DESALES CENTER CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

In 2016, Holy Infant laid out a two-phase plan to prepare for our parish's future. With 850 families at the time, the plan was to provide parish facilities that would adequately meet the existing and future needs of our parishioners. Phase 1 of the plan was to build a new worship space which was completed in 2021 and has no debt remaining associated with the facility. The construction included the new church, chapel, and columbarium.

Now with nearly 1200 families and growing, the need to proceed with Phase 2 of the campus improvement plan to renovate and upgrade the old worship space (now known as the DeSales Center) into a facility to enhance our education, meeting, and ministry fellowship spaces has never been more apparent.

DeSales Center Renovations

- Engineers report identified several building systems needing replacement including: HVAC, lighting, roofing, ceilings, insulation and ADA restrooms.
- Reconfigure and renovated CGS rooms with new flooring and wall finish
- Reconfigure and renovate Fellowship Hall with new flooring, lighting, wall finish and new platform
- Expand and renovate restrooms to modern building codes Estimated Cost; \$2,045,000

DeSales Center Upgrade Additions

- Add 3 Flex Rooms to support growing needs or education and other ministries
- Double the kitchen size with all new cabinets, solid surface countertops, appliances, flooring and new cooking, food prep, clean-up and storage areas
- Add a Welcome Lobby with a left to move the stairs inside out of the weather
- Add unisex restrooms in the lobby
- Add a covered Arcade between the Lobby and the Church



MISSION OF CRS RICE BOWL

Rooted in the history of the Eucharistic Congress, CRS Rice Bowl invites Catholics and faith communities in the United States to encounter God and our global family throughout Lent by practicing the pillars of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lenten alms donated through CRS Rice Bowl support the work of CRS in more than 120 different countries each year. Twenty-five percent of donations to CRS Rice Bowl stay in the local diocese, supporting hunger and poverty alleviation efforts. Since its inception in 1975, CRS Rice Bowl has raised more than \$350 million.

Lenten alms go to alleviate hunger and poverty in communities around the world and in the U.S. Seventy-five percent of gifts support CRS' international humanitarian programs. Some examples include:

- · Agriculture projects help farmers improve harvests
- Water and sanitation projects bring clean water to communities
- Microfinance projects support small businesses
- Mother and child health projects offer health and nutrition services
- Education projects provide resources and training

The other 25% of gifts remain in each U.S. diocese where they are given to hunger and poverty alleviation efforts in those communities. Each diocese uses this differently.



SERMON ON THE PLANE: THE SETTING

Jesus raised his eyes to his disciples and said...

In this weekend's Gospel from Luke, what time of day is it? Probably mid-morning. Jesus has spent all night praying, and made his important choice of apostles at dawn. Then he comes down the mountain to a "large area of level ground," and a huge crowd of disciples and people seeking healing gather around.

This monologue is often called "The Sermon on the Plain," in contrast with Matthew's "Sermon on the Mount," but I suspect these are both true descriptions. People in Jesus's day did not have microphones and loudspeakers, but they understood acoustics and the practice of speaking to large crowds. The Greeks had built amphitheaters all over their empire three hundred years earlier, so everyone knew that the optimal arrangement for public speaking is a bowl-shaped hollow.

If Jesus is on top of a mountain, speaking down to a crowd, his words will be lost in the wind. But you can find bowl-shaped places today around Galilee that are perfect for speaking to large groups. One famous Bible story has Jesus preaching from a boat to a crowd on the shore. I've seen the traditional place with my own eyes and heard it with my own ears. It makes perfect sense if you are familiar with how sound can carry over the water, especially if there is a wall or natural amphitheater behind you to reflect the sound. In both the Sermon on the Mount and the Sermon on the Plain, I suspect Jesus found an optimal natural amphitheater, where he could speak up to the gathered crowds—not down to them.

This is why it says he "raised his eyes to his disciples." He was literally looking up at them.

I think this visual image is important, because it is a sharp contrast to the way modern public speaking happens. Our pulpits and stages are usually above the gathered audience, and the speaker is literally speaking down to us. This is only practical in modern buildings with electronic amplification. In old churches and cathedrals, they used domes or vaults of stone to create an artificial amphitheater over the heads of the congregation.

So in the great outdoors? I picture Jesus speaking up to his disciples and the gathered crowds. He looks tiny down there, one person among our many. He looks so... human. Like anyone else. Like one of us. So when he opens his mouth and the first words are "Happy are you who are poor," I get chill bumps.

Incarnate One, thank you for coming down to our level and being one of us.

WEEKLY SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Jeremiah 17:5–8 Psalm 1 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20 Luke 6:17, 20–26

Jeremiah warms us up for the Gospel today by speaking of whom God blesses and whom God curses. Using imagery from nature, he drives home his message: trust in the LORD. Jesus' message echoes Jeremiah's, blessing those whom society treats as outcasts and warning those who have it made by social standards. During this Jubilee Year of Hope, let us put our hope in he who has power over death itself, a hope rejected by those who live life, as Paul wrote, "for this life only."

What about my life is Jesus calling me to change so that I may be blessed? If I have plenty of money, food, and happiness, what can I do to be blessed?

Next weekend we celebrate the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time when Jesus shares one of his most challenging teachings, to love our enemies and turn the other cheek.

Oblates of St. Francis de Sales

ST. FRANCIS DE SALES AND DON BOSCO: EVANGELIZERS

St. Francis de Sales lived two hundred years before Don Bosco but was admired tremendously by him. Why? Because of his zeal for souls! Don Bosco made De Sales' motto his own – Da Mihi Animas Caetera Tolle – Give me souls, take away the rest. It was the tremendous passion for helping people love Jesus deeply, avoid sin and acquire virtue, and set their eyes firmly fixed on Heaven that was the great gift that both Saints brought to the Church. They were zealous evangelizers.

The Feast of St. Francis de Sales is coming up on January 24. The Feast of Don Bosco is coming up on January 31. Francis was a holy bishop who won people of all ages over toward Jesus and the Catholic faith during the time of the Reformation in Europe. Bosco was a holy priest who spent his life working with boys and young men to win them over toward becoming men of virtue and faith who would live productive lives as good Christians and good citizens. Both men were given a charism by the Holy Spirit and commissioned by God to spread it. They opened their hearts to receive the gifts of kindness, joy, optimism, teaching, preaching, love of the Sacraments and Our Lady – and a tenacious drive for the work of evangelization.

Regarding evangelization, one thing that stood out about St. Francis de Sales was his ability to take risks in order to save souls and to preach, teach and convert people for Christ. He spent his entire life as a priest and a bishop reaching out to others instead of waiting for people to come to him, walking through the country villages and dialoging with people who were skeptical and confused about religion – particularly Catholicism. Francis de Sales was a creative evangelizer with a missionary heart! He did things that were truly novel compared to his contemporary clergymen:

- He wrote booklets and pamphlets and distributed them door-to-door
- He spent long hours giving spiritual direction and advice
- He opened up his parish church for Q&A time on Sunday afternoons

Don Bosco gathered young people informally on weekends and created an environment of faith and fun. Through his presence with them, his care and compassion for their situation of poverty and their need for formation arose and he got busy educating and evangelizing them:

- He provided an oratory with an open door where they felt at home
- He gave catechism lessons and Sacraments to boys who otherwise would not go to church or attend their parishes
- He provided job and work skills training so they could get jobs and be employed
- He identified and invited the boys who showed leadership potential to get involved in leading his ministry

In the Church today we are very much in need of zealous evangelization. Fear prevents risk. Laziness and telling God "get someone else" isn't going to build the Kingdom of God here on earth. You and I need to step up as evangelizers. Imagine how our Church can move forward today and how we can promote lives of faith and virtue amongst the people we encounter. It could happen – if each and every one of us considered ourselves zealous evangelizers who are willing to go out and live our baptismal call to be missionaries of Jesus Christ and the Gospel. It could happen. And it starts with us accepting our own call to holiness and nourishing our relationship with God so that we might share his love with others.
