

Words from the Pastor

Merry Christmas! I pray everyone is blessed with a good set of Holy Days (Christmas-Dec 25 and Mary Mother of God-Jan 1), full of good family visiting and sharing in food, gifts and time with others! I want to take the opportunity to thank you, my parish family for the blessing to be here and serve as a priest among you. You bless me by your lives of faithful witness & prayerful discipleship to Christ! I feel so blessed as we move along together, sharing in both joys and struggles as we seek God's will in community with one another. That is church! Following Jesus in company with one another! So, I take Christmas and the end of the year to thank you for being so good to me! God always works among His people open to serving his Will!

How about those shepherds! I am glad that someone was awake that night to receive the angels' message and go over to that humble scene and visit with St Joseph, the Blessed Mother and baby Jesus to see just what the angels had prophesied! The shepherds found the angels' sign just as they were told: a newborn Savior-King born in the simplest of conditions. What did they find? The Child Jesus born in an out of the way place, around animals eating and finding their rest in a quiet way after their long day's labor. Jesus himself was wrapped in warm cloths lying in a barn manger. More than the clothes, Jesus' blessed and loving parents were embracing and wrapping him with their concern. And more than a simple animal's feedbox, the manger identifies the purpose of Christ: God's own presence, **come to feed his people** (maybe like we wrap up a delicious morsel of dinner to enjoy even more later). Jesus will say in John 6:33 "the bread of God is that which *comes down from heaven* and gives life to the world." And then in John 6:51 "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and **the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.**" The prophet Isaiah (40:11) had prophesied about the coming Savior that "Like a shepherd he feeds his flock; in his arms he gathers the lambs, carrying them close to himself...." Jesus does come to feed us, and keep us in close relationship to Him. I love the additional point that the word 'Bethlehem' means "House of Bread". All of this is revealed by the angels to lowly shepherds at work in the fields. The shepherds then become the first evangelists carrying the message into town for others to hear. Those listening and open accept the good news of God coming to live among His People! All because of those first humble shepherds who carry the message to others!

What is your favorite Christmas carol? Like a lot of things, when we hear them over and over, we may become deaf to the actual words. An enlightening exercise for us this Christmas may be to listen closely to the words we are singing in our favorite Christmas carols. One of my favorite carols is "**It Came Upon a Midnight Clear**" that has these powerful lines:

"Yet with the woes of sin and strife, *The world hath suffered long; Beneath* the angel-strain have rolled, *Two thousand years of wrong; And man,*

at war with man, *hears not.* The love song which they bring: **O hush the noise, ye men of strife,** And hear the angels sing." I heard that! The world is filled with warring tension and wrong ideas about human progress and fulfillment, until we 'listen' and 'look up' to God. The Savior has come. Jesus has shown the way, yet the world has persisted in only hearing and exalting itself. Another carol that I pray over throughout the Christmas season is "**O Little Town of Bethlehem**" which has the line "*No ear may hear His coming,* But in this world of sin, *Where meek souls will receive* Him still, *The dear Christ enters in.*" Imagine how God entered our world: through a helpless baby, on a still night, in the backwater of little Bethlehem, in the borrowed space of a stable, amid day-laboring animals, first visited only by lowly shepherds. God didn't have a flashy, hyped press conference-rally amid glitz and gold, attended by industry bosses, to introduce himself into our history. No. He appeared in the modest, meekest, mildest way to suggest a way of living that brings life to all who are open to receive the divine gifts of peace, reconciliation and justice that only come through God's Kingdom. May our celebration of Christmas this year open new ears and new eyes for the world to experience freshly the intended peace of the Kingdom of God for all people, just as the angels sang "Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth" (Luke 2:14).

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Every Mass is Christmas! What did God place into my humble heart today for me to be able to share with others I encounter this week?

Monday: Have I passed along good news today? Have I listened to bad news? We do have good to tell, so let us add to our conversations uplifting God-focused news.

Tuesday: Jesus is our shepherd who begins his life among shepherds. How may I shepherd another today in Jesus' name (feed, tend wounds, lead, hold together others)?

Wednesday: We hear about angels, dreams and stars in the Christmas story. Are we open to the many signs God places in our paths to guide us in ways of holiness and justice?

Thursday: God is faithful. By coming to live among us, he patiently stays with us. Do we attend to His presence (notice his closeness)?

Friday: Perform some act of mercy or anonymous act of kindness for someone today.

Saturday: How can I participate more actively at mass this weekend? Consider volunteering to read, usher, serve communion or help with decorating the sanctuary throughout the year.



SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD (CHRISTMAS)

Look for the love on Christmas

Christmas Day is here! After weeks of preparation, are you filled with excitement? Exhausted? Perhaps a bit of both? On this holy morning, imagine sitting and talking with Mary, mother of the newborn. She carried the child in her womb for nine months; she labored and gave birth. Perhaps she was exhausted that morning, perhaps she was filled with hope and joy—perhaps, like you, a bit of both! The essence of this day is the birth of that child, who came to bring love to us all. Look for that love today in the smile of a child, the story of a parent, a meal at your table, or a word of gratitude.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 9:1-6; Titus 2:11-14; Luke 2:1-14 (14)*. "You have nothing to fear! I come to proclaim good news to you."

MONDAY, DECEMBER 26
FEAST OF STEPHEN, THE FIRST MARTYR
Deacons on the front line

Stephen was a deacon in the early church. Evidence suggests that both women and men served as deacons in the early church, and Pope Francis recently established an official commission to study the question of the diaconate of women. The word "radical" means going back to "the root," so if radical change is ahead for the diaconate, it will be deeply rooted in Christian history and tradition. Pray for wise discernment by all those involved in the commission.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 6:8-10; 7:54-59; Matthew 10:17-22 (696)*. "You are my rock and my fortress; for your name's sake you will lead and guide me."

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 27
FEAST OF JOHN, APOSTLE, EVANGELIST
Tell him I AM sent you

Each gospel has an emphasis, and John's is the divinity of Christ revealed in signs of service: feeding multitudes, raising Lazarus, forgiving the adulterous woman, turning water into wine, and washing feet like a slave. In John, Jesus often uses the divine name, I AM: in the poetry of vine and branches, the good shepherd, the bread from heaven. Because you are baptized, divinity lives in you as well. As the hustle of the holidays continues, feed, not thousands, but one hungry person; wash someone's feet by volunteering somewhere; be a good shepherd, a mentor to a young person; be a forgiving, divine vessel of joy. Show that love does not die as Christmas Day passes by.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 1:1-4; John 20:1a, 2-8 (697)*. "What we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes."

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 28
FEAST OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, MARTYRS
Martyrs of today

Our Christmas joy is interrupted today. We remember the children who were slaughtered in Bethlehem by King Herod. Such tragedies continue today—pray for all who die daily from violence and neglect. Pope Francis has reminded us many times that these are the martyrs of today. On this Christmas weekday we must stop and reflect on the fact that even though there may be darkness and a rejection of life, the light of love, the light of Christmas, shines much brighter and scatters hatred and brings about a new world.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 1:5—2:2; Matthew 2:13-18 (698)*. "A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing

to be comforted, because they are no more."

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 29
MEMORIAL OF THOMAS BECKET, BISHOP, MARTYR
Fight for what's right

We teach kids to stand up to bullies, but how often do we adults do the same? How many times do we ignore hurtful, inappropriate comments to others in person and online? How often do we fail to advocate for those in our city, country, and world who aren't being treated fairly? It's not easy to risk the repercussions of doing the right thing, but we are called to do so nonetheless. Find courage in the example of Saint Thomas Becket, who gave his life for standing up to someone—his friend, boss, and king—who was in the wrong.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 2:3-11; Luke 2:22-35 (202)*. "Lord, now let your servant go in peace; your word has been fulfilled."

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 30
FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH
All you need is love

"Jesus himself was born into a modest family." So writes Pope Francis in his letter, "*The Joy of Love*." We tend to think of that small family as perfect, but we presume, too, that they worked, prayed, and traveled together as many families do today. Although we don't know their daily rituals and routines, we do know that the child of the family became a man of justice and compassion who showed us how to love. To celebrate this Feast of the Holy Family, put love on your lips and in your heart and do something today that imitates the Lord's unconditional love.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14 or Colossians 3:12-21; Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23 (17)*. "Over all these virtues, put on love which binds the rest together and makes them perfect."

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 31
MEMORIAL OF SYLVESTER I, POPE
Keep the Christmas spirit alive

Don't you wish the wonder of Christmas lasted longer than one day? Well, it actually does! The Nativity of the Lord is celebrated on the liturgical calendar as an Octave—that is, eight days long—in this case, from December 25 to January 1. Easter is also celebrated as an Octave, because the importance of these two events demands a full week of attention. Because today is also the feast day of Sylvester I, who was pope during the Council of Nicea, which affirmed that Jesus was both human and divine, take time to contemplate this part of the mystery of Christ's birth.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 2:18-21; John 1:1-18 (204)*. "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory."

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
