<u>Special Collection</u> – Special Collection for Sunday, August 29th is for St. Vincent de Paul, which helps those in need in our local community.

About the Cover - Pictured on the bulletin cover is an emblem found at the top of one of our stained-glass windows. It's the one closest to the choir loft on the Union Street side of our church. It depicts a shock of wheat. Agricultural practices have changed tremendously in the last 140 years since these windows were put in place. There was a time in July and August when wheat (cut in the field by a "cradle") was tied together in a sheaf. The sheaves of wheat were then stacked together in a shock which remained in the field to continue drying until threshing time. Threshing was separating the grains of wheat from the chaff and straw. The grains of wheat were then ground into flour which made the bread. The bread, "fruit of the earth and work of our human hands... become for us the bread of life." This year of 2021 is the year of the Gospel of Mark. However, the flow of its continuous reading each Sunday in Ordinary time is interrupted for five continuous Sundays by selections from the sixth chapter of John's Gospel called the "Bread of Life" discourse. It isn't by chance that the "Bread of Life" is heard during the time of the wheat harvest. The Church takes the time to savor the words and actions of Jesus as He talks about the Bread of Life and the hunger of humankind.

Message from Fr. Hinterschied

Christ is "King of kings and Lord of lords." (Rv 19:16) On earth, though, He said, "My kingdom does not belong to this world" (Jn 18:36): He reigned from the throne of the Cross with the power of love. Today is the Octave Day of the Assumption, dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary (as is the entirety of August) and to her Queenship, however it is superseded liturgically by the Lord's Day as it doesn't rank as a "first class" feast/Solemnity.

Mary is Queen and "Our Lady" because of Christ and like Christ. After being assumed into Heaven, she was "exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son" (Lumen Gentium 59). To some, the title "queen" can appear antiquated. However, it indicates her present status as seated beside her Son, the King of Glory.

Her reign of peace will be brought into our hearts and homes by our devotion to her and her chaplet, the Holy Rosary.

Do you yourself, or someone you know have interest in exploring more the tenets of the Catholic faith? Please get in contact with me (phone or email). I've already received several inquiries, *Deo gratias!* And if you are thinking of inviting someone else, fantastic, but don't just invite, plan to support them in their study and prayer.

I've been mightily impressed with several parishioners sharing their Catholic faith with neighbors, even inviting them to come for Sunday Masses here. These are instances of sharing the Gospel of Salvation. Keep it up!



AFFIRMING OUR FAITH

Reflection on John 6:60-69

There is both some painful questioning (How can anyone take this seriously? Does this shake your faith? Do you want to leave me too? But where else would we go?), and some deep affirming (As for me and my family, we will serve the Lord! You have the words of eternal life. I have come to believe you are God's Holy One!) in our Scripture readings this weekend. I would suggest that with this paradox both are necessary for a lively faith.

I know that my life has been a journey of discovery, in the truth of Graham Green's observation that, "if we really believe in something we have no choice but to go further." Going further and deeper into the discovery of what I believe, affirm, value is a life-long project, as the depths of God's call will have different implications for the many seasons of our lives. I have found that it is often through wrestling with the hard questions in life that I can affirm what is good and true and beautiful.

One of the dangers in this faith journey is falling into the trap of seeing God as an object of my thoughts, when the truth is, that I am a reality in the mind of God. This truth frees me to be in right relationship, with God and with others, knowing that growing in God means submitting to, deferring to, being subject to one another in love.

ST. MONICA

Feast Day: August 27 • Patron Saint of Conversion

The circumstances of St. Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law, and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa.



Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy – "all flesh is evil." For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on, she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him.

When he was 29, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead, he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan.

In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, St. Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her. Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter 387, St. Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death.
