PROGRAM NOTES

Concerto, Op. 9 No. 2

Tomaso Giovanni Albinoni was an Italian Baroque composer whose output includes operas, concertos, sonatas, sinfonias, and solo cantatas. In his day, he was most famous as an opera composer, but today he is most known for his instrumental works. Albinoni was reported to be particularly fond of the oboe, a relatively new introduction in Italy, and is credited with being the first Italian composer to compose oboe concertos. This work is one of his most famous oboe concertos. It begins with an energetic first movement, characterized by dotted rhythms. Next comes a ravishing slow movement followed by a concluding movement featuring an imitative arpeggio figure.

Improvisation über 'Schönster Herr Jesu'

The tune we normally associate with "Fairest Lord Jesus" dates from 1842. There is an older tune from 1677 that is the basis for this set of variations. It is written in five broad sections that are played without pause, with great contrasts between the sections. The first phrase of the song is used heavily as motivic material throughout the piece, and the tune is never heard in its entirety until near the end of the piece, when the cello plays it in an extremely high register in a section marked "visionary."

Oration

According to Daniel Pinkham in his notes for this work, he states that this piece was composed in 1999 for the Icelandic violoncellist Sigurgeir Agnarsson. Pinkham's use of the term *oration* is the modern definition of "an elaborate discourse, delivered in public, treating an important subject in a formal and dignified manner." The first movement is quiet and reflective. The second is a cheerful trio in which the violoncello plays one voice and the organ the other two. The finale opens with a dramatic dialog between the two instruments. The central panel is lyrical and wistful. After a brief flourish by the solo violoncello the work ends triumphantly.

THE ARTISTS

Helen Eggleston Byrne is a native of Spokane She started her piano studies with Vesta Bentley, and then took cello lessons from Carol Graef. She graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in cello performance, and in 1982 joined the Spokane Symphony. She is Assistant Principal Cellist with the Symphony and has been the cellist with the Spokane String Quartet since 2000. Helen is also the organist at Manito Presbyterian Church, and always appreciates the opportunity to play an instrument where the intonation is not her fault. She has been married to the symphony's tuba player, Leonard Byrne, for 33 years.

Keith Thomas, organist for the Cathedral of Our Lady of Lourdes is also principal oboist with the Spokane Symphony. A native of New Haven, Connecticut, he holds a Master of Music from Yale University where he was a student of Ronald Roseman and a Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music, where he was a student of Richard Killmer. He has collaborated with the Northwest Bach Festival, under the direction of Gunther Schuller; Allegro Baroque and Beyond; Spokane String Quartet. Thomas has been principal oboist for the *Lancaster Festival* in Lancaster, Ohio; for the Colorado Music Festival in 1996 and played for the Connecticut Chamber Orchestra before moving to Spokane. Thomas began his training in both oboe and organ at the age of 10. While in high school, Keith studied at the Hartt School of Music (University of Hartford). His organ teachers have included Richard Erickson, Thomas Murray, Charles Kriegbaum and Geoffrey Morgan.
