### NEW YEAR RESOLUTION WITH MARY ~ REV. EDWARD OKORIE CSSp

The name "January" comes from the Roman god Janus, the god with two faces, one looking to the past and the other looking to the future. This is indeed a time to look back at the year that has just ended and to look forward to the new year ahead of us. How did I spend this one year of my life that has just passed? Did I use it to advance my goals and objectives in life? Did I use it to enhance the purpose of my existence? Could I have done better last year in the way I invested my time between the demands of work, family, friends and society, and the demands of my spiritual life? What things did I achieve last year and what did I fail to achieve? How can I consolidate the achievements of last year while reversing the failures and losses in this new year? Through soul searching questions like these we find that a review of the past year naturally leads to setting goals and resolutions for the new year. There are people who tell you that there is no point making new year resolutions. Do not believe them. We must set goals and make resolutions as a necessary conclusion to our review of the past year. And we do need to review our lives from year to year because, as Socrates says, the unexamined life is not worth living.

Today's newspapers are full of individual and collective new year resolutions. Most of those, however, are not resolutions at all but only wishes. What is the difference between a resolution and a wish? A wish identifies a goal one wants to reach, a resolution specifies the steps one will take to reach it. A wish says this is where I want to be, a resolution says this is the road I will take, this is what I will do to get there. The wishful person says "I want to pass my exams this year" and the resolved person says "I will devote an extra hour to my studies everyday in order to pass my exams." The wishful person says "I will have more peace and love in my family this year" and the resolved person says "I will spend more time with my family at table instead of rushing off to the TV, so that we get to know and understand ourselves better." The wishful person says "I will live a life of union with God this year" and the resolved person says "I will set aside this time everyday to pray and hear God's word." The difference between wishing and resolving is: are we prepared to do what it takes to make our dreams come true, are we prepared to pay the price?

The gospel presents Mary to us as a model of that new life in Christ that all of us wish for ourselves in the new year. There we see that Mary was prepared to do something to realize this goal. What did she do? We read that the shepherds, when they went to adore the Child Jesus in the manger, told all that the angels had said to them. "But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart" (Luke 2:19). Again after the boy Jesus was found in the Temple, we are told that "His mother treasured all these things in her heart" (Luke 2:51). Mary was a woman who valued the word of God, who treasured it and made time to meditate and ponder it. It is true that the holiness of Mary is attributed to the grace of God, but this should not make us forget that she needed to make an effort in order to cooperate with the grace of God. She pondered the word of God in order to discern what God was saying to her at every stage in her life as the handmaid of God.

The two examples above of Mary pondering the word of God, namely, after the visit of the shepherds and after the finding in the temple, show that Mary found the word of God both in divine revelation (the angels' words to the shepherds) and in her own experiences (her encounter with her son in the temple). Similarly, God speaks to us today through divine revelation (e.g. the Bible, the teaching and preaching of the Church) as well as through our personal experiences, if only we made time to reflect on them as Mary did. Whatever the situation in which we find ourselves - a hardship, a disappointment, a decision to make - God has a solution, an answer that is right for us. We tell God about it in prayer but we also listen to what God has to tell us about it. Prayer is a conversation with God but sometimes all we do is pick up the phone, read out the list of our problems to God and drop the phone without listening to hear what God has to say to us. Let us today resolve to listen more to the voice of God, to treasure God's word and ponder it in our hearts. Then shall we be able to realize our new year resolution of a new life in union with God.

### RENDER UNTO CAESAR A FINANCIAL COLUMN

Welcome to the first edition of 2025. This month, I thought it could be of interest to compare this month's dashboard to the one from a year ago. The first dashboard with the purple boarder is the most current one (November 2024). The one with the blue border is from November 2023.

The most telling numbers are the ZRSR (Zero Revenue Solvency Ratio). This ratio indicates how long a parish could stay open without any donations. 4 of our parishes have increased their solvency year-over-year. The exceptions to this positive trend are Sacred Heart and St. Benedict Parishes. A funding appeal was made at Sacred Heart in December and we are planning to engage St. Benedict parishioners in January.

The Holy Father, Pope Francis, has decreed that the Jubilee Year was inaugurated on December 24, 2024, the solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord, with the opening of the Holy Door of the Basilica of Saint Peter in the Vatican.

On Sunday December 29, 2024 at 11:00 am, the feast of the Holy Family, the opening of the Jubilee was celebrated in all dioceses. The solemn opening of the Jubilee Year took place at the celebration of the Eucharist at which the diocesan bishop presides in the cathedral church, mother of all the churches of the diocese. This was the only Eucharist to mark the opening of the Jubilee and was celebrated

in the cathedral. The opening Mass for the Diocese of London was celebrated by Bishop Fabbro at 11:00 am on Sunday, December 29th and can be streamed at <a href="https://www.lncc.dol.ca">www.lncc.dol.ca</a>.

### Luce, the official mascot of the Jubilee 2025

During a press conference on October 28, 2024 Archbishop Rino Fisichella officially presented the mascot of the 2025 Jubilee, "Luce".

This character, designed by the illustrator Simone Legno, was designed with the intention of reflecting pop culture, popular among young people, and brings with it a message of hope and welcome.

Luce is a pilgrim dressed as a typical traveler: a yellow anorak to protect herself from the elements, dirty boots that bear witness to the path she has already travelled, a missionary cross around her neck and the pilgrim's staff in her hand. Particularly evocative are Luce's eyes, which shine with an intense light: they symbolize the hope that is born in the heart of every pilgrim, and reflect the desire for spirituality and connection with the divine. They act



as a reminder of the universal message of peace and brotherhood. The choice of a mascot like Luce is part of a broader context, aimed at reaching new generations and promoting intergenerational dialogue. The mascot not only represents the Jubilee, but is also a symbol of community, of welcome and of sharing. She is accompanied by a pet dog named Santino and three friends named Fe, Xin, and Sky. and her guardian angel.



Luce will also be the mascot of the Holy See's pavilion at Expo 2025, which will take place in Osaka, Japan, from April to October, 2025. The pavilion—which will be inside Italy's national pavilion—will have the theme "Beauty brings hope," and display the 17th-century painting The Entombment of Christ by Caravaggio—the only one of his works housed in the Vatican Museums.



Blessing your home For centuries, Christians throughout the world have had a tradition of "chalking doors" on the solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord (January 5 this year), which celebrates the manifestation of Christ to the nations.

> Inspired by the Magi, the family uses chalk to mark the lintel or doorpost with the following symbols:

- The numbers are for the year.
- The crosses symbolize Christ's cross.

-The letters are the initials of the traditional names of the Magi: Caspar,

Melchior and Balthazar. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "May Christ bless this house."

This offers everyone from the home a reminder that Christ has blessed the home and all those in it.

### Here is a simple blessing from the U.S. bishops' book Catholic Household Blessings & Prayers:

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

### SOCIAL JUSTICE & MISSIONS



### SOCIETY OF SAINT VINCENT DE PAUL

The Inn of the Good Shepherd does a very good job of promoting the good works it does in the community and, as a result, receives very good community support. The SSVP serves all members of the Sarnia community and has some similar, but lesser known programs including the foodbank, a rent and utility assistance program, ready made food packages distributed to homeless persons, Coats for Kids, in conjunction with the K of C and it serves as the umbrella organization for several other charitable activities. It would be great to have some person(s) out promoting the SSVP in the larger community.

Volunteers can always be used doing various jobs at the Foodbank. At this time, the Irish Miracle collected almost 800 boxes of food that needs to be sorted by contents and date. An hour or two per week would be helpful. Five minutes of training is all it takes. Since there is no contact with the general public, no police check is required.

At the parish level, money is collected to provide food/gift cards to needy individuals at Christmas and any extra money is given to the Foodbank and Help Centre for its programs. Several parishes need persons to collect money at the door to the church after Mass and to be the Treasurer of SSVP for that parish. Volunteers from several parishes distributed food/gift cards to needy persons during December. Each of these activities is a small but worthwhile time commitment.

The SSVP operates from 4 buildings in Sarnia and 3 in the County. Repair and upkeep is always needed to keep the employees and customers safe and comfortable. It would be great to have a small team of handy persons to do small repairs and cleaning and to help oversee the maintenance of the buildings.

The SSVP employs about 30 men and women to staff its retail stores, warehouse and foodbank. Someone with an interest in retail would be helpful to assist in the stores for an hour or two each day to relieve the paid staff for lunch or breaks. The warehouse collects a large volume of items each day that need to be sorted for resale, recycling or disposal. Volunteers would be helpful.

Consider making it a New Year's resolution to become involved with the SSVP. I think you will find it to be interesting and rewarding.


