The use of the **Advent Wreath** is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent.

When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

*All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:
Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response (R/.) Who made heaven and earth.
Then the Scripture, **Isaiah 9:** (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or **Isaiah 63** (lines 16-17 & 19) or **Isaiah 64** (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

R/. Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says: Lord our God,
we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ:
he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples,
he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us,
he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God,
let your blessing come upon us
as we light the candles of this wreath.
May the wreath and its light
be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation.
May he come quickly and not delay.
We ask this through Christ our Lord.
R/. Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from
"**O Come, O Come, Emmanuel**":

O come, desire of nations, bind
in one the hearts of humankind;
bid every sad division cease
and be thyself our Prince of peace.

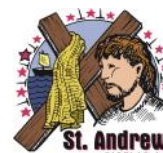

Preparing for Christmas with the

Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is a popular Catholic Advent custom that originated in Germany. An Advent wreath consists of four candles (three purple, signifying penance, and one rose, signifying joy), surrounded by evergreen branches. One purple candle is lit the first week, two the second week, two purple and one rose the third week, and finally all four are lit in the last week of Advent. The light of the candles signifies the light of Christ, Who will come into the world at Christmas.

The History of the Advent Wreath While the Advent wreath is a feature in many Catholic homes and even Catholic churches during the season of Advent, it actually originated among the Lutherans of Eastern Germany in the 16th century. It was quickly adopted by both Protestants and Catholics throughout Germany, and it was brought to the United States by German immigrants, both Catholic and Protestant, in the 19th century.

The Advent wreath has deeper origins as well, extending back to pre-Christian customs of burning candles during the darkest months of winter. Medieval Christians retained the custom while seeing such lights as a symbol of Christ.

Making Your Own Advent Wreath It's very easy to incorporate the Advent wreath into your preparations for Christmas. You will need four candles—traditionally, three purple and one rose, though you can substitute white. Then, you will need some evergreen boughs (yews, mountain laurels, and holly work well) to arrange around them. They don't even have to be in a circle; you can place them in a straight line—say, on the mantel over the fireplace. (For detailed and illustrated instructions, see *How to Make an Advent Wreath*.) If you would rather buy an Advent wreath ready-made, Catholic bookstores and religious-supply shops sell reusable Advent wreath sets, and you can purchase some online.

Blessing Your Advent Wreath Once you have your wreath set up, the next step is to bless it. That's usually done on the First Sunday of Advent, or the evening before; but if you didn't do it then don't worry—you can do it any time during Advent. You can find instructions for blessing the wreath in *How to Bless an Advent Wreath*. To make the occasion even more special, why not invite your parish priest to dinner and ask him to bless the wreath and candles? If he is too busy around Advent, you could have him do it in the weeks before.

Making the Advent Wreath a Daily Custom The Advent wreath helps us keep our thoughts focused on the coming of Christ at Christmas, so we should integrate it into our daily activities. The easiest way is to make it a part of our evening meal. The family gathers around the wreath and lights the appropriate candles. The father (or other leader) prays the Advent wreath prayer for that week, and the candles are left burning during the meal. (For detailed instructions, see *How to Light the Advent Wreath*.) After Grace After Meals, you could read the daily Scripture reading for Advent or recite the Saint Andrew Christmas novena before extinguishing the candles.

Using the Advent Wreath During the Christmas Season Advent ends, of course, with Christmas Eve, but that's no reason to put the Advent wreath away. Many people add a large white candle to the center of the wreath and light it, along with the other four, starting on Christmas and going all the way through Epiphany. It's a good way to remind ourselves that Christ is the reason for the preparations we made during Advent, and it also helps us remember that Christmas doesn't end on Christmas morning, after all the presents have been opened.

Breaking Bread Homeless Ministries News From The Streets...

His Name is Pedro ~ Part 1

On our recent mission trip to Brazil to visit a children's home we met a boy named Pedro. Pedro seemed to be about 10-11 years old, and when he first arrived at the home he was bouncing off the walls. Social Workers/Psychologists did not know what to do with him. We were told that when Pedro did arrive he had previously been diagnosed with ADD, and had been taking at least 12 medicines to help curb his hyperactivity. Before arriving at the home he had been adopted by a couple who initially could have no children, but would later conceive a child of their own. So now, the couple had two children. For one reason, or another the couple divorced, and Pedro was left to live with his adopted mother. His mother (*broken and hurt by her husband's abandonment*) would accuse Pedro of being the reason the marriage did not work out. She did this constantly until she decided that she would no longer be responsible for Pedro's welfare, and simply returned him to authorities. As our team all sat and listened to Carlos, the Social Worker share Pedro's story of rejection, tears welled up not only in his eyes, but I would find myself with a large lump in my throat as well. Carlos explained how some children at the home would receive visits from relatives at times (*an aunt, or grandparent*), but Pedro would never be one of those - so in desperation Carlos searched Pedro's file for any bit of information. During his search he found one small piece of paper with a phone number on it, nothing else just a number. (*to be continued*)...

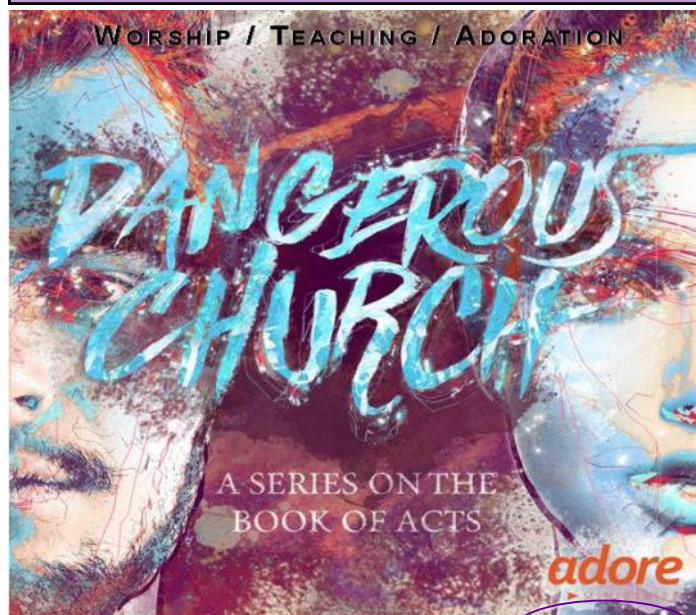

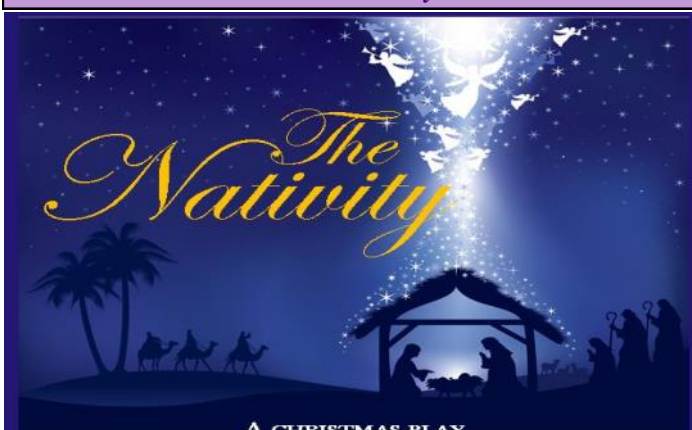

“QUÉ ALEGRÍA CUANDO ME DIJERON: “VAMOS A LA CASA DEL SEÑOR”

VIGILANCIA



Mt 24,37-44.- Con este domingo comienza no sólo un nuevo año litúrgico, sino también el tiempo de Adviento. Estas semanas de Adviento tienen un doble sentido: son un tiempo de preparación para Navidad y, además, se recuerda la segunda venida de Cristo al final de los tiempos. Adviento es, por eso, un tiempo de alegre espera en la doble venida del Señor. En los primeros días se destaca más el aspecto escatológico, es decir, la esperanza en la segunda venida de Cristo. Lo podemos verificar fácilmente en las lecturas bíblicas de hoy.

En la lectura del Antiguo Testamento, el profeta Isaías nos revela su visión de la Ciudad Santa de Jerusalén, símbolo del Reino de Dios en el cielo. Los hombres de todos los pueblos se encaminarán hacia esta ciudad celestial, que se halla al fin de nuestro camino, al fin de nuestra vida terrenal.

En la segunda lectura, San Pablo nos exhorta a decidarnos a favor del camino de Cristo para llegar a esa ciudad celestial: “Dejemos las obras propias de la oscuridad y tomemos las armas de la luz.” Necesitamos las “armas de la luz” que Cristo nos da, porque nuestro camino es un camino de luchas, de tentaciones, de tinieblas. Pero quien vive en la espera de la venida del Señor, no se detiene, ni se instala, sino que camina en la luz de Cristo, usando ese tiempo de decisión: “Vosotros sabéis en qué tiempo vivimos y que ya es hora de despertar”. Este tiempo es para nosotros el último tiempo: hoy decidimos nuestro futuro, nuestra vida eterna.

El Evangelio da hoy nos muestra muy claramente las consecuencias de nuestra decisión: unos serán aceptados, otros rechazados por Dios: “De dos hombres que estén en el campo, uno será llevado y el otro dejado. De dos mujeres que estén moliendo, una será llevada y la otra dejada”. Nos recuerda también que nuestra muerte, así como el retorno de Cristo, serán inesperados como un ladrón en la noche, o repentinos como el diluvio. Y para ser aceptados como amigos al final de nuestra peregrinación, Cristo espera y exige de nosotros la actitud de vigilancia, tal como lo indica el Evangelio de hoy: “Estad preparados, porque el Hijo del Hombre vendrá a la hora menos pensada”. Esta actitud de vigilancia, atención, apertura, Jesucristo no sólo la enseñó, sino más aún la vivió: durante toda su vida terrenal, Él se conduce bajo el signo de esa vigilancia.

Su alimento es hacer la voluntad del Padre que le ha enviado entre los hombres. Pero esta voluntad no le es señalada por una revelación privada. Para Jesús, como para todo hombre, se trata de descubrir en el transcurso de los días lo que debe ser su camino. Y éste no está fijado, no está claro para Él desde el primer día. Todo lo contrario: Jesús interroga sin cesar los acontecimientos que atraviesa, para saber en cada momento qué es lo que debe hacer. Y, reconocido su camino, Él lo sigue con fidelidad y obediencia perfectas, aunque le cueste y lo conduzca hacia la cruz. Esa actitud de Cristo tiene que ser también la de todos nosotros. Esa actitud, esa conducta de Cristo tiene que ser también la de todos nosotros.

Y entonces la vigilancia exige de nosotros:

- Abrirnos para las sugerencias y los signos de Dios;
- Descubrir tras los acontecimientos el deseo y la voluntad de Dios;
- Ser atentos y fieles al seguir ese camino por el que Dios nos conduce.

La vigilancia se entiende así como fidelidad en el momento presente. Nos atamos al pasado; nos parece importante, porque lo hemos vivido. Pero fue ayer, y hoy ya no tenemos ningún poder sobre él. Nos seduce el futuro, porque en sueños podemos formarlo a nuestro gusto. Pero no existe aún y con nada nos ocupa. El presente pasa tan rápido que no le concedemos mucho valor. Pero sin embargo es el único que está en nuestro poder, y nuestra vida es sólo un conjunto de momentos presentes. Quien quiere acertar en su vida, que ponga el pasado en manos de Dios, déjele el futuro y viva plenamente, uno tras otro, cada momento presente. Porque Dios nos espera en el minuto presente. Y decir “Sí” a la invitación de Dios, al anuncio de cada instante, equivale para nosotros a estar plenamente presente. De este modo, la vigilancia es permanecer fiel en este camino de entrega total en cada momento presente.

Queridos hermanos, estamos celebrando la Eucaristía. Pidamos, por eso, a Jesús, que en esta celebración de Adviento nos dé la gracia de apertura, de disponibilidad y de vigilancia:

- Para que todos nosotros quedemos fieles en nuestro caminar hacia la Casa del Padre;
 - Para que reconozcamos los signos y deseos de Dios en cada momento;
 - Y para que estemos siempre preparados para la llegada repentina e inesperada de nuestro Señor Jesucristo.
- ¡Qué así sea! En el nombre del Padre, del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo. Amén.
