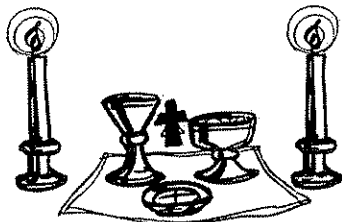

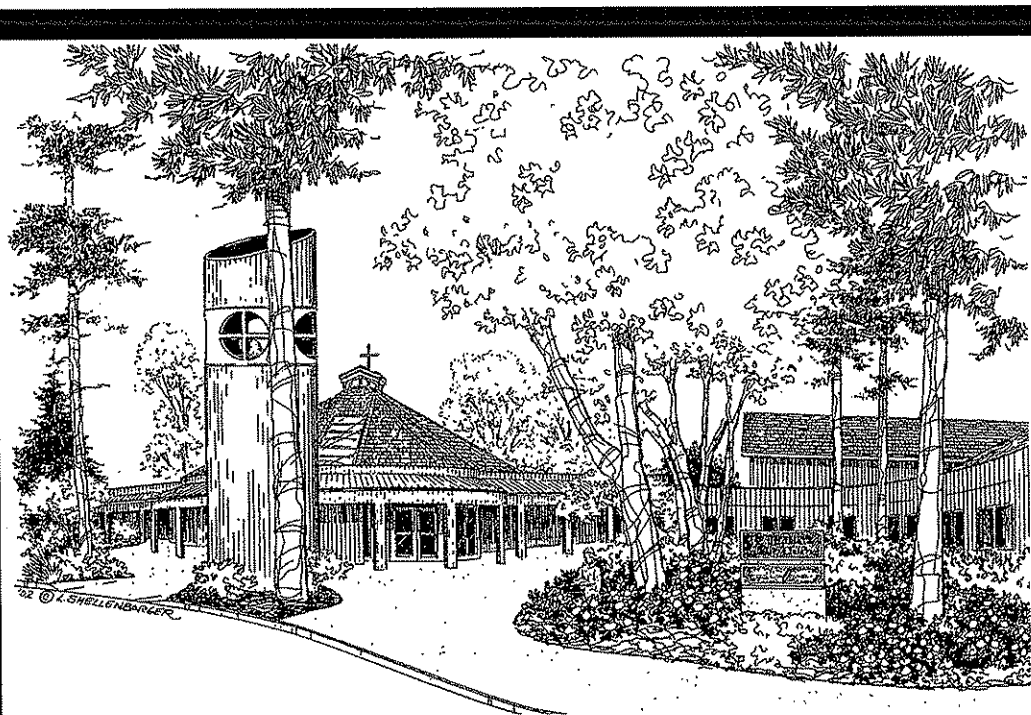
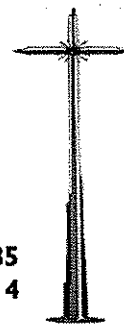

From the desk of Father James

During Advent, we follow the light of the star to come and find Jesus in the manger at Christmas. During Lent, we follow another star, a light that burns brightly in the darkness, the light that emits from the great pillar of fire, the Paschal Candle.

The candle is not yet lit for 2016, but it will be upon us soon enough. The light of Christ that reminds us of our baptism and the baptismal promises that we renew at Easter will illuminate the darkness at the Easter Vigil. This light guides us through our Lenten journey, and this weekend we experience another bright light that helps to reveal to us who Christ is.

This Sunday, Luke relates to us the story of the Transfiguration of Jesus. Jesus takes Peter, James and John up to the mountain to pray and suddenly, Jesus is transfigured before them. The fire of His Sacred Heart burning through Him, reveals to His disciples who He really is.

In revealing who He is to the disciples and to us, He shows us that He truly is the Son of God. This light also helps to show us who we are called to be and that this light is present within our hearts.

During these Lenten days, what keeps this light shining so brightly in our hearts? Let us ask God during this year of mercy to forgive us for the times that we have failed to let His light shine through us onto others. Give us the courage to leave those things behind that keep us from living the life that God has set in our hearts.

Fasting and Abstinence Guidelines

- ◇ All Catholics 14 years and older must abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- ◇ All Catholics between ages 18 and 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- ◇ To fast means to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken for good health but together they should not equal a full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted; however, liquids including coffee, milk and fruit juices are allowed.

He was truly inspiring, and made me realize, I have to inspire my kids to want more for themselves.”

First Corporal Work of Mercy: Feed the Hungry

After finishing up the **spiritual** works of mercy in my previous series, let us start to examine the seven **corporal** works of mercy. These works of mercy focus on serving the visible needs of our neighbor and should not be neglected. There is a real temptation to only care about the spiritual poverty in the world and to entirely forget about the poor man at our own door step. We must fight against this temptation and seek to serve all the needs of our neighbor.

The first corporal work of mercy is to “feed the hungry.” Jesus included this in his exhortation regarding the final judgment, where He turned away the goats who did not give any food to the “least of these” (Matthew 25:31-46). Feeding the hungry is a basic tenet of being a Christian, but unfortunately the modern prosperity we enjoy has spoiled us and we sometimes believe no one goes hungry in America.

However, it does happen and often right in front of us. In 2014 “48.1 million Americans lived in food insecure households, including 32.8 million adults and 15.3 million children” and “6 percent of households (6.9 million households) experienced very low food security.” (Feeding America)

What should we do? How do we “feed the hungry?”

The best way we can “feed the hungry” is to be active in our local community. Almost every community has a food bank or emergency food pantry where they distribute food to families in need. Additionally, many communities have “soup kitchens,” where they offer weekly or daily meals for those in need. All of these ways bring us into contact with the real people who are hungry.

This is important, for when we give money to various organizations (while a good and noble thing), we are very much removed from the situation and never get our hands dirty. We never have an encounter with a hungry person and we barely have any compassion. We give our money away so that “someone else” can deal with the poor and hungry.

Unfortunately we often scoff at the poor and hungry and tell them plainly to “get a job!” We think there is no reason why they should be hungry and often think that they the ones to blame. However, we do not know their situation and do not realize that we should treat them in the same way that we would want to be treated. Who knows, we could be the next statistic and could be in a situation where we are begging for food.

In the end, feeding the hungry is an important work of mercy that we should actively engage in. We should be the ones who literally “feed the hungry” by volunteering in our local community. In a very real sense, it is not an “option” to feed the hungry, but a mandate given to us by Jesus Christ.

The season of Lent has begun and so has the 5th grade service project. During Religion class, 5th graders study the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy. They learn that the Works of Mercy are our way of continuing the work of Jesus. As a class, they continue Jesus' work as they embark on Kids Against Poverty (K.A.P.).

Over the 6 weeks of Lent, 5th graders will learn about the challenges that developing countries, like Uganda has, including malaria, water purification, high infant mortality, lack of vaccinations, and malnutrition. In class they will watch videos, have discussions, and read about the children in Uganda, specifically at a school in Mityana, Uganda. These children go to The Little Flower School run by the St. Kizito Parish Catholic Mission. The 5th graders will learn about the Mission and what the school day is like for the school children.

Throughout this service project, the 5th graders take on great responsibility. Each student has a specific job, such as presenting information to students in grades K-4, creating posters to display around the school, designing flyers to inform parents, and collecting and counting the donations. In the past we have helped purchase bed nets, water pumps, and medical care for the children.

This is just one way the students at St. Francis are preparing their hearts and minds as we journey toward Easter.

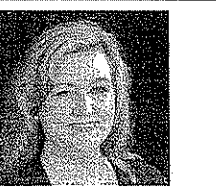
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
