LENT PREPARATIONS FOR CHILDREN

Lent lies at the very heart of our Catholic faith. It is a time when we reflect on the dying and rising of Christ that has made our salvation possible. The three Catholic observances we follow during Lent — prayer, fasting, and giving alms — engage us in body, mind, and spirit. Focusing on these traditional observances will bring your family closer to Christ and to one another.

- Figure out what you're "giving up".
 - Even though "giving something up" for Lent is traditional, consider taking up extra prayers, going to Adoration, or attending daily Mass.
- Think "Prayer, Fasting, Almsgiving"... how are we going to do more of these things during this season?
- Plan to attend an Ash Wednesday service with your family on February 14th.
- Go to Confession.
- Go shopping for meatless-meal groceries and simple foods.
 - Check out information on Greener Lent on our Ministry page to learn more about the global impact of giving up meat.
- Participate in Stations of the Cross activities.
 - Our Forever Young Ministry is hosting a soup gathering before Stations on February 16th at 5 pm in the Hospitality Room - All are welcome!
 - Children's Stations of the Cross is on **March 22nd** at 6:30 pm.
 - Each week the tomb created by our Arts & Environment committee will change as we grow closer to Holy Week and Easter.
- Pray the Rosary.
- Decorate your home for Lent such as putting a crucifix more centrally located in your home, extra crosses, etc.
- Holy Week/Easter plans can hold their horses. We need to observe Lent first.
 - Talk with your children about the importance of observing Lent in preparation for Holy Week and Easter.

STAY CONNECTED

This weekend we hear from Job, a short excerpt in the middle of one of his responses in a long, existential dialogue with three friends. It's important to understand the Book of Job as a literary work meant to convey certain universal ideas and not a historical account of an actual conversation.

These six short verses succinctly summarize so much of what many of us struggle with daily. The monotony of daily life, feeling like cogs on a wheel trapped in an oppressive system, kept awake at night by our thoughts, time itself rushing by faster and faster before we have a chance to see happiness again. Perhaps it's some consolation that folks in 500 B.C. had many of the same problems we do today.

We often talk about how we respond to God's generosity or love, and the good things we experience. But perhaps more often we're defined by how we respond to adversity, suffering, disappointment, and pain. The Book of Job provides a process for us to emulate. Job enters into honest dialogue with friends and with God. It takes a while (42 biblical chapters) but these relationships eventually bring Job back from the brink of despair (even with the help of some intercessory prayer!), and he's restored and able to live out a content and long life.

Unfortunately, our response to suffering and confusion, sometimes understandably trying to protect ourselves, is to turn inward and isolate ourselves from others. This seems to be getting worse with what is becoming an epidemic of loneliness. We cannot heal ourselves. As illustrated in the Gospel story of healing this weekend, we need the empathy of others, and we need God's grace.

Let's keep our eyes open for those going through a time of despair or suffering, and make the effort to reach out to them. And for ourselves, in our struggles, let us be at least as wise as Job, reaching out to those who care for us when we need someone to listen, and never stop talking with God, even in our darkest moments.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S SCRIPTURE

Job 7:1–4, 6–7 I am filled with restlessness until the dawn. Psalm 147 "Praise the Lord, who heals the brokenhearted." 1 Corinthians 9:16–19, Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel.

22–23 Mark 1:29–39 Jesus cured many who were sick with various diseases.

There's nothing like listening to a passage from Job to bring a person down. What happens to the poor guy ranges from tragic to miserable, leaving him in the throes of despair. Still, he turns to God for mercy and healing, much as the people of Capernaum later looked to lesus.

Listening to the word of God today, may we renew our trust in the Lord in the face of illnesses and difficulties. How do I best learn more deeply about Jesus?

Oblates of St. Francis de Sales

CULTIVATING "REAL" INTELLIGENCE

Each year on the feast of St. Francis de Sales (January 24), the patron saint of Catholic journalists, the pope publishes a message for the celebration of World Communications Day (celebrated on the Sunday before Pentecost). The theme for the 2024 message concerns the revolution of "artificial intelligence" and the challenges that this poses to truly human communications.

We know that Francis de Sales was quite intelligent and a successful communicator! After all, he is recognized as a "doctor" of the Church, whose writings remain insightful for knowing the way to salvation. So, too, he is considered a "master" of sacred eloquence, whose spoken knowledge from the pulpit provides light for the intellect and warmth for the will.



Not surprisingly, then, our patron saint champions the work of the mind. From a young age, he pondered the power of reason – really, its "beauty" – as that which distinguishes human beings from all other animals (when we use it!). Standing in a long line of Christian humanists, Francis holds to the view that reason gives us the ability to govern our lives, even when our thoughts or passions seem to battling within us.

That's why he so values learning, recommending that we "study more and more, with diligence and humility" (Letters, XXI:11). It's why he could often be found personally teaching the catechism to the people in his diocese (initiating what we now know as C.C.D.). The saintly bishop also instructed his clergy routinely on topics in theology, even going so far as to claim that "knowledge, to a priest, is the eighth sacrament of the hierarchy of the Church" (Oeuvres, XXIII:303) – because erroneous teaching has the power to lead souls astray!

But in Salesian Spirituality, there's more to intelligence than just smarts. For Francis, knowledge finds its ultimate purpose in love. The operations of the intellect that he describes – thought, study, meditation, and contemplation – are intended to lead and unite us to Wisdom itself by way of an appreciation of the truth, beauty, and goodness of God.

Yes, our patron saint was eminently intelligent. But the wisdom he shares through his writing and speaking is always inclined to what is practical and live-able. Though mystical in its magnificence, it comes down to us as "inspired common sense" (Elisabeth Stopp).

That's the kind of intelligence that can benefit us. Faced with today's challenge of information overload, we find ourselves having to navigate the turbulent waves of digital news (real or fake), political arguments (conservative or liberal), and public opinions (logical or not). Perhaps now more than ever, "we need to have a well-balanced and reasonable mind" (Introduction to the Devout Life, III:36).

Reading (again) the works of St. Francis de Sales is a great place to do that. Surely his saintly wisdom will help us to cultivate our own minds, so that we might learn to live in love. That, ultimately, is the mark of an intelligence that is "real" not artificial.
