Why is St. Joseph called "the Worker?" Shouldn't he be honored primarily as the father of Jesus?

Devotion to St. Joseph has developed along an interesting path. It was not until the eighth century that Joseph, underneath the title "Spouse of Mary," was even publicly acknowledged—except perhaps as an afterthought or silent participant in the Christmas story. The Church has always acknowledged that Joseph's relationship with Jesus was unique, but there was, and continues to be, reluctance to call him the father of Jesus. We understand the father of Jesus is not Joseph but rather God the Father.

A consensus about Joseph's role in the plan of salvation seems to be in place by the early fourteenth century. In 1870, Pope Pius IX declared Joseph the patron of the universal Church. By the early twentieth century, worldwide devotion had found a home at St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal.

The title of "the Worker" was used most often by Pope Pius XI in his references to Joseph as the patron of the Church's battle against atheistic communism. Pope Pius XII established the May 1 feast in 1955 to emphasize the Catholic teaching concerning the dignity of labor.

Saint Joseph could be summarized best as a man who did the best he could when God's will became clear. This image and model seems the best and most helpful for deepening our understanding of and devotion to him.

Words from the Pastor

Matthew opens up the birth story of Jesus with these words, "This is how the birth of Jesus came about...." Does that sound familiar? Have we ever said something like that? Our story starts out normally enough **and then**, "**WOW**-Can you believe what happened next?" For example, "I was just walking down the street and this guy came up to me and handed me an envelope,....." Or "I was driving along, felt a bump and then I started skidding across the traffic lanes....." Or how about ever running in to a celebrity? Just going about your business and Pop! there appears a star! One of my Dad's friends tells of being in the old Army Surplus store called Dizzy Dave's in Owensboro once and as he looked up from the fatigue jacket rack, there stood Red Skelton the comedian. Or a group of my friends were shopping at 'Z-gallery' in Nashville a couple of years ago, and turning a corner at an aisle, there appeared Taylor Swift and her mother shopping for couch pillows. Well, that is how Matthew opens the birth story of Jesus. Sounds normal enough, until the surprises start showing up! Matthew tells how God surprises almost all along the way to Christ's birth and beyond. Mary has the appearance from the angel Gabriel. However Joseph learns of God's plan in pieces, an angel visit here and a dream there. Of course, God later uses more angels, a star and human messengers like the shepherds and wise men to pull everything together. But, back to Joseph, as he discovers God's will through installments. Joseph, not being aware of all God is up to, he is caught so surprised by Mary's miraculous conception that he devises an honorable way out for everyone (keeping his honor and keeping Mary safe). Joseph is compassionate and just. He knows he is not the Father, so he develops a plan to simply send Mary away, yet she will still be taken care of. **Until**, God intervenes through a dream to give him a fuller picture of the plan. St Joseph is a builder; he is a planner because of his carpentry work. He never enters a project without having a blueprint in mind. Yet, in this case here, **his blueprint plan is not what God's plan has prepared**. While it may be a good plan, it is not God's! I find a great lesson in this story. Often we may come up with a good and holy plan, yet if it is not God's plan or according to the grander scheme of his long-view, then as good as it is, it still will not last or bear the greatest fruit as God's own plan would accomplish. Maybe it is a matter of timing or the persons involved, but God's plan alone is where we will find the greatest fruit and the greatest peace. For example, I may have a holy plan, but if it doesn't fit into God's schedule-timing, or I am not the particular individual meant to carry it out, then in fact it is the wrong plan. I imagine everyone has had that happened working in groups. Have you ever made a statement in a group and everyone said what a bad idea it was? Then four months later, someone else mentions it and everyone swoons and jumps on the wagon like it has never been thought of in all of history. Or, even you mention the idea two years later and everyone says "Why haven't we ever done that before?" Apparently, the right time or the right persons were not yet

assembled in place for the best outcome to happen! So St Joseph comes up with a great idea, but the problem is that it is not God's will! So God sends a dream and an angel and turns things heavenward. And thank goodness for us, as we are saved by Christ's birth happening just the way God intended!

We will see that theme all throughout the birth story and early life of Jesus, that God intervenes with detours for the characters to take, who are seeking God's Way. For example, there was Joseph and Mary still quietly in Nazareth waiting for Jesus' due date, and then Caesar calls a census making them travel to Bethlehem. And then with all the crowds, there is hardly anywhere to stay, so they scrounge up a place, and on and on it goes..... But for those seeking God's purpose, signs are always provided to lead the way, whether through dreams, angels, stars, ancient prophecies or other faithful people to offer counsels. If we tune into all of these instruments of God we can know and follow his path, whether straight or winding. I think of the saying, "God writes history straight with crooked lines." Yes, I will be getting from point A to point B, but not necessarily as the crow flies. With God, I might meander or 'walk-about' to actually arrive at God's destination. Yet, imagine all the grace encountered along the way!

Another word of Gratitude: Funeral meal teams work hard behind the scenes preparing a comforting meal for families to enjoy with one another. I am always moved by the dedication of our meal servers and the many cooks who prepare dishes and drop them off the morning of the funeral. Listening to the families, they are always so appreciative and thankful for the anonymous generosity of parishioners who have cooked for them. It is such a blessing for me to be able to share in the meals too, and be part of the family visiting among one another after the funeral. So, I want to take a minute to thank everyone who is part of this important ministry. You are appreciated! It means so much to me for you to be helping! And if anyone would like to join one of the meal team lists, please call the office and volunteer!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: What did God speak to me today, and how can I share His Word with someone?

Monday: Do I still remember His Word, and take a minute to pray about it as you begin your work week!

Tuesday: How many people have I thanked today for their kindness or hospitality?

Wednesday: Am I patient about changes in plans? Have I thought God is the one directing the change, because He has greater things in mind for me?

Thursday: Am I practicing Christmas gratitude and generosity each day?

Friday: Perform some act of mercy or anonymous act of kindness for someone today.

Saturday: For what am I going to be thanking God for at Mass this weekend?



Hope starts early

A child is born, and a surge of hope arrives with it. Truthfully, we have no idea who this stranger will be. The color of a baby's eyes may change; this tiny being may grow to be seven feet tall. She might be president of her own company. He may be a priest, a plumber, a playwright. So much potential lies hidden in each new person. Why not support our children with every possible resource? Be free

Freedom is talked about, legislated, protested for. But what is freedom? Some definitions seem watery: We want to do as we like without restrictions. We want Mom or the government or the church off our backs. A better sense of liberty is the capacity to become more than the sum of our givens. The imprint of divine nature distinguishes us: makes us self-creators, re-inventors, transcendents of present circumstances. We pray for the right key to unlock our best selves: "O *Key of David, come and free the prisoners of darkness!*"

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 7:10-14; Luke 1:26-38 (196)*. "Elizabeth has conceived a son in her old age . . . for nothing will be impossible for God."

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 21

MEMORIAL OF PETER CANISIUS, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

May calmer minds prevail

Saint Peter Canisius is remembered for being the calm voice in the midst of a storm. For Catholics in 16th-century northern Europe, the storm was the Protestant Reformation. While most partisans on both side of the divide used strident words and sometimes violent actions, Peter called for reason. Rejecting the inflamed rhetoric against Protestants that was coming from his associates, he said, "With words like these, we don't cure patients, we make them incurable." Think twice before you criticize those who see things differently. Keep the dialogue open.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Song of Songs 2:8-14 or Zephaniah 3:14-18a; Luke 1:39-45 (197)*. "O *Radiant Dawn, shine on those in darkness and the shadow of death.*"

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 22

ADVENT WEEKDAY

Kinship with all

In today's antiphon for vespers we pray, "O *King of all nations: save us, whom you formed from the dust!*" That is a reminder that all people come from the same source and have been formed by the same God. Each one of us is made in God's image and likeness. The kingdom of God is one of kinship. If we take the time to truly come to know one another, we will find the glimpses of God all around us. We just need to look!

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Samuel 1:24-28; Luke 1:46-56 (198)*. "He remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever."

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 23

ADVENT WEEKDAY

O come, O come Emmanuel!

"O *Emmanuel: come to save us, Lord our God.*" Every day for the past seven days, the church has prayed the O Antiphons, using the ancient words and divine images found in the Old Testament. In these prayers, people of faith asked God to come and free us, to rescue us, and to shine on us. Today, the divine word is *Emmanuel*, which means "God-with-us." As today unfolds, remember that God is with you right now and will be with you through thick and thin, stress and peace, sorrow and joy. It is your job to pay attention and notice God's presence in the insights, conversations, and events of your days—and then to act accordingly.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Malachi 3:1-4, 23-24; Luke 1:57-66 (199)*. "Your ways, O Lord, make known to me; teach me your paths."

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 24

ADVENT WEEKDAY

God is with you always

What's in a name? In the case of Emmanuel, it's *all* in that name. "God-with-us" in the infant whose birth we celebrate; "God-with-us" in Jesus' forgiving sinners; "God-with-us" in Jesus weeping over a friend's death; "God-with-us" in feeding thousands with bread and countless people with his word; "God-with-us" carrying the cross; "God-with-us" on Christmas morning and in his last words, "I am with you always." God is with you today and always because Jesus has lived up to his name. Is there someone you ought to be with tonight?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Morning: 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16; Luke 1:67-79 (200)*. "I have been with you wherever you went."

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
