A Prayerful Farewell to Pope Francis

On Easter Sunday, in his "Urbi et Orbi" Message, Pope Francis remarked that the day had finally arrived when the song of Alleluia was heard once more in Church, passing from "heart to heart," making "the people of God throughout the world shed tears of joy." Easter is the feast of the triumph of hope. "The resurrection of Jesus," the Holy Father taught, "is indeed the basis of our hope." Quoting the Easter Sequence, he proclaimed: "That is why, today, we can joyfully cry out: 'Christ, my hope, has risen!"

As of Easter Monday the people of God shed tears of sorrow at the passing of the Bishop of Rome. In this Holy Year he called all the faithful to be pilgrims of hope with the risen Jesus, "witnesses of the victory of love and of the disarmed power of life." Now that his earthly pilgrimage has come to an end, may his own witness empower us to live the joy of the Gospel and recognize Christ both in the brother or sister on the way with us and in the breaking of the bread.

In his Apostolic Letter, Totum Amoris Est, Pope Francis praised our St. Francis de Sales for his own passion for the mission of the Church. He wrote: "Francis was impressed and intrigued by the great issues emerging in the world, by the novel ways in which they were being approached, by the new and remarkable interest in spirituality and the unprecedented questions it raised. In a word, he sensed an authentic 'epochal shift' that demanded a response couched in language both old and new." The Holy Father concluded: "That same task awaits us in this, our own age of epochal change. We are challenged to be a Church that is outward-looking and free of all worldliness, even as we live in this world, share people's lives and journey with them in attentive listening and acceptance."

As we pray our farewell to Pope Francis in the days ahead, let us honor him even more by bringing our distinct Salesian passion for the mission of the Church to every encounter we have with a fellow pilgrim of hope. May all cry out: Christ, my hope, has risen!

We are accepting a variety of children's items, including:


- Clothing: Newborn through youth size 18-20, all seasons welcome



Oblates of St. Francis de Sales

INHERIT THIS CROSS

Before Oblates take their first vows and receive our profession cross, we are taught why there is no body (no corpus) on this cross. It is to remind us that we are on that cross with Christ. It is our body that touches this cross. When we are baptized, we go through a death to the world and are brought to a new life in Christ. Deciding to take vows in religious life is a further consecration, a further immersion into our baptismal call: to die and rise with Christ. Our vows call us to take up our cross daily for the love of God and for the love of our brothers and sisters.

When I took first vows, I received a cross. It wasn't a new cross, though. I inherited a cross from an Oblate who had lived before me and had passed away. My cross belonged to Fr. Joseph Bowler, OSFS. I never met Fr. Joe, and I still know very little about him, but I know that from the day he took his first profession of vows as an Oblate, Fr. Joe wore this cross all of his life, and when he passed, it was finally removed from around his neck.

Occasionally, when I pray or when I'm going through tough moments in life, I hold my profession cross in my hands. I examine its etchings and patterns. I look at the scrapes, dents, and scratches that are traced on the face of it, and I remind



myself that this cross is something that I inherited. It witnesses a life before mine. It is a hopeful reminder that the Christian life, while at times difficult, is possible.

When this cross was removed from around Fr. Joe's neck for the last time, something subtle and symbolic occurred: he was free from the burden of the cross. The cross that he received at his baptism, which he willingly consecrated and took upon himself at his first profession, was lifted from him, and he received the promise that Christ gave to him at baptism: that he would receive the fullness of Christ Himself. I like to imagine that when the profession cross was removed from his body, Christ was there looking at Fr. Joe, loving him, and said, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Come, rest, and enjoy the banquet that I have prepared for you."

I love that I have inherited this cross, which Fr. Joe wore. It reminds me that this Oblate life, this Christian life, is possible and very much worth those moments when the cross feels heavy and burdensome. The cross that I now wear, he wore for most of his life. This cross has been carried through difficulties and challenges. It has witnessed sickness and suffering, and it was also there for all joys and moments of celebration, too. The fact is that no matter what happened in Fr. Joe's life, in both the good times and the bad, the cross was there to remind him that the hardships of life are not the end. I pray it does the same for me.

Some of us may have inherited a cross from a relative or a friend. It may hang above our bed or around our neck. Yet, all of us who have been baptized in Christ have inherited the cross of Christ. St. Francis de Sales wrote that, "Mount Calvary (the Cross) is the academy of love." Crosses can be seen as burdens, but when we learn to see our crosses as gifts, they become the most effective means of learning what it means to love and to love well.

Let the crosses that we mount on our walls, that we wear around our necks, or carry in our hearts be a call to live according to the love that the cross represents. Take hold of the cross and do not let go. Inherit this symbol and promise of Christ. Let it be a hopeful reminder that one day He will come and lift this cross from around our necks, just like He did for Fr. Joe, and say to us, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Come, rest, and enjoy the banquet that I have prepared for you."

DeSales Center Renovations

- Engineers report identified several building systems needing replacement including: HVAC, lighting, roofing, ceilings, insulation and ADA restrooms.
- Reconfigure and renovated CGS rooms with new flooring and wall finish
- Reconfigure and renovate Fellowship Hall with new flooring, lighting, wall finish and new platform
- Expand and renovate restrooms to modern building codes Estimated Cost; \$2,045,000

DeSales Center Upgrade Additions

- Add 3 Flex Rooms to support growing needs or education and other ministries
- Double the kitchen size with all new cabinets, solid surface countertops, appliances, flooring and new cooking, food prep, clean-up and storage areas
- Add a Welcome Lobby with a lift to move the stairs inside out of the weather
- Add unisex restrooms in the lobby
- Add a covered Arcade between the Lobby and the Church Estimated Cost: \$1,798,000

- Pave the gravel parking lot
- Professional fees
- Permits and Insurance
