WORDS FROM THE PASTOR



Have you ever been asked, "Can we have a face to face today?" Or ever been told "I need a sit-down with you as soon as possible"? Or maybe spouses have asked each other this question as they go through a stormy patch, "Can we have a talk: I need to know what I mean to you?" Sometimes, such questions can drill to our cores, and almost scare us with their súdden pointedness. Jesus is aware of how such 'defining moments' in our relationships can threaten us, so he eases into this critical conversation with His

apostles by first asking about the 'word on the street'! He asks, "What are people saying about the word off the street! He asks, "What are people saying about me?" and this leads up to him asking more personally, "Okay they say that, but where are YOU with this? How do YOU think of me? Are YOU with me?" His question specifically is "Who do you say that I am?" Faced with such a point-blank 'personal invite' to share, what would I say? So, what would you say to Jesus?

Most people thought of Jesus, as fitting into the role of prophet, in line with the Old Testament examples and even the recent appearance of a current prophet like John Baptist. So they said, 'Maybe he is John back from the dead, or Elijah, or Jeremiah'. The Old Testament prophets are usually divided into 'major ones' and 'minor ones'. The Major league consists of Isaiah, Ezekiel, Jeremiah and Daniel. The minor league refers to Hosea, Amos, Micah, Joel, Obadiah, Jonah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, and Zechariah. However, these are only the prophets who have their own books. We know of many other prophets who served God faithfully by delivering His Word to the people. Think of Moses or Samuel, or Elijah! When Jesus came along, the people thought of Him first as being similar to one of these 'servants of God', maybe in the light of their own favorite prophet-figure. Who is your favorite Old Testament Prophet?

I ask why the people gave those three particular names. And I find significance in the specific prophets named by the apostles: John Baptist, Elijah or Jeremiah. Consider why these three get special 'name mention'. That people even suggest **John** the Bpt who had died, makes me think that the idea of resurrection' was in the air'. Also, mention of John's named first suggests how much he was loved, his positive reception and the popular engagement with his message of conversion/change. John's name was feared by some as Matthew 14:2 says "King Herod told his servants, "This man (Jesus) is John the Baptist. He has been raised from the dead; that is why mighty powers are at work in him." Herod may have been the rumor-starter of Jesus being John Resurrected! Secondly, **Elijah** being named suggests that society was at a 'tipping point' and people felt it lived in an 'explosive apocalyptic atmosphere' or the 'end times were near'. Way back when, Malachi had prophesied that Elijah would appear just "before the great and terrible day of Yahweh comes" (Malachi 4:5). And, lastly, I find mention of **Jeremiah** by name *the most interesting* because it reveals and confirms by comparison the actual teaching and lifestyle of Jesus. For example, Jesus matches Jeremiah's homeless celibate lifestyle (Jeremiah 16:2 compared to Matthew 8:20). Also, Jeremiah, like Jesus, is rejected by his own people (Compare Jer 11:19 to Luke 4:28-29). But not only were they both rejected, they were also persecuted badly (Compare Jer 20:2 to John 15:20). But most thrillingly to me is the similarity of the CONTENT of both Jeremiah and Jesus' teaching. Naming Jeremiah adds the corroborating insight into what Jesus was actually teaching (in addition to the four Evangelists' testimony of their texts). That specific content was Jesus' teaching about the spiritual error of viewing

salvation only through the Temple economy and the accompanying illusion of Jerusalem City as the designated one & only 'Holy Place' (compare Jer 7:4 'Don't put your trust in the words, 'Temple' 'Temple', to Matthew 24:2 "'the day is coming when not one Temple stone will rest upon another"). I will leave for another day the comparison of Jeremiah and Jesus when it came to calling out the corruption of the priests and elder-spiritual authorities (compare Matthew 23:13-33 to Jeremiah 2:8). But Jesus becomes so much more than any simple prophet from history, because He enacts and embodies (HE IS) the Word of God! Not just handing it out, but being it Himself personally. So, he turns the conversation to his apostles in person and asks, "Tell me, how do you understand me?" Old Testament prophets were 'messengers' deliverers of God's word to the people, like couriers and runners. They are handed a word and they in turn just deliver it, like announcing "Hear Ye, Hear Ye, the King decrees....." But **Jesus is so** much more than a messenger-delivery boy. Jesus is the WORD of GOD Itself (embodied- John 1:14 Word made flesh). Jesus is the Message! In the strongest terms, Jesus establishes Himself as 'The Word of God' when giving the Sermon on the Mount, and Jesus says "it was said to your ancestors..... <u>But I say to you</u>," (Matt 5:21-22). But in many places He announces the 'Greater' Message of Himself. In Matthew 12:6 "I say to you, something *greater than* the Temple is here." In Matthew 12:8 He says, "For the Son of Man is *Lord of the Sabbath*. Matthew 12:41 has Jesus saying "There is something *greater than* Jonah here", followed by Matthew 12:42 saying, "There is something *greater than* Solomon here." Jesus is that 'greater than' which fulfills and surpasses definitively all that went before. He is the Omega Point! I find the best summary of this identification of Jesus as God's Word Himself in Hebrews 1:1-2 "In times past, God spoke in partial and various ways to our ancestors through the prophets; in these last days, <u>God spoke to us through a Son</u>. So, Jesus is the Word. He's the Answer. *That makes us* **the question?** What does He mean to me? What is your response?

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: If I was quizzed about Mass today, what do you remember, what words or message did you receive? Were you challenged to change because of the words?

Monday: If you were asked by a stranger, "Who is Jesus?" What would you say?

Tuesday: Ask someone to tell you who Jesus is to them. Have you ever told someone that you saw Jesus working through them? Why not?

Wednesday: Who was the last prophet who shook me up? How was I affected and how did hearing the prophet's message from God change me?

Thursday: Have I read the Old Testament Prophets' writings/ books? Try it this week, by picking up Isaiah, Ezekiel or Jeremiah? (Jonah and Hosea are short prophet books).

Friday: Embrace the cross and perform an act of sacrifice or penance for someone today.

Saturday: Plan to come to mass early and pray the rosary for world peace!

Sunday, Aug 27, 2017 TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Rock-solid faith

Peter got a lot of things wrong in his dealings with Christ, but on the day when Jesus asked him, "Who do you say I am?" Peter got it right and proved himself an astute and faithful disciple. Jesus' response to Peter's confession: "You are

the Rock and upon this rock I will build my church." Jesus chose Peter—despite his many instances of flawed thinking—to care for his faith community because Peter's spiritual core was rock solid. The lesson here for all Christians is that it is our commitment to follow Jesus, not our perfect understanding, that creates a sturdy foundation of faith.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 22:19-23; Romans 11:33-36; Matthew 16:13-20 (121) "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church."

Unsinkable Saint Augustine

While some famous people may have amazing rags-to-riches stories to tell, the drama that launched Saint Augustine (354-430) to greatness went from reprobate to repentant. A brilliant young man who indulged in earthly pleasures to excess (dismaying his mom, Saint Monica), he became "born again" and embraced the opposite extreme, condemning everything appealing to the senses. Thankfully, this champion of church teaching finally chose a more forgiving path, admitting, "Our hearts are restless till they rest in Thee!"

Tuesday, Aug 29, 2017 MEMORIAL OF THE PASSION OF JOHN THE BAPTIST Takes criticism well

It's human to feel pain and anger, especially at times when you've made a mistake and have been soundly called on the carpet for it. King Herod's wife Herodias wanted to get even with John the Baptist after he spoke out about something she was involved in that was morally wrong. Herodias got revenge, but not a better life. Although hers is an example of extreme vengeance, the moral of her story is one worth remembering. When you make mistakes that others rightfully point out, you can punish the messenger or take the message to heart, but only by doing the latter can you make things right.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8 (426); Mark 6:17-29 (634) "Herodias harbored a grudge against [John the Baptist] and wanted to kill him but was unable to do so."

Wednesday, Aug 30, 2017 Do what you say

The word hypocrite comes from the Greek for "one who acts on a stage" and means "a person who puts on a false appearance of virtue or religion." Hypocrisy was one of Jesus' frequent targets, and the criticism of hypocrisy has played a major role in Christian moral life ever since. Those who say one thing and do another, who want people to think they are something different than what they really are, or who hold others to standards they themselves don't keep fall under this ignominious title. The simple antidote to hypocrisy comes from integrity: consistency between your thoughts and actions and between those actions and what you expect of others.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 2:9-13; Matthew 23:27-32 (427) "On the outside you appear righteous, but inside you are filled with hypocrisy and evildoing."

Thursday, Aug 31, 2017 Ready or not, here I come

On this day in 1886, America recorded its first major earthquake, in Charleston, South Carolina. Forty-one people were killed. We never know when tragedy may strike. Our faith keeps us moving forward. We can't freeze up terrified of what might come. Living as good a life as we can is the best preparation for whatever happens. While these figures may seem a little ridiculous, they have a point. We don't know when the Lord will return, so it's best to be ready at all times. But we do not wait for him out of fear.
