St. John Nepomucene Neumann, C.SS.R., Fourth Bishop of Philadelphia

John Neumann was born on Holy Thursday, March 28, 1811 at Prachatitz in Bohemia (now Czechoslovakia). While in the seminary at Prague, he developed a great desire to dedicate himself to the American missions, where German speaking priests were desperately needed. His scheduled ordination in his home diocese in 1835 was postponed because of the illness of the bishop. Thus, in February, 1836, with forty dollars in his purse, he sailed from LeHavre, France in steerage passage, arriving in New York after forty days. He was ordained by Bishop John DuBois in June, 1836.

After serving in northwestern New York for four years, he entered the congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (the Redemptorists) in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He labored as a priest in New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland, traveling hundreds of miles on foot! John Neumann, a student of botany, astronomy, and mathematics, was a man of many tongues. He spoke German, Czech, Greek, Latin, Italian, Spanish, French, Gaelic, and English.

On Passion Sunday, March 28, 1852, he was consecrated Bishop of Philadelphia. He worked hard for the establishment of parish schools and for the erection of many new parishes, especially national parishes for the numerous immigrants.

He was also the first Bishop in the United States to prescribe Eucharistic Devotion (Forty Hours) to The Blessed Sacrament in his diocese.

Bishop Neumann died on January 5, 1860, at the age of forty-nine and was beatified in 1963. On June 19, 1977, Pope Paul VI added him to the ranks of the canonized saints of God. His feast day is celebrated on January 5th.

Immigrants, driven by great dreams poured out of Europe. They came with little else except the powerful and sustaining hope of a better life for themselves and their children. Their faith was as rugged as themselves and because of men like John Neumann, they made the Catholic Church in America one of the world's most flourishing.

The inscription quotes St. John Neumann: "Wherever I meet someone, I shall treat him as though he were the Lord Himself."

In the narthex of our church you will see the beautiful collage created in 1978 by former parishioner, Barbara Ann Hauck, depicting the highlights of the life of our parish patron, St. John Neumann, C.S.S.R., Fourth Bishop of Philadelphia.

Left edge - parochial school system - his gift to America.


Upper left - promotion of the veneration of the Immaculate Conception.

Upper right - served rural areas for several years as a frontier priest.


Lower right - introduced Forty Hours Devotion in his diocese.

History of the Church



The parish of St. John Neumann in Lancaster, Pennsylvania was dedicated on Sunday, June 19, 1977 and, on the same day in Rome, Bishop John Neumann was canonized a saint. The actual church was established on December 16, 1978. The new church was blessed by then Msgr. William H. Keeler who also performed the dedication. Fr. John Acri, who led the new parish until May, 1980, was named the first pastor.

Fr. Acri was succeeded as pastor by Fr. Patrick Devine and in 1982 the new rectory was dedicated by Bishop Keeler. Demonstrating the rapid growth of the parish, a new addition to the original facility was built in 1990. On June 15, 1994, Msgr. Richard A. Youtz became the third pastor of St. John Neumann Church and a library dedicated for the use of the parish family was blessed on April 2, 1995.

The parish's growth and resulting spatial needs was further manifested when, on Sunday, June 9, 2013, ground was broken for the first phase of the construction of a Religious Education Center to be dedicated to the soon-to-be named Saint, Pope John XXIII. Msgr. Youtz blessed the site with water from Lourdes, France and spoke of the youth who would benefit from this structure.

The patron of this Education Center, Pope John XXIII, was a surprising pope and, over 50 years after his death, he is still popular as an authentic image of the Good Shepherd. He carried out the Christian duties of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy and his warmth, good humor, and kindness captured the world's affections. President Lyndon B. Johnson posthumously awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the United States' highest civilian award.

On Sunday, April 27, 2014 Phase I of this facility was dedicated by Bishop Ronald Gainer, Diocese of Harrisburg, on Divine Mercy Sunday and the day that the patron of the building and Pope St. John Paul II were canonized. By the end of the following month, Msgr. Youtz had retired and our fourth pastor, Fr. David L. Danneker, Ph.D. had taken up residence. On June 19, 2016, Fr. Daniel Powell became our Pastor. We pray that God will continue to guide us as we move forward in faith.

As is apparent, in a very short period of time St. John Neumann Church has had a tremendous impact on the community it is committed to service. Many of its 2400 families are involved in at least one of the ministries covered in this booklet and we encourage more of you to become involved.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

R.C.I.A.

*is the special **process** of **discernment** and **preparation** for reception
into the **Catholic Church**.*

The **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults** is the special process of discernment and preparation for reception into the Catholic Church. RCIA is the normal way in which adults become full, active, and participating members of the Catholic Church and it includes prayer, reflection, and study of the Catholic faith, its practices, and teachings. Throughout the process, participants will have opportunities to explore how God is acting in their lives and inviting them into an even deeper and more powerful relationship with Him.

The RCIA program is open to all adults who have a sincere desire to explore the Catholic faith. This includes: persons who have never been baptized in the Christian faith and seek to join the community of believers (catechumen).

Those persons who have been baptized in another Christian community but are now seeking to enter into full communion in the Catholic Church (candidate), Catholic adults who were baptized in the Catholic faith, but have never been fully initiated in the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist (candidate).

Others who participate in the RCIA process are sponsors for the catechumens and candidates. The sponsors play a very important role in offering support and encouragement through their prayer and example.

Baptismal Preparation

This ministry is designed to instruct and prepare parents for the celebration of the Rite of Baptism for their child. Catholic Church teaching on the scriptural, theological, and liturgical foundations of Baptism is reviewed, as well as, the more practical questions and concerns parents may have.

Sacramental Formation

Confirmation

Preparation for a young person's reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation occurs over the course of two years in 7th and 8th grade. LifeTeen's EDGE program on Sunday evenings provides a thorough overview of the Catholic faith in a manner that invites each young person to encounter Jesus and the Holy Spirit, as they prepare to be fully initiated into Christ's Body at Confirmation. Our students learn about the Holy Spirit through the Scriptures and the Church's Saints to understand His great power and love in making Jesus present in the world through His Church. By genuine prayer and worship, learning about their faith and its demands on an age-appropriate level, acts of Christian service, exploring the lives of the Saints who modeled discipleship, and growing in Christian community with one another, our students prepare their hearts to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and use His gifts to further the Kingdom of God in the world. Our Religious Education program partners with parents to make and mature young disciples of Jesus Christ in preparing together our students for Confirmation.

Family Faith Formation: Pre-K through 8th Grade

In order to support the efforts parents are making to grow in their Faith with their children, parents will meet once a month with the Family Faith Formation Department to discuss how everything is going for each family and discuss what the next month's lessons include. Additionally, all of the Family Faith Formation Families will come together once a month for a social activity to help create community amongst them. The program we use is called A Family of Faith and empowers parents to grow in their Faith with their kids.

The primary and essential objective of our catechesis (instruction in the faith) is to bring our students into study and contemplation of the "mystery of Christ" within the context of evangelization – to place them "not only in touch but in communion, in intimacy, with Jesus Christ" (*Catechesi tradendae*, no. 5).

In Family Faith Formation, our aim is to teach not only concepts, but to teach the Person of Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ is the teacher in our classrooms, and it is His teachings and life that we pass on to our students. It is Jesus who saves us and offers us eternal life.

Family Faith Formation is distinct, however related to Sacramental Formation.

In order to help parents prepare their children for the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Communion, and Confirmation, we will take some time during the year to focus on the Theology of these Sacraments, how to prepare for them, and how to receive them. Parents are reminded that they are the first catechists of their children, and that any preparation we do as a class is supplementary to the instruction they have first provided for their children.

Youth Ministry

In the modern world everywhere teens go there are expectations put upon them to “belong.” In School you have grades, in sports you have practice, in friends you have social time, and at home you have helping in the house.

Pressure to excel creates a strongly motivated, self-starting, individual, but also creates a lot of pressure. If unchecked, crippling pressure. At the end of the day, Summit is a place where teens can come to and do not have to study, practice, or be top tier anything to belong, and to be loved.


Opportunities for Volunteer Involvement:

Additional special events include game nights, First Friday activities, and service opportunities.



Children's Liturgy of the Word

This ministry is offered at the Sunday 9:00 a.m. Mass from September through May for children grades K through 6. The children are dismissed from Mass before the first reading and led to a room where they will listen to the same readings as in the Church, but on an age appropriate level. Since this ministry requires three volunteers, a leader who leads the children in reflecting and discussing the readings, a cantor who sings the responsorial psalm and alleluia, and a reader who reads the first and second readings, this ministry is in need of volunteers on a regular basis. Eucharistic Adoration

Adoration of the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is held every Wednesday from 12 Noon to 3:00 p.m. in the main sanctuary of the Church. Liturgy and Worship

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

Extraordinary Ministers assist the priest distribute Holy Communion at the celebration of the Eucharist. This need is particularly accentuated since both species are usually offered i.e. the Body of Christ and the Precious Blood. Training for this ministry is in two parts, a two hour session that covers the significant aspects of the ministry, usually held in Harrisburg or another diocesan parish, and an hour session at St. John Neumann Church that instructs on the specific practices and procedures followed here. All appointments to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are made by the Pastor with the mandated approval of the Bishop of the diocese. If you are interested in this ministry, it is suggested that you express your desire to the Pastor.

Ministry Scheduling for Masses

Scheduling for Readers, Extraordinary Ministers and Altar Servers is compiled four times a year. Notices are sent to all listed in these categories about a month and a half before the new schedule is due to begin. Service Initiatives

Parish Health Ministry

The mission of this ministry focuses on the wellness and healing of our parish family by addressing the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of our parishioners. The central figure in this ministry is the parish nurse. She is a trained professional who utilizes a holistic approach to help restore a sense of wholeness and healing to those in need. Recognizing the interrelationship of mind, body and spirit, she/he focuses on offering healthcare with an emphasis on the spiritual according to the beliefs of the Catholic Church and the practices of the St. John Neumann family.

Some of the work included in this ministry is:

- weekly visits to parishioners in local hospitals.
- home visits to the homebound, infirm, or newly discharged from a hospital or rehabilitation facility who have identifiable special needs.
- occasional visits to parishioners in local nursing homes, in addition to coordinating and scheduling masses at selected nursing facilities.
- acts as a resource and advocate for parishioners and their families who have complex medical or emotional issues. This may include accompanying a person to a doctor's appointment and/or providing counseling for an individual and their family.

Volunteers are needed in many areas of this ministry, a few of which are as follows: Health professionals to take blood pressure screenings the last weekend of the month after each Mass, parishioners willing to drive older people to Mass or doctor appointments, and people to visit the homebound or those in nursing facilities to provide friendship and spiritual comfort from their parish community.

Also, if qualified, bring the Eucharist to those who request it. We need people who are willing to provide an occasional meal for those parishioners in crisis and parishioners offering prayers for people in need of God's healing love.

“Off The Streets”

Background

Off the Streets is a non-profit, charitable program which began in Connecticut in 2009 to get the homeless, or about to become homeless, persons “Off the Streets” and into a room they could call their own. There is no paid staff– all manpower is from volunteers, with no overhead or office related expense. No government money is accepted– all donations come from individuals, places of worship, or commercial institutions. Almost every dollar collected goes directly toward a security deposit to a landlord of a qualified, homeless person who is able to pay a monthly rent but cannot afford a security deposit. All of the “living needs,” such as beds, furniture, linens, and household items are donated. All of the foregoing contributes to our ability to get a person “Off the Streets” for approximately \$500. The Lancaster PA chapter began in May 2013 and by May 2017 more than 1,000 people were helped into permanent housing through security deposits and/or furniture donations.
