### SENT BY GOD, JUST FOR ME

A STEPHEN MINISTRY EXPERIENCE

I was 26, newly divorced, living far away from family and friends, and dealing with a lot of guilt, shame, and low self-esteem. Was I a total failure? Would anybody ever want me? Was God condemning me because of my divorce?

When I shared some of this with my pastor, he suggested a Stephen Minister.

We got together weekly. She'd ask me questions, get me talking, and then listen as I shared my struggles and doubts. She showed me God's love even when I didn't feel it. Over time, her faithful care helped me to see that perhaps I wasn't such a terrible person after all.

After a while, I got to a better place emotionally, and our Stephen Ministry relationship ended. A few years later, I remarried and had a miscarriage, and she was there for me again as a Stephen Minister, providing the care and support I needed. We now live over a thousand miles apart—but she will always hold a special place in my heart.

If you're dealing with any kind of difficulty, if you're struggling with faith questions or doubts, if you're wondering whether you are a worthy person, then I encourage you to consider getting a Stephen Minister. It just might be that God already has a special one picked out just for you.

#### **GREENER LENT SMASHING SUCCESS**

We did it! Greener Lent participants smashed through our goal of \$5,000 and raised \$12,792 for the poor in four poor African dioceses that suffered from a lack of clean water.

We had a small part of a big project, and digging started as funds were being donated. Currently, 93% of the boreholes have been successfully dug, benefitting 15,386 Adults and 19,568 children! The project is expected to be completed in July. Additionally, 440 Adults have been provided with training and sanitation education to make sure the wells don't fall into disrepair and continue to provide clean water.

Thank you for the 72 gifts that helped make this water available. And, thank you for the prayers for those suffering from a lack of clean water in Africa, and for protection of God's creation. There is so much bad news about the environment, but we are the source of good news. There is a water crisis in Africa, but we brought hope and love.

#### LIVING IN GOD'S TIME

We talk about having time, making time, and wasting time. We spend time, kill time, and count time. Time flies and time heals. It appears that "time" is quite the companion on our human journey!

The Church also speaks in a special way about time, using two words coined by the ancient Greeks. Chronos is clock time—as we indicate in the word chronological. It's the seconds, minutes, hours, and years of our lives.

Kairos is a different kind of time. Kairos speaks about the quality of time. It's what we mean when we speak of the "right time," the "perfect time," or an "opportune time." It could be a rich moment or an extended period of clarity and presence. Many of us have had experiences that were so crystalized that we felt as if time stood still. That's kairos!

When we speak of "God's time," we use the word kairos. It is the "fullness of time," as mentioned in Paul's letter to the Galatians (4:4–7), and what the Second Letter of Peter references with the statement "with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day (2 Peter 3:8). Kairos is the space in which the temporal and the eternal meet. When we are swept up in prayer, when we are no longer checking our watch. When we are fully in the moment, we are in the sacred time of kairos.

As Christians, we believe that the universe is pulsing with the grace of God. We only have to stop and see to begin expanding our experience of sacred time. In Mark 8:18, Jesus asks all of us, "Do you have eyes, and fail to see? Do you have ears, and fail to hear?" What are you not seeing? Hearing? Sensing? Feeling? Have a conversation with your children about how you "spend" your time. Do you rush a lot as a family? Do you make time to sit and have an evening meal, lingering and talking for a while?

If time was truly something precious and sacred, how would you spend it differently? Let your inquiry into sacred time be rich. Our God-in-time will be with you! Trish Sullivan, ©2016 Archidiocese of Chicago & Liturgy Training Publications

## Oblates of St. Francis de Sales



#### **NOWHERE ELSE**

My alma mater, DeSales University, is about 500 miles away from my hometown, Toledo, Ohio. Since I didn't have a car in college, my dad drove the 8 hours from Toledo to DeSales every year to pick me up for summer break. Usually, he would stay overnight at the Oblate residence on campus, Wills Hall. Then, we would drive together to Toledo the following day. I thank the Oblates at DeSales for hosting my dad. He loved staying with them.

I feel as though I reveal many of my shortcomings in these reflections in DeSales Weekly. Well, here is another one - I'm always late. I chronically over-schedule and underestimate the time it will take to accomplish a task. I write this fully knowing my community will reinforce this personal insight at tonight's dinner.

After my sophomore year in college, my dad arrived, and I had not packed a single thing. Library books needed to be returned, furniture needed to be stored, and personal items packed. I knew I would not be ready for an early morning departure. I looked at my dad and I said, "I am sorry. I know you took time off of work and drove all the way here for me. I am not ready." I felt terrible, like I was wasting my dad's time. I was so upset with myself. In response, my dad said: "Joe, you are my son. There is nowhere else I'd rather be." After hearing that, the tension left my jaw, and we worked to pack up the dorm room.

I often have this same discussion with God. I often confuse our loving God with a dutiful one. With our spirituality emphasizing God's presence in the here and now, I often whisper those words I said to my dad: "I am not ready for you. You shouldn't be here. I don't deserve it." But our God isn't present out of duty or obligation. God doesn't secretly want to be somewhere else. God says, "You are mine. There is nowhere else I'd rather be."

Francis de Sales captured this in a letter of spiritual direction written in 1604. He writes: "Do all through love." This is not only a suggestion for our lives, but it flows from Francis' knowledge of God. "All through love" is perfectly derived from the most commonly cited biblical passage, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son" (John 3:16).

Do all through love. You are Mine. There is nowhere else I'd rather be.

May God be praised!
