

## **BUILDING OF THE MARIAN GROTTO**

In December of 2022, Father Robert approached our then Grand Knight, Chris Woodward, to see if the Knights of Columbus would be interested in and willing to take on a project to build a Marian Grotto in the alcove area on the side of the church near the columbarium. The knights agreed to take on the project and used the time during Lent to fundraise for the construction of the grotto.

The team, chaired by Michael Beben, discussed concepts of statues, various ways to construct the support structure for the statue, and the environment surrounding the statue. After several

meetings, a statue was selected. Once a final design concept was selected, the team then chose September 16th as the day to break ground.

Once the basic foundation and statue base were completed, the final construction was begun. In this phase, a stone veneer was placed around the statue base. This particular veneer was chosen because it is the same stone



veneer that was used in the construction of the church and chapel buildings.

When the construction of the Grotto was complete, we worked with our Pastor to schedule the dedication and blessing of the grotto. December 8th, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, was chosen as the date for the dedication and blessing.



Following the evening Mass, the congregation processed to the grotto area for the blessing. Father Robert and Deacon Tom Hill performed the dedication ceremony.

Our Council couldn't be prouder of our contribution of creating a new prayer space for the faith community of Holy Infant.

### **GATHERING IN GOD'S HOUSE**

On the Sunday after Christmas, the Catholic community gathers at church to celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. If Christmas falls on a Sunday, the feast is transferred to Friday, December 30, because the following Sunday is January 1, the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God.

Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the feast of the Holy Family fell on Sunday during the week after January 6. The revised calendar has moved the observance closer to the commemoration of the birth of Christ and therefore to the "birth" of his family. The Scripture readings may change from yearto year, but the Gospels tell episodes from the early days of Jesus' family life: the flight into Egypt to escape the forces of Herod, the Presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple, and the finding of the twelve-year-old Jesus in the Temple.

All these events are human and hopeful. The other readings provide stories, psalms, and reflections on the beauty of family life. For families reunited to celebrate Christmas, this feast provides a fitting opportunity to gather again in God's house.

The Book of Blessings and the Catholic Household Book of Blessings and Prayers both contain blessings for families. These can be offered by a priest or a deacon, or by any layperson at home. This feast would be an appropriate day for any family to seek the blessings that come from God, who became like us by living with human parents.

The Collect for the Mass prays that we may imitate the Holy Family by practicing the virtues of family life and by the bonds of charity. In this way, we who share a house on earth may enter the household of God in heaven.

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# REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S SCRIPTURE

Sirach 3:2–6, 12–14 Those who fear the Lord honor their parents.

Psalm 128 "Blessed are those who fear the Lord and walk in his ways."

Colossians 3:12–21 or 3:12–17 Clothe yourself with heartfelt mercy.

Luke 2:22-40 or 2:22, 39-40

The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. Today we hear practical guidance and wonderful inspiration regarding treating those close to us, particularly family members. Sirach, which has provided moral teachings since the second century BCE, speaks of the honor we owe our parents, especially as they age. Saint Paul counsels the early Christians in the virtues that should direct how we treat others. Luke relates the profound responses the child Jesus elicited in the temple when Mary and Joseph presented him to the Lord.

How does my faith affect the way that I treat the members of my family? How can my faith help me grow to be a better parent/sibling/daughter/son?

## Oblates of St. Francis de Sales

## STANDING, WAITING, LOVING

If you read these reflections, you know I love using stories! I share this quality with my older brother, Fr. Michael Newman, OSFS. Like many Oblates, we use stories in all of our homilies. Today, I'm going to tell another story; it is a hard story. However, I believe we have a spirituality that gives insight into the whole human story. Therefore, I do not need to hide from hard stories.

In August of 2020 my middle brother, John, died very suddenly of a pulmonary embolism. He was 38 years old. His funeral was the hardest thing I've done as a priest. I remember his burial very well. His grave is adjacent to the Oblate plot at Resurrection Cemetery in Toledo, Ohio. Six of my students served as my brother's pallbearers. They carried him to his grave; then Michael and I prayed over his tomb using the ancient prayers for Christian burial. Those prayers have been recited over countless brothers, sisters, mothers, fathers, sons, daughters, wives, and husbands.

Following the prayers, we stood there at his tomb for 10 minutes as people began to leave. At that moment, a fellow teacher and friend from St. Francis, Brenda, came up to me and said, "Joe, your students are not going to leave you until you tell them it's okay." There, next to us were my six students, standing, waiting, and loving.

I didn't want to go over there. These were my students, and I was their teacher. I'm supposed to be smart, strong, and invincible, but I was just weak, heartbroken, with red eyes from tears. I went to them, thanked them, and told them how much it meant to me that they were there. One looked at me and said, "Father, we wouldn't be anywhere else. We want to be here."

The message for Advent is quite clear, "Ready or not, here I come!" I fight this message and often say to the Lord, "Don't come yet, give me time to become perfect. You don't want to be near me now! I'm weak, heartbroken, with red eyes." We hear from the Lord, "I don't want to be anywhere else. I want to be here. I am next to you, standing, waiting, and loving." We respond back with the Responsorial Psalm from our first Sunday of Advent, "Lord, make us turn to you, make us turn to you."
