I spent time in prayer seeking Christ's face in the amazing community of educators and friends who sacrifice here each day. I spent time just listening to our students, your children, running and playing, or praying together or simply seeking truth. I spent time in awe of all that we had been given. I recognized the blessings and beauty and goodness, but still lost in my thoughts I did not find peace. Rather, I found myself fearful of the fragility of the abundant blessings before me. And so my cross grew heavier.

These feelings and this place of fear were not normal for me. I truly felt lost. Then in the last few days of Lent, very unexpectedly a friend reminded me that the Holy Spirit's gift of knowledge is connected to the theological virtue of Hope. By hope we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength or answers but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit. These words left me feeling ashamed for relying on myself yet again and not trusting in Christ's promises. I was humbled in remembering that Christ embraced the cross not to keep me from it or to make sure that my crosses were only small or bearable. Rather, He embraced His cross and conquered death so that our crosses could be changed from instruments of death, doubt, and despair into instruments of healing that bring us to our resurrection of hope and the hope of eternal life.

Grateful for my friend sharing such wisdom, I committed to entering Holy Week with a new perspective. I spent Palm Sunday weekend really present. I found myself more present to my own children, to the community around me, and to the Eucharist during Mass. I spent time thinking about the words first spoken by St. Augustine and later our patron, "We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our Song." I found peace. My heart was full of hope. I was hopeful for the change I saw in myself and for the change I knew our community would experience as we welcome the Easter season and so much more beyond that. I was hopeful in the knowledge that even in my sense of feeling lost and not finding answers I was still guided by His light, putting first things first and unknowingly enjoying the prize of the friendship of God beyond all else.

As you enter into Holy Week, celebrate Easter with your family and friends, and then contemplate the changes that this season naturally brings, I pray you too are hopeful. I pray you see life and growth and wisdom. I pray you find knowledge and His friendship.
