QUESTIONS ON SEXUALITY LOOM LARGE AHEAD OF YOUTH SYNOD

According to the official working document for the upcoming synod of bishops on youth, the major questions for young people ahead of the October discussion surround issues of sexuality and gender, the role of women and the desire for a Church that knows how to listen.

Key issues highlighted in the document are not only increasing cultural instability and violent conflicts, but that many young people, both inside and outside of the Church, are divided when it comes to topics related to sexuality, the role of women, and the need to be more welcoming to members of the LGBT community.

Young people are also concerned that at times the Church can seem distant, and have voiced a desire to have a Church that is close, transparent and up-to-date, and which is not afraid to talk about the tough issues. Family will be a key topic of discussion, especially in light of the conclusions on the 2014-2015 Synod of Bishops on the Family. Bishops also noted that religion no longer

holds the same weight that it did in the past, and that for many young people, simply being "spiritual" is enough.

In the pre-synod meeting, youth had voiced concern about feeling as if they were being put into a corner, and felt that generally they were not taken seriously, especially when it comes to leadership.

The document also touched on both the risks and benefits of technology and social media, including the dangers of the "dark web," and the role of music, art and sport as forms of expression.





THE VOICE IN THE WILDERNESS

In the field of entertainment, one of the reality shows that I enjoy watching is The Voice. Contestants go on stage to perform their prepared songs while the judges have their chairs turned around. In this way, the judges do not see who is performing. They listen intently to the contestant's voice while they sing. And if they admire the tone of their singing with such good quality, they turn their chairs around to see whose voice that is who is singing. If all the judges turn around, each judge will try to persuade the contestants to get their vote so they can belong to their team. Each judge will have their own set of singers. Although the show may be so amusing, there is a voice that is far different from being entertaining. It is the kind of voice that minds and hearts need to listen intently. This voice is something that enriches the soul and leads to greater sphere of looking at the whole picture of life. Even though the voice may not be of quality as that of a great singer but the message that goes along with it can make the path of life and faith become meaningful and promising.

The Birth of John the Baptist whose feast day we are celebrating this Sunday stirs our minds to wonder how things came to be for him and his parents. How God works in mysterious ways to provide a child for an elderly couple? How God chose this child

to prepare the coming of His Beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to save all of humanity? In all His might and graciousness, God makes all things possible.

Celebrating the birth of John the Baptist this Sunday presents to us an inspiration and a challenge. Inspiration because by his way of life, he lived simply but very profound in His ways, always listening to the Voice of God and fulfilling his role to be the voice in the wilderness. John the Baptist was the precursor of Jesus for His coming into the world to prepare the people of Israel for this wonderful and saving encounter with Jesus, the Savior of the world. It is also an inspiration because we know that God can do many wonders in our lives. If we live like Zechariah and Elizabeth recognizing God in their lives, we can also receive His grace of goodness and joy.

The birth of John the Baptist also poses to us a great challenge. That is, to listen to his voice of repentance and be like him, faithful to God in all our ways. We know that there is a great danger ahead of us when we speak about Jesus and His truth. When we talk about our faith, oftentimes we are snubbed because it is not at all pleasing to someone's hearing. People these days only like to be entertained. But the real voice that we need to listen to is that voice that brings light and goodness. We are called to herald Jesus' coming again. May we like John be the voice in this present time.

EXAMINING MISSED GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES

In parishes across the United States -- in all demographics, income levels, and geographic areas – participation in Mass by registered parishioners is declining.

On average, participation by registered parishioners is declining by one percent each year. This is concerning, but there’s hope – the percentage is dropping but Catholics are not “un-registering” from parishes...in an age where the trend is to NOT be on mailing lists.

Research into the decline indicates that 50% of families quit regularly attending Mass after their children are baptized and 20% of families quit regular attendance after the children’s First Communion.

Worse, 75% of families who continue attending Mass until the children are confirmed quit regularly attending Mass. This drives the question, “why are people not coming?” The Church says that the fault may lie in how we conduct faith formation – we need to use the RCIA model, with emphasis on “behavior” vs “content.”

Research says Building Relationships with Parents is Critical to Reversing the Trend of declining participation. Parents learned content as a kid, not behavior. Church says teach behavior. New data says parent must model behavior of Catholics. Parents are gatekeepers of what kids see and do. No relationship with parents, no contact with kids. Research says kids stay when parents teach LIFE through the lens of faith. Parents don’t know this if they only learned content.

Research also says older Catholics are the core of ministries, participating in ministries at a much greater rate than other younger adults. We must find a way to include all age groups in ministries and parish life. Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers. Younger people learn best when they are engaged to ACT. Young adult parishioners who do not regularly attend are increasingly adopting secular values from television, movies, music, and internet. In an age not long ago, Sunday was for Mass – that was the norm – but not in today’s world.

What can parishes do? We won’t change “what” we believe, but parishes must adopt models that reach parishioners. Change how we teach and inform, and, if parishioners are not coming to us, we must go to them. Parishes can: engage families post-Baptism, post-First Communion, post-Confirmation; adopt faith formation methods that are behavioral – e.g., mission trips, volunteer work...and understand the faith needs of different adult age categories (young single adults, young married adults, etc). Quality matters – how well lectors perform, how well choir sings, the degree to which parishioners are welcomed into Mass. Face-to-face brings people back—not letters and phone calls.

What can parishioners do? Teach our faith by example...let the children in your life see you praying, studying the word of our Lord, explaining life through the lens of our faith; recognize the importance of regular Mass participation in keeping your family oriented toward Christ; if possible, reach out to your neighbors who are registered and not attending...no preaching and not with the message “why are you not coming” but more “just stopping to say hello and see how you are doing.”

Adults are the key to maintaining and building the foundation of our OLGC community. Pray, pray, pray. Prayer = hope = joy

GOOD SAMARITAN STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Today we celebrate the birth of St. John the Baptist. This prophet, who practiced austerity in the desert, proclaimed the kingdom of God, a coming judgment, and baptism as a sign of repentance. With deep humility, John directed attention not to himself but to Jesus. John’s attitude was, “He must increase, I must decrease” (John 3:30). John’s birth, days after the summer solstice when daylight hours begin to decrease, contrasts with Jesus’ birth days after the winter solstice, heralding daylight’s increase. Like John the Baptist, stewards turn attention away from themselves and towards Jesus. The stewardship question for us is whether or not we ourselves are prepared to “decrease” and allow Jesus to “increase” in our hearts, minds, words and actions.

LITURGICAL CATECHESIS

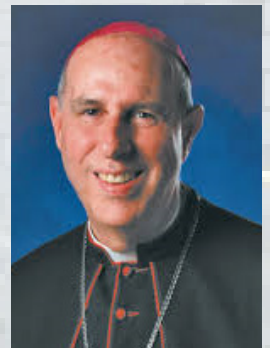


This past week, I spent time with youth from around the diocese for the Christian Leadership Institute (CLI) as the institute's on-staff chaplain. The participants learnt about different topics such as leadership styles, communication skills, planning skills, group dynamics, negotiation skills, the spirituality of a leader, and community building. Motivated by the US Bishops' statement from *Renewing the Vision*, "creating an environment which nurtures meaningful relationships among youth and between youth and adults characterized by Gospel values (acceptance of all people, trust, respect, cooperation, honesty, taking responsibility, willingness to serve); helping young people feel like a valued part of the church; providing opportunities for social interaction and meaningful participation in the church and civil community," the youth gain Christian Leadership skills they could use in their parishes, their schools, and in life. They learnt to move from an I-centered life to a Christ-centered life. In a sense, these youth are to imitate the saint whose feast we celebrate today. The feast we celebrate this weekend focuses on the nativity of St. John the Baptist.

St. John the Baptist was the cousin of Jesus and is known as the forerunner because he preceded the Lord. Although he preceded our Lord in the ministry, he never pointed himself as the center of his work. Rather, he called for conversion and repentance of one's sins. Ultimately, he led others to the Christ. He pointed out the way of salvation. The prayers from this weekend's feast give us an insight to who St. John the Baptist is for us. The collect from the Vigil Mass asks that God's family "walk in the way of salvation" and be "attentive to what Saint John the Precursor urged" that is to "come safely to the One he foretold, our Lord Jesus Christ." The preface of the Eucharistic Prayer speaks of the St. John's "birth brought great rejoicing; even in the womb he leapt for joy at the coming of human salvation. He alone of all the prophets pointed out the Lamb of redemption. And to make holy the flowing waters, he baptized the very author of Baptism and was privileged to bear him supreme witness by the shedding of his blood." May the disciples of the Lord always point the way to Christ by their words and their deeds. St. John the Baptist, pray for us!
