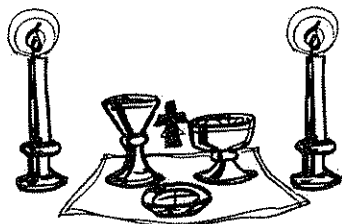

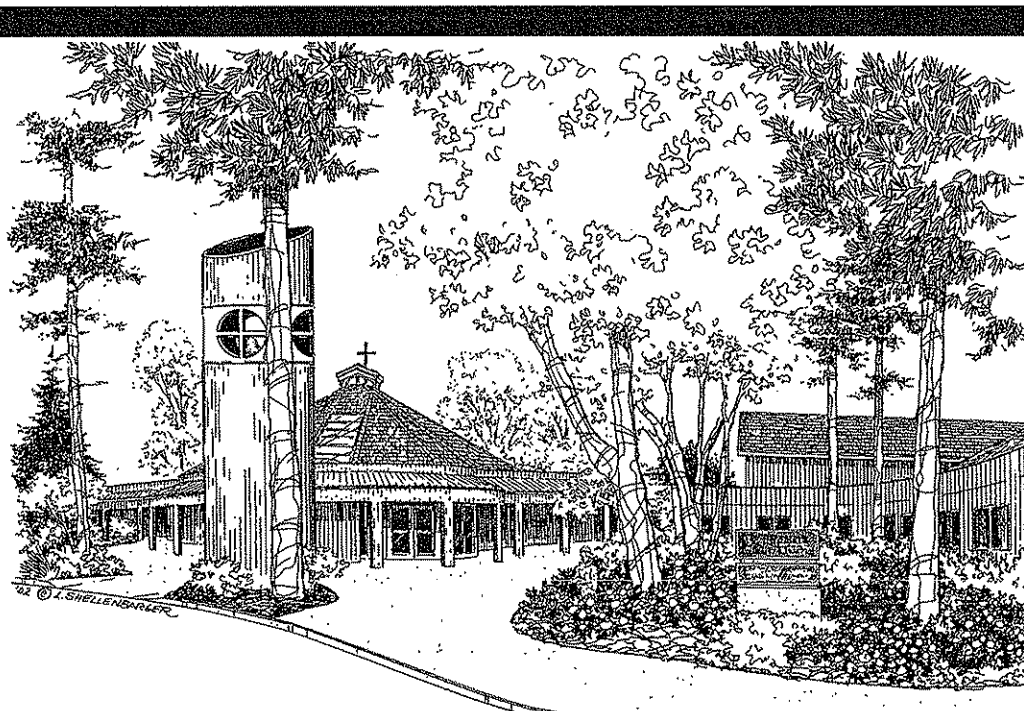

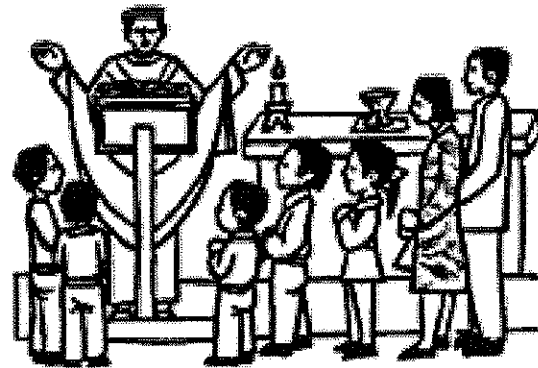

## "Admonish the Sinner": Pope Francis and the Third Spiritual Work of Mercy

The third spiritual work of mercy is one that few of us like to engage in: "admonish the sinner." This work of mercy is highly misunderstood and many of us do not know how to "admonish" in a Christian context. Providentially, Pope Francis laid out for us a striking example both in Cuba and in America. He teaches us from a pastor's heart what it means to "admonish the sinner."

Before we dive into Pope Francis' example let us look at the biblical roots of this work of mercy.

First of all, Jesus says: "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector." (Mt 18:15-18).

It is important to note that Jesus explains that we should seek out our "brother" in private. Too many of us skip to the public rebuke of our family & friends on Facebook and never seek them out individually. Additionally, Jesus here makes reference to "your brother." This highlights the fact that admonition is best done in the context of an established relationship. A person is much more likely to listen to a trusted friend or relative, rather than a street preacher holding a sign that says: "Repent! Sinners go to Hell!" While the message might be the same and true, it does not mean it will be effective.

Saint Paul echoes these words when he writes, "If any one refuses to obey what we say in this letter, note that man, and have nothing to do with him, that he may be ashamed. Do not look on him as an enemy, but warn him as a brother" (2 Thessalonians 3:14).

Keeping all of this in mind, let us turn to the example of Pope Francis. While in Cuba, many were confused by his meeting with Fidel Castro as he did not reprove or reproach the former communist leader. In fact, his meeting was described as "intimate and familial". Pope Francis decided to take the opportunity to create a "brotherly" bond with Castro instead of using the time to explain his flaws.

When he spoke to the US bishops in Washington DC, Pope Francis called himself a "brother among brothers" and gave a lecture on the "culture of encounter." He encouraged the bishops to build up the Church to "be a humble home, a family fire which attracts men and women through the attractive light and warmth of love."

In the end, Pope Francis has the heart of a shepherd and he sees many lost sheep in this world. Instead of beating the sheep into submission with his staff, he chooses to lift them up on his shoulders and carry them to restful waters. He shows us that if we desire to "admonish the sinner" we must first establish a familial relationship and then instruct in such a way that heals.

We may not like this way & may want something stronger or harsher. However, we realize that God's ways are not always our ways.

## Year of Mercy Plenary Indulgence

The Church's purpose in offering the plenary indulgence is to encourage the faithful to strive to develop holiness of life and purity of heart. Taking the steps to obtain the Jubilee Year Indulgence is a great way to grow closer to God.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation absolves us from our sins, but sin leaves a negative effect on the way we think and act. Even so, the mercy of God is stronger than sin and the effects of sin. An indulgence frees a person from the residue and negative effects that are the consequences of sin. It enables one to act with genuine charity and to grow in love for others rather than to fall back into sin.

What must I do to gain the plenary indulgence during the Year of Mercy?

Within a three-week period, fulfill all of the following conditions with the intention of obtaining the indulgence:

- Make a sacramental Confession
- Have the interior disposition of complete detachment from all sin, even small sins
- Be in a state of grace (free from all serious sin) when fulfilling the conditions for the *plenary indulgence*
- Receive the Holy Eucharist
- Make a profession of faith (e.g. say the Apostle's Creed)
- Pray for the Pope and his intentions (One "Our Father" and one "Hail Mary" is sufficient)

AND, perform one of the following acts during the Year of Mercy:

- 1) Make a brief pilgrimage to the Holy Door at one of the churches designated by the diocesan bishop. **In the Archdiocese of Portland: The Cathedral, The Grotto, or Sacred Heart Church in Medford.**
- 2) Perform one or more of the corporal works of mercy: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger/shelter the homeless, heal the sick, visit the imprisoned, bury the dead.
- 3) Perform one or more of the spiritual works of mercy: counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, comfort the afflicted, forgive offenses, bear patiently those who do us ill, pray for the living and the dead.

Once you have fulfilled the above conditions, you have obtained the plenary indulgence. You can obtain the plenary indulgence more than once during the Year of Mercy, but only once per day. You can apply an indulgence only to yourself or to someone who has died.

**Hope Shelter Update:** We are in our third month of serving those without homes in Tigard, Tualatin and Sherwood. With the cold weather and ice, our numbers have risen since November. The shelter had an average of 19 guests per night in December.

Keeping the shelter open and running smoothly takes a lot of volunteer hours. For example, we usually have:

- A Hope Diner team of 8 to 10 people making dinner, serving the guests, and cleaning up after the meal
- Two volunteers Sunday night and 2 volunteers Monday morning driving the bus for our guests from the Tigard and Tualatin area
- Two volunteers at the shelter from 4:15 pm -11:00 pm (greet the guests, start laundry, help guests get settled)
- Two volunteers at the shelter from 11:00 pm -7:00 am (laundry and sleep)
- Monday morning volunteers who make breakfast and do laundry/cleaning after the shelter closes

In a nutshell, it takes 24-26 volunteers each week to keep our shelter open. As the saying goes, "Many hands make light work." We have a wonderful volunteer team but can always use more volunteers as we reach the halfway point of the shelter season. We always welcome new faces and are happy to talk with you if you are interested in volunteering. Our highest need is the 11:00 pm—7:00 am shift, followed by the 4:15 pm -11:00 pm shift.
