- Reconfigure and renovated CGS rooms with new flooring and wall finish
- Reconfigure and renovate Fellowship Hall with new flooring, lighting, wall finish and new platform
- Expand and renovate restrooms to modern building codes Estimated Cost; \$2,045,000

DeSales Center Upgrade Additions

- Add 3 Flex Rooms to support growing needs or education and other ministries
- Double the kitchen size with all new cabinets, solid surface countertops, appliances, flooring and new cooking, food prep, clean-up and storage areas
- Add a Welcome Lobby with a lift to move the stairs inside out of the weather
- Add unisex restrooms in the lobby
- Add a covered Arcade between the Lobby and the Church Estimated Cost: \$1,798,000



FISH FRY DATES





A PRODIGAL GOD

Parables like that of the prodigal or lost son find a way to capture the imagination of even secular men and women. The image of a father who runs to his son, who embraces him even before he can confess his misery, is attractive to the human person. There is a God who is not merely waiting for us to return. Instead, there is a God who has come to seek us out, bringing us home to enjoy the finest banquet. We Christians confess a prodigal, or excessively generous, God.

In Joshua, we remember the last Passover that Israel celebrated before entering the Promised Land, a land flowing with milk and honey. The land, for Israel, was gift beyond gift. It was not something that the Israelites earned through their virtue. Jacob lied. Joseph set himself up as the most important son among his brothers. Israel grumbled against God in the desert, afraid that there would be no food. The God who rescued them from slavery in Egypt, the God who entered into their history, gave bread from heaven. From this motley, unknown tribe, God would make a people. God would give land. God would dwell among them. God gives.

The parable of the lost son underlines the prodigal generosity of this God. The youngest son wants his inheritance. He wants his father dead. The father is not a source of infinite generosity for the youngest son. Take the money and run. Yet, the oldest son suffers from the precise same confusion. He believes that he is earning his keep from his father. He grumbles and complains that he has remained loyal to the father. He doesn't see any value to the relationship beyond an economic one. He cannot find a space in his heart to rejoice over his youngest brother's return. Because he cannot fathom or imagine the generosity of his father. Sin is a refusal to accept the prodigal generosity of the God who does not operate according to the same limited economy that we do. To

accept this generosity, the prodigal graciousness of God, requires that we are made into a new creature. The sacrifice of love on the cross reveals the prodigal generosity of God.

Jesus Christ comes into a world of power and prestige, fame and fortune, and manifests a love that has no limits — a prodigal generosity that enters into death itself. This is the "new thing" that St. Paul addresses. To become an ambassador of Christ means that we must live into the prodigal generosity of God. This would be impossible if it was up to us alone. But through baptism we have been made co-heirs with Christ. It is the very spirit of God that lives and breathes in us, transforming our stingy will into a prodigal one.

This is the hope that we must communicate to those preparing to enter the Church this Easter season. We Christians operate according to a prodigality that is defiant of the darkness of the limited generosity of this age.

NO GREATER LOVE

During this season of repentance, the Church asks us to reflect on the suffering and death of Jesus. His sacrifice is a model of selflessness and genuine love. He challenges all of us to a supreme sacrifice. Twenty-five years ago, the Church recognized a group of religious women who made the ultimate sacrifice by giving their lives for their neighbors and friends during one of the darkest times in modern history.

The Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth (CSFN) are an international religious community of women with deep roots in Poland. During the Second World War, a group of sisters stationed in the town of Nowogrodek (now part of Belarus) saw the suffering of the townspeople. Most of the town's Jewish population was killed or sent to concentration camps. During the summer of 1943, members of the Catholic population were arrested and sent to work camps or killed. The Sisters offered daily prayers for the people but also made known that they were willing to offer their lives in sacrifice for the prisoners. The superior of the convent, Sister Mary Stella, CSFN, told her pastor of the collective prayer of the community: "My God, if sacrifice of life is needed, accept it from us and spare those who have families."

On July 31, 1943, the sisters were summoned by local Nazi leaders to their headquarters. The superior asked one of the sisters to stay at the convent to care for the pastor. After a night of interrogation, the ten nuns were driven outside of town. Clustered in a remote forest, they were all shot and buried in a common grave. It took over a week for the pastor and the townspeople to find out they were killed and discover their graves. On March 19, 1945, the pastor had their bodies exhumed and buried in the parish church. In March 2000, the nuns of Nowogrodek were recognized as martyrs for the faith and were beatified by Pope John Paul II.

The sacrifice these eleven sisters made can be a way we reflect on our call to "live Jesus." The murder of these women religious reminds us of the death of other World War II martyrs like St. Maximilian Kolbe. Their communal sacrifice is comparable to the Carmelite martyrs of Compiegne who were guillotined during the French Revolution (and canonized by Pope Francis this past December). In the Salesian tradition, we think of the Visitation nuns from Madrid who were martyred during the Spanish Civil War in the 1930s. Again and again, these women and men religious remind us that "there is no greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends (John 15:13)." In this season of love and repentance, Christians can look at the way those who have gone before us have responded to the Gospel by "becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross (Philippians 2:8)."

Lent calls us to feel the pain and suffering of our sisters and brothers worldwide who suffer in so many ways. Whether it is war in Ukraine, poverty in our nation, violence in our streets, or hunger in our homes, we who follow Christ are asked to make sacrifices in the way we live our lives. Let us remember the many martyrs of our faith by following in their footsteps. We might not be called to give our lives, but we are all called to genuinely love.
