirer wishes to apply for seminary formally he enters the **PASS** system (Programme of Application for Scottish Seminaries) which consists of a number of residential weekends. Over the years, the Scottish Bishop have asked for more elements to be added to this process. On average the process of PASS costs the Diocese of Paisley approximately £2,000 per applicant. This year we anticipate having one applicant.

Seminary Formation

Upon completion of the PASS system, a candidate is then admitted to Seminary. After as propaedeutic period of six months at the Royal Scots College in Salamanca, the student will then study at the Scots College, Rome, for seven years. It costs the Diocese of Paisley, £30,000 a year to train a student Priest. This year we will have one student at the Scots College in Rome.

Strengthening Home-School-Parish Links

Our Diocesan Parent Forum has been set up to provide advice for Parent Councils. We also wish to support parents as the first educators of their children and have developed Family Sacramental Workbooks for P4 and P7. In Session 2024-25, we worked on developing an app for Confirmandi and their parents to deepen their learning about Confirmation. We hope this will be able for 2025-26 and plan to develop further apps for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. As part of the Diocesan Secondary Religious Education course, we have produced leaflets for parents outlining the key learning in each unit.

In Advent, we continued to work with the Daughters of St Paul to ensure the Travelling Crib programme was delivered to all P2 classes. Cribs went home to families, together with a nativity story and a short prayer service. With financial support, we plan to develop further initiatives which strengthen home-school-parish links.

Supporting Schools and Developing Teachers

Teachers as individuals and as a group are responsible for creating the distinctive Christian ethos of our schools. The Department provides support for both their professional and spiritual development, including a Retreat for Head Teachers, Retreats for teachers, Induction Programmes for new Head Teachers and Newly Qualified Teachers and support for the delivery of Religious Education, including preparation for the Sacraments.

The Department provides guidance on the life of our schools as Communities of Faith and Learning. Our termly *Centred on Christ* newsletter contains articles on various aspects of the mission of the Catholic school. This represents a significant financial cost to the Diocese. All 40 schools evaluated their effectiveness as Catholic schools and submitted a Developing in Faith report to the Diocese.

We continue to liaise with Glasgow University and Diocesan Head Teachers to deliver a conference for S6 pupils which encourages them to choose Catholic teaching as a positive career choice.

Supporting Chaplains

Our priests provide an invaluable service as chaplains to our schools. Chaplains' meetings enable them to discuss important topics. The Department has published two documents to help schools and chaplains to work together in enhancing the spiritual lives of young people. Joint Meetings of Clergy and Head Teachers enable them to share practice and plan developments

The articles in the Report give a brief insight into the wonderful work that is going on around the Diocese, all made possible because of your kindness and willingness to support these vital projects ongoing.

In the past year, the contributions to the 'Friends' Scheme' increased by £17,715. Thank You to our new 'Friends' for registering last year and to all our existing Friends who have faithfully supported the Scheme since its inception.

I ask you, PLEASE, if you are not yet a member of the 'Friends' Scheme' to seriously consider supporting one or more of these special projects by completing and returning the registration form enclosed in your Report to the Diocese using the envelope provided. The little extra you give will go a long way to ensure that we can continue to provide pastoral care for our brothers and sisters in our parishes and in our Diocese.

These projects are the most challenging and costly for the Diocese. The shortfall for each of these appeals, though slightly less year on year, continue to be a cause for concern, impacting directly on our parishes and the Diocese. As a charity, we rely entirely on your generosity and consistent offerings to provide for these pastoral initiatives. Any increase you make to these appeals would be gratefully appreciated and help significantly to ensure their viability for years to come.

We are 'Pilgrims of Hope'. We look to the future with hopeful expectation that our parishes and Diocese will continue to be strong and vibrant communities, working in partnership to deepen our relationship with the Lord and with each other. This we can achieve, because we firmly believe that we are the one family of God in the Diocese of Paisley; we provide for all that we need. We are strong in faith and always at the service of one another as brothers and sisters in the Lord. Are we not?

NATIONAL & INTERNATIONAL APPEALS

Justice and Peace Scotland

This collection helps fund our Scottish Catholic Justice and Peace Commission, our Marriage Tribunal and our Catholic Parliamentary Office. Our Justice & Peace Commission campaigns against renewal of Trident; for fairness for asylum seekers and refugees; for action against climate change; and for the environment. It also networks with parishes and advises our Bishops on social justice, international peace and human rights. Its office supports two employees. Our national Marriage Tribunal processes cases for annulment and supports two staff. Our Parliamentary Office works with MSPs, MPs and the wider political society to promote the influence of Catholic Social Teaching on our law and supports one officer.

In 2024 this collection raised £16,803 with £1,373 from Gift Aid and £1,657 in interest and £8 donations bringing total income to £19,841.

In 2024 our total expenditure was £34,953 with £10,300 as our Diocesan pro-rata contribution to the National J&P work and £24,653 for the Scottish Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency. So, our costs in 2024 were around 76% higher than our total income.

Our 2025 collection income of £16,589 is down by around 1% or £214 on 2024's collection.

SCIAF & Papal & Episcopal & St. Mirin's Fund

The proceeds of this collection are divided 75% to SCIAF and 25% to our St Mirin's Fund. SCIAF is the official aid and international development charity of the Catholic Church in Scotland. It works in sixteen countries across Asia, Africa and Latin America to help the poorest in the world, regardless of religion, to work their way out of poverty. The St. Mirin's Fund awards small grants for good causes that promote the Kingdom of God among us, with special consideration to: children and young people; the elderly; those with disabilities and special needs; those suffering from poverty, mental illness, homelessness; or refugees.

In 2025 this collection raised £26,823 compared to £27,194 in 2024. Total expenditure in 2024 was £36,875 or 35% more than the collection income.



Following the impact of the Carlo Acutis Eucharistic Miracles Encounter in all eight school Clusters, we have included the life of Saint Carlo in the S1 R.E. course and encouraged schools to consider how they can ensure there is a legacy of the Encounter, particularly in devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. The Diocese has obtained four relics of Saint Carlo which will be hosted in some of our High Schools and has also arranged a visit of the relics from Assisi in September 2025 immediately after his canonisation.

The Diocese continues to engage with the National Schools Singing Project. Our Choral Director has been working with all P4 pupils in Inverclyde. Schools have warmly welcomed this initiative and noted how well children now sing at Mass. We have also set up six school choirs which sang at parish Masses. With financial support, we hope to expand this to other parts of the Diocese.

To mark the Jubilee Year, we created Jubilee Prayers for Primary and Secondary pupils. Schools have been creative in engaging with the Holy Year, such as completing Pilgrim Passports and installing Pilgrim Doors of Hope. Pupils who have participated with Jubilee Year events will be presented with a Jubilee Pin badge.

Serving God



The Department liaises with Aid to the Church in Need, Justice and Peace, Mary's Meals, Missio, SCIAF, SPUC and SSVP to encourage young people to put their faith into action: for example, a growing number of our schools have set up 'Mini-Vinnies' Groups (SSVP for children) which have supported a variety of community projects. Speakers from Missio, SCIAF and SPUC have delivered lessons and assemblies in schools. St Ninian's PS and St Joseph's PS, Busby have achieved the Five-Star Missio Schools Award.

Other schools are working toward this. P6-P7 pupils and S6 pupils continue to engage with the Pope Francis Faith Award and the Caritas Award programmes.

EDUCATION: A Closer Look



Diocese of Paisley

The Diocesan Education Department works with schools to support children and young people in knowing, loving and serving God. We also liaise with the three local authorities to represent the interests of the Church on a range of issues. In 2024, the total cost to the Diocese in promoting its educational mission amounted to £68,927 including a contribution of £29,356 to the Bishops' Conference to fund the Scottish Catholic Education Service (SCES).

Knowing God

High quality Religious Education is a key objective. We have published P1-P7 Planners to assist Primary teachers in planning Religious Education lessons. We have also supported schools in delivering 'God's Loving Plan', the Relationships Education programme for Catholic schools. This have been welcomed by Head Teachers and R.E. Coordinators. P3-P7 Planners for Other World Religions (Judaism and Islam) have been developed this year and welcomed by schools. The teaching of the Catholic Faith remains the overwhelming focus of R.E. in our schools. We have developed additional booklets to develop the Religious Education course in S1 and S2, ensuring there is a consistency of experience for our young people, no matter which school they attend. Further work to develop the S3 course will take place in 2025-26. We have also engaged with Principal Teachers of R.E. on reviewing S4-S6 courses.

Loving God



We continue to seek opportunities to enable young people to grow closer to God. Once again, the Sacrament of Confirmation was conferred on P7 pupils by Bishop John in St. Mirin's Cathedral. To support the children in preparing to choose their Confirmation saint, each school was presented with Volumes 1 & 2 of *Our Friends in Heaven*. The Diocese provided 3500 Confirmation Mass booklets. All children were presented with a Confirmation Prayer Card as a memento of this important milestone.

The Department has shared practice in Retreats which have been provided by parishes, FireCloud, the New Evangelisation Team (NET) and Dalmally. In June 2025, Diocesan schools were allocated a week's residential retreat and outdoor experience with Generation Hope. Schools also developed a range of activities to enable young people to encounter Christ on their faith journeys.

We have been encouraging schools to establish Rosary Groups as part of the Diocesan Consecration to Jesus through Mary. With financial support, we provided each P4 child with a Missio Rosary and encouraged them to pray the Rosary for the intentions of the Missions during October. In addition, the Diocesan Travelling Rosary project encouraged families to pray the Rosary with their children. Each class chosen to participate was given a pack to be sent home, containing a statue of Our Lady, a Rosary book and a leaflet to support the family in their prayer.

Holy Places

This collection is for the upkeep and repair of the fifty shrines that are dear to Christians and pilgrims the world over; and for the Church's pastoral, educational, social and cultural mission in the Holy Land, including the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem; the Church of Mary and Joseph's homes in Nazareth; Peter's house in Capernaum; the Upper Room of the Last Supper; Pentecost; the Church of the Calvary and the Holy Sepulchre. In 2024 this collection raised £20,202 which was fully remitted to the Commissariat of the Holy Land.

In 2025 the collection is up to £22,172 (\pm 1,970 or \pm 10% on 2024).

Communications

This collection pays for our national Scottish Catholic Media Office which provides a service to the press and media with information on the activities of the Church in Scotland.

In 2024 total income for Communications was £18,303 made up of collection income £15,688 and £1,400 Gift Aid and £1,215 donations.

Our total expenditure was £22,303, made up of the Bishops' Conference Communications pro-rata of £16,464 computer related costs of £747 and £5,050 for Podcasts productions and other costs of £42.

This resulted in a shortfall of £4,000, which was funded Diocesan reserves.

Our collection income funded 70% of our costs.

In June 2025, members of the Youth Commission were involved in a five-day Summer Camp outside Crieff, with around 100 secondary school pupils from the Diocese of Paisley (S1-S3) participating. The Generation Hope Summer Camp provides a unique opportunity for teenagers to gather together and grow in community and faith.

In June and July 2025, the bi-annual Youth to Lourdes and Young Adults to Lourdes pilgrimages coincided with the larger Diocesan pilgrimage, with 44 secondary school pupils and 12 young adults from across the Diocese participating.

The Youth Office also has a representative on the Scottish Catholic Youth Service (SCYS), so that its own interests are well represented and so that good working relationships with other Diocesan Youth Offices can be developed and maintained. Working with SCYS, the Youth Commission plans to transport secondary school pupils and young adults to the National Youth Pilgrimage in Perth in September 2025.

The four Retreat Days for primary school pupils have proven popular with children and their families. The Youth Commission intends to organise these four Retreats again in the coming year. The Youth Commission is exploring the possibility of organising a pilgrimage for secondary school pupils in the coming year.



JANUARY RETREAT

The Retreat Days and monthly catechetical events for school pupils and young adults are funded entirely from the Diocesan Youth Fund, as are many of the costs associated with national and international pilgrimages.

YOUTH MINISTRY: A Closer Look

FOSTERING FAITH, DEVELOPING FRIENDSHIPS.

Bishop Keenan appointed me as Vicar Episcopal for Youth in September 2024. In the weeks that followed this appointment, a new Youth Commission comprising eight lay people and three clerics was established. Members have experience working with young people from pre-school to 35 years old. The Youth Commission will seek to maintain and strengthen links between what might be considered the three departments of the Youth Office: Primary, Secondary and Young Adults. Its aim is to serve our young people, fostering the faith and developing friendships.

Since September 2024, the Youth Commission has organised and hosted four Retreat Days for primary school pupils (P4-P7); a World Youth Day Conference for S3 pupils; two Acutis Evenings of catechesis, community and prayer for secondary school pupils (S4-S6); and eight catechetical talks for young adults (18-35 years old) - all of which have been followed up by opportunities for the young adults to pray and socialise.



In January and February 2025, members of the Youth Commission engaged with senior secondary school pupils in all eight Diocesan secondary schools, asking them to review past initiatives and provide insights into possible future initiatives. These meetings were overwhelmingly positive and gave cause for great hope.

ACUTIS EVENING

The clear majority of young people intimated a desire to better understand the teachings of the Catholic Church (catechesis) and a need to more easily identify like-minded young Catholics (community) with whom they can share their experiences of faith. The now-established monthly Acutis Evenings were a direct fruit of these meetings with senior secondary school pupils across the Diocese.

Pro-Life (Day for Life)

This collection helps the Diocese support Pro-Life causes with half of the funds collected going to the Bishops' Conference Pro-Life fund. *Parishes also have parochial Pro-Life collections with most of the money being sent to SPUC generally.*

In 2024 this collection raised £19,570 up 31% on the 2023 figure of £13,539.

Peter's Pence

This is the practice of the laity to provide financial support to the Holy See to allow the Holy Father the means to respond to those suffering as a result of war, oppression, natural disaster and disease. Normally Catholics around the world contribute roughly £70M annually through this collection. In 2024, this collection raised £16,348 which was fully remitted to the Apostolic Nunciature (up 1% on 2023's figure of £16,171).

The Apostleship of the Sea

This provides practical and pastoral care to seafarers, regardless of nationality, belief or race through port chaplains and volunteer ship visitors. They welcome, offer welfare services, advice, practical help, care and friendship. Founded in Scotland, the Apostleship is now part of an international network known as *Stella Maris* that works in 250 ports around the world. Ninety per cent of world trade is transported by ship but the life of a modern seafarer is dangerous and lonely. They may spend up to a year at a time away from home, separated from their families and working in harsh conditions.

In 2024, this collection raised £10,152 (up from £9,927 in 2023) which was fully remitted to the Apostleship of the Sea.

Missio Scotland

Missio Scotland is the Scottish branch of the Catholic Church's mission aid agency. This enables missionaries to help communities in need through grassroots projects. They build and maintain hospitals, schools and seminaries; care for people in need; and act for justice in the developing world, regardless of race, stigma, religion or gender. In 2024, this collection raised £26,148 (down from £27,201 in 2023) which was fully remitted to Missio Scotland.

Sick and Retired Clergy

We remember our Sick & Retired Priests of the Diocese with great love and affection. We have eight retired priests, still active in prayer and witness: one living in Rome, one living in Chile, three in houses throughout the Diocese, two in parish presbyteries, and one at the Residence of the Little Sisters. We thank God for the gift of these priests and keep them in our prayers.

In 2024 our two special collections raised £41,279 and Friends standing orders & fundraising £10,736, donations of £5,978 and Tax on Gift Aided donations £5,331 and rental income of £9,695. Our total income was £73,019.

In 2024 our expenditure was £144,456 made up of retired priests allowances £63,330, retired priests' housekeepers and nurse wages £11,926, repairs to properties including grounds £11,884, medical & nursing home fees £4,082, Healthcare Trust £18,099, council tax £7,285, rental of premises £20,040 and various smaller costs totalling £7,810.

Although there is a shortfall of £71,437 of income compared to expenditure, this is offset by net dividend income (less fees) of £78,910 from the Sick & Retired Priests Investment Fund which was set up over 30 years ago for this purpose.

Vocations and Ecclesiastical Students

This collection pays for our Paisley seminarians studying in Rome. In 2024 these two collections raised £37,474 Friends Standing Orders and fundraising £10,190, donations of £3,190 and Gift Aid tax due £4,405, interest on fund balance £1,250, grant income (Jesuits) of £16,667 and votives £2,843 to bring our total income of £76,019.

In 2024 our costs totalled £43,173 made up of student grants £5,538, student fees £24,605, retreats £2,135, travel £2,561, hospitality (vocations Mass) £1,570 and various smaller costs totalling £6,764. From Autumn we will have three students in Rome anticipating higher costs for 2025 onwards. Although there was a surplus of £32,846 in 2024 we are anticipating a deficit in 2025-2026 due to having more students.

DIOCESAN APPEALS

SPRED Special Second Collection

Our Paisley Diocese SPRED offers people with learning disabilities a personal friend who takes time to share life and faith, spiritual nurture in a small community of faith; and a sense of belonging to a parish community. Twenty-one SPRED groups meet in our church halls and special needs schools, allowing two hundred parishioners to come together in faith and friendship to share and experience God's love. Paisley SPRED supports two employees. *In SPRED I feel that I belong and everyone is my friend*.

In 2024 total income for SPRED was £55,817 made up of £26,388 from the Special Collection, Friends Standing Orders £12,735, Gift Aid income of £2,874, Donations of £6,914, Grants £1,000 and fundraising events £5,906.

In 2024 total expenditure for SPRED was £75,427 made up of wages related costs of £71,335, electricity £2,132, gas -£3,135 (refund for over charge), telephone and internet £1,138 and various smaller costs totalling £3,957.

In 2024 the deficit for the SPRED fund was £19,609 which was funded from general reserves. In 2024 collection income of £26,388 funded 35% of the total costs.

In February 2025 the collection decreased to £18,581 down -£7,808 (-30%) on the 2024 figure.

Education

This collection supports the Scottish Catholic Education Service (SCES) which promotes and protects our Catholic schools in issues of national significance; and supports our schools, parishes and dioceses. The national office supports three employees and we also employ four part-time local members of staff to work in our schools and on the RE curriculum.

In 2024 this collection plus donations raised £17,878 with £1,666 for Gift Aid claims and £3,020 in donations and £1,965 fundraising, bringing total income to £24,509.

Our expenditure for 2024 was £68,927 made up of our SCES pro-rata contribution of £29,356, diocesan salaries of £31,851, resources £891, travel costs £409, hospitality £1,040, printing £2,140, stationery £1,455, computers and software £989 and other costs £796.

This resulted in a deficit of £44,418, as collection income covered only 26% of expenditure, with the deficit having to be funded from general reserves.
