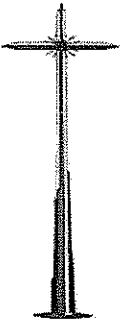

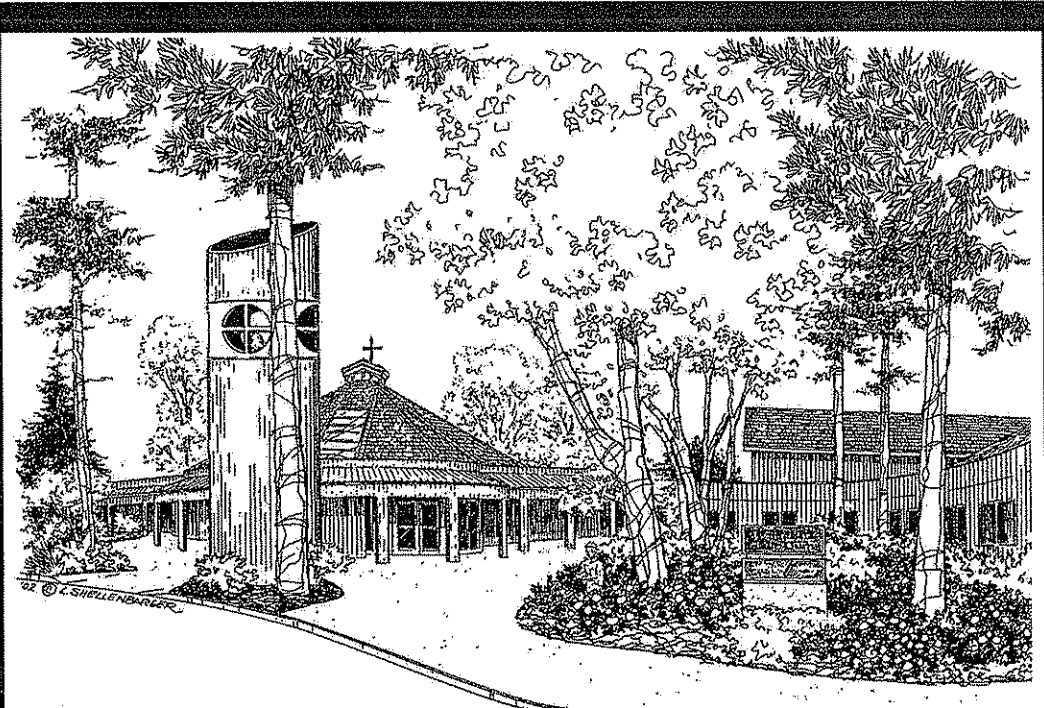

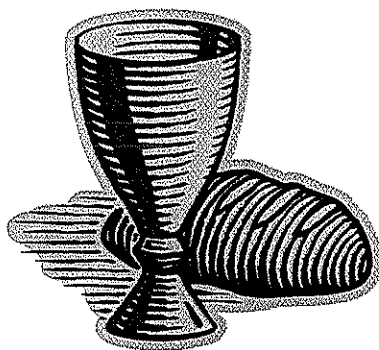

From the desk of Father James

As we move into this new month of August and we come to this 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, we see another reminder in our readings of the circle of life.

Last weekend, in our responsorial psalm, we encountered the familiar verse, "If today you here His voice, harden not your hearts." This phrase echoes in our hearts the experience we have during the season of Lent. We are given a "springtime" by the Church each year to pause and once again remember that our Lord speaks to us. Let us open our hearts and embrace His word and His way of life that He presents to us. We are encouraged to return to the path that He sets before us.

This Sunday we hear another echo from a different liturgical season. We are reminded to gird our loins, light our lamps, be attentive to our Lord's return. This is a theme that we hear during the season of Advent. This is a reminder to us that we never know the day or the hour that our Lord will come and demand our lives from us. We even heard the Lord say that very thing to the rich landowner in the Gospel last week, "...this very night your life will be demanded of you..."

Throughout the Liturgical Year, our Church reminds us of these pivotal seasons that we experience and helps us to remember that it is not only during Lent or Advent that we need to reflect upon our Lord's imminent return. We need to keep in mind that we have strayed from the Lord's path and to keep these ideas always present in our minds and hearts.

Are we ready today for the Lord to return? Are we ready to have our life demanded of us? (Remember the life that we live is truly a gift from the Lord, not ours to do whatever we want with.) How do we share what we have been given? How are we doing as stewards with all that has been entrusted to us? Are we being responsible with all that the Lord has entrusted to us?

I do pray that all of you are indeed having a great summer and enjoying the weather that we have been having! Our summer this year is certainly cooler and not as dry as the summer we had last year. For that I am grateful!

I just want to draw your attention to a couple of items. . .

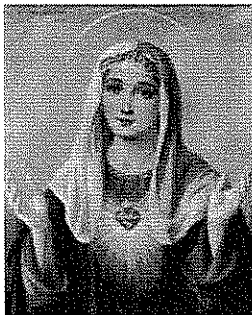

A Time to Persevere

The days of summer have provided a welcome change of pace. However, while vacations afford us the time to relax and refresh, the change of habits and routines can also have a negative impact on our spiritual lives. The Church offers, as if to re-ignite us, in the plethora of August feasts, vivid examples of the virtue of perseverance: six martyrs — two who are named in Canon I of the Mass and two who were martyred during World War II; seven founders of religious congregations, as well as three popes and two kings; the apostle, St. Bartholomew; the great Doctor of the Church, St. Augustine and St. Monica, his mother; the humble patron saint of parish priests, St. John Vianney, and the patron of deacons, St. Lawrence, who joked with his executioners while being roasted alive.

It is never too late to begin — as the life of the reformed sinner, St. Augustine teaches us — nor too difficult to begin again, as demonstrated by the conversion of the martyr, St. Teresa Benedicta (Edith Stein). We present-day members of the Mystical Body are certain of the reward to which we are called, for Christ's Transfigured body (August 6) is a preview of that glory. Moreover, in the Assumption of His Mother (August 15), Our Lord has demonstrated his fidelity to His promise. Her privilege is "the highest fruit of the Redemption" and "our consoling assurance of the coming of our final hope — the glorification which is Christ's" (*Enchiridion on Indulgences*).



*Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy,
our life, our sweetness and our hope!*

The **Blessed Virgin Mary** is the most perfect example of Christian perseverance, but she is also our advocate in heaven where she is crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth (August 22). Mary is the "Mother of Perpetual Help", the patroness of the Congregation founded by St. Alphonsus Ligouri (August 1). "No one who has fled to her protection is left unaided" is the claim of the *Memorare* of St. Bernard (August 20). Heretics have returned to the faith by the prayers of her Rosary, first preached by St. Dominic (August 8) in the twelfth Century, and hearts have been converted by the graces received while wearing her Miraculous Medal, promoted by St. Maximillian Kolbe (August 14) and adopted as the "badge" for the Pious Union he founded.

If you haven't worn it in the past 12 months, then it's time to get rid of it.

That's the advice when deciding which clothes in your closet to keep and which to give away. Charity is not cleaning out your closet to find the more-than-twelve-months-since-you've-worn-it clothes to give away. Charity is not collecting stuff, then donating the 'stuff' to an organization which collects stuff to give away to the poor and vulnerable, the hungry and the needy. Charity extends far beyond benevolent giving.

At the heart of charity are relationships; our most important relationship is the one we have with God. Therefore, charity is to love God with all our heart, soul and mind, and as it naturally follows, to love our neighbor as ourself.

Living in relationship with God naturally leads one to "live by the rules" — especially the rule of charity. Living by the rules period is not the point; the intent is to love God by building His kingdom of heaven here on earth (charity). God's rules provide the necessary guidance.

In the parable of the rich young ruler (Mk 10:17-30), a man asks what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus's first response is to follow the commandments — God's rules providing the guidance necessary for living. Living in relationship with God must be total, complete, and must evolve to living in a loving relationship with God. This man's possessions were preventing him from achieving a total and complete relationship with God they were an obstacle. How often is our contribution to our relationship with God nothing more than the clothes we choose to discard after they've hung unworn for the past 12 months? Charity is more than giving away the stuff we no longer need. Charity is the love which brings us to God.

- The **Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary** is Monday, August 15. This is not a Holy Day of Obligation, but there will be adoration at 6:00 pm and Mass at 7:00 pm in the church. Anointing of the sick will take place at Mass. There will not be a 12:05 pm communion service this day.
- **Registration for Faith Formation Preschool - High School begins on Saturday, August 13.** This includes preparation for the Sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation. First Communion requires two years of preparation with the children receiving the sacrament in the second year. Typically children start preparation in the first grade. Confirmation candidates must be in the 9th grade or older.
- If you brought food for the funerals we have had this summer, please check the cart in the parish center to claim your dish.
- If you borrowed the **white folding chairs** from the old hall, or know who did, please return them.
- St. Francis is proud to be included in the **Quilt Barn Trail for Washington County**.
