FROM THE DESK OF MSGR. LANE

I'm happy to be in Chillicothe and to serve the community of Our Lady, Queen of the Apostles. The three communities that comprise the new consolidated parish have always been strong and faithful elements of the Church in the Diocese of Columbus, and I'm sure you will continue to be. For the last almost 200 years, the Catholic community, from the Jesuit founding of St. Francis Xavier Church to the present Our Lady, Queen of the Apostles Parish, has grown and flourished through all of the growth pains of the local area and of the country. I'm sure that same resilience and deep faith will propel us forward into another era of experience of the Faith and its entanglement with everyday life. I appreciate the opportunity to be part of this adventure.

There are some changes in the works that concern daily operations in the parish. Working with the parish council, we will have a new daily Mass schedule beginning in mid-August when we can include them on the cover of the bulletin. Basically, there will be two daily Masses each day, five days a week – 8:30am at St. Mary Chillicothe and 6pm at St. Peter Chillicothe four days a week. On Wednesdays, the 6pm Mass will be in Waverly, so Waverly will retain the Wednesday evening Mass. Confessions and Adoration schedules will be adjusted accordingly. All of this will be published in the bulletin a few weeks before the changes take place.

We've had some serious maintenance problems at all the churches, the most dramatic being at St. Peter. The spire on the church has been needing repair for quite a few years. A few weeks ago, we had a very serious storm and water flowed into the choir loft. The organ pipes may well be seriously damaged, and the plaster certainly is as well. We have had three estimates on repairing the spire. They ranged from \$500,000 to \$700,000. Those quotes seemed far beyond the realm of the possible for us within the narrow window of time given to make the repairs. It would cost \$5,000 to remove the spire. The choice seemed fairly clear. If we take the spire down, we can store it and have as much time as we want to decide what to do next. Put the spire back, put part of the spire back, or find an alternative. This has to be done soon to prevent even more damage to the interior of the church. You'll be informed of the other issues at the three churches as we begin to address them. The St. Peter situation is the most critical right now.

There are many activities planned for late summer and fall. They begin with a parish picnic on August 17 at Flaget to an Oktoberfest at Waverly on September 28 to a Hog Roast held at St. Mary Chillicothe on All Saints Day, November 1.

We have many opportunities ahead of us this year. I'm very sure that with commitment to the faith, care for each other, and for our community, it will be a great adventure with much good for everyone along the way. I wish you all many blessings in the months to come, and may we experience a kind of peace that seems to elude the rest of the world!

True Vine Outreach Center (TVOC) by Bridget Rourke

<u>The mission</u> of the TVOC "is to remain steadfastly connected to Jesus Christ, the True Vine, enabling our community to bear abundant fruit through acts of love, service, and spiritual growth." (ref John 15:1-8) The mission of the Emergency Financial Assistance and Sack Lunch Ministries "is to be the hands and feet of Christ as we provide spiritual support and financial assistance to those in need in Ross County." (ref Matthew 25:35-41).

After opening our doors on January 1, we have finished our first fiscal year, though only 6 months long. We started with \$5K of seed money from the parish, 19 members, and an average of 15 clients per week in January. Though we have suffered the tragic loss of John Venneman—may his soul rest in eternal peace—our ministry has gained 6 new members over the last couple of months, and we are now averaging 25 clients per week. God has truly blessed this ministry and those whom we serve.

- * We provided 471 unique "families" services and spiritual support over 571 visits.
- * The majority of our client families these past six months have been single adults. Alvis House and local Recovery Centers have made use of our services to help get their clients vouchers for shoes, clothes, and birth certificates. This category also includes many of the homeless. Many of the single adults that we see have no income, as they are between jobs or just not currently capable of successfully maintaining employment.
- * Families with children account for 37% of our families, and 37% of our overall visits this past term. The families with children generally received a higher level of monetary support, as the parents/guardians are seeking help with utility bills, rent, and groceries.
- * Parish support with the use of the office building at St. Mary Chillicothe, the copy machine, and phone system have allowed us to keep our administrative overhead to an absolute minimum. We are very blessed with this support.
- * From everyone on the team, much thanks to all of you who support this ministry with financial gifts and with your prayers. Please continue to pray for all of our members that we can maintain our health, empathy, and discernment and be able to reflect the joy of living out our faith to those who come to us. Please also pray for those whom we serve, that they can overcome their difficult circumstances and come to better know Jesus. Our current hours of operation are Thursdays 9:30-11:00am. If you would like to make a donation to this ministry, checks can be made out to True Vine Outreach, and mailed to the parish office or dropped into the offertory basket at Mass.

How Should We Educate the Children of God?

The best way to witness the joy of learning is to watch a seven-year-old chase after dandelions or an eleven-year-old marvel as cream turns into butter. That sense of wonder—natural to children—is what educators must strive to preserve and nurture. True education fosters a love for all that is true, good, and beautiful, preparing children not only for temporal success, but for eternal life.

What is now called *Catholic liberal education* is the most effective means to this end. Refined by the Church over two millennia, it has formed young minds and souls through an integrated study of history, culture, and the arts, helping them see the world in the light of the Truth. When education turns the mind, body, and soul of a child toward the eternal, a deep and lasting transformation occurs. Learning extends beyond the classroom, embracing families and, by extension, entire communities.

To understand the aim of education, we can return to Plato's allegory of the cave. Those who are chained in darkness must be freed to see the truth of things and, ultimately, the light of the Sun—which represents Truth itself. This image teaches that truth is desirable for its own sake. The educational journey may be uncomfortable at times, but it is undertaken so that we can rightly order ourselves toward the Truth. Even pre-Christian philosophers intuited the universal longing for this Truth. What Plato glimpsed from afar is fully revealed in Jesus Christ, the Truth made flesh. Christ entrusted His Church with the mission of passing on the Faith, evangelizing the nations, and educating the young.

At Bishop Flaget, we strive to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Our awareness of the eternal Logos—the One who created the universe from nothing—should be the wellspring from which every faculty member, administrator, and student draws. A sacramental life, supported by continual spiritual formation, strong leadership, and a loving community, is essential for cultivating this awareness.

Education, however, is not only about intellectual formation. It must cultivate habits of mind and heart that awaken a lifelong pursuit of truth, goodness, and beauty. Observation, attention, contemplation, and reflection are habits that shape the whole person and prepare students to meet life's challenges with grace and resilience. These seeds of discipline and self-awareness mature into lives of virtue, where the desire for truth leads naturally to prudence, justice, fortitude, and temperance.

As the new principal of Bishop Flaget School, I am filled with hope and excitement as we embark on this journey together. It is a profound honor to join a community so deeply committed to forming young minds and hearts in the light of Christ. I am inspired by the rich tradition of education that has taken root here, and I am eager to walk alongside our dedicated faculty, supportive families, and joyful students as we continue to pursue what is true, good, and beautiful. Together, we will cultivate wonder, deepen faith, and form virtuous disciples who are not only prepared for the challenges of the world, but who are also oriented toward the eternal. 

Our New Parish Religious Education Programs

It is the privilege of a lifetime to be stepping into the role of Director of Religious Education for Our Lady, Queen of the Apostles Parish. This is the Catholic community that so wonderfully welcomed me as a child. It is where I fell in love with Eucharistic Adoration and had some of the most transformative moments in my life. Thank you to so many of you who have had such an impact on my life. Words can't express my gratitude for the hours you poured into my life.

It is impossible to be perfect at any job, but I will strive to constantly point to Jesus and say, "We have found the Messiah" (John 1:42). As St. John Paul II once said, "It is Jesus in fact that [we] seek when [we] dream of happiness; he is waiting for [us] when nothing else [we] find satisfies [us]; he is the beauty to which [we] are so attracted..." The person we all need is Jesus Christ, and He alone is the Savior of the world. Let us run towards Jesus in everything we seek to do this year.

*Adult and Young Adult volunteers needed for 1st and 3rd Sundays for High School Youth Group, 6-8pm

*Support parents with teenagers (volunteer once a month and regularly check in with families in the thick of parenting young children)

FAMILY-CENTERED FAITH FORMATION

Parents, do you desire the Sacraments for your children? First and foremost, I want to meet with you. We want to surround you and your child(ren) with support and resources, especially during these crucial years of preparing for these life-changing Sacraments.

Your role in your child's religious formation is irreplaceable. According to sociological studies of 230 in-depth interviews and three nationally-representative surveys, "The single, most powerful causal influence on the religious lives of American teenagers and young adults is the religious lives of their parents. Not their peers, not the media, not their youth group leaders or clergy, not their religious school teachers. Myriad studies show that, beyond a doubt, the parents of American youth play the leading role in shaping the character of their religious and spiritual lives, even well after they leave home and often for the rest of their lives." (Amy Adamczyk and Christian Smith. Handing Down the Faith: How Parents Pass Their Religion on to the Next Generation [New York: Oxford University Press, 2021] 1).

Pathways is a beautiful approach to faith formation that focuses on the family. Children flourish in their relationship with God and character development when open conversations about God become normal family discussions. Similar to talking about your favorite sports teams or family hobbies, Jesus wants to be a regular part of our everyday lives. The Pathways Faith Formation program we will be using for Sacramental Prep this year creates simple opportunities to begin these conversations and build positive family memories around your faith. Pathways is a combination of monthly at-church meetings and at-home family meetings.

I am extremely picky about formation content, and this is one of the most beautifully-crafted, simple, and rich resources I have ever encountered. St. Brendan Parish in Hillard has been using Pathways for 5 years with tremendous success. The diocese as a whole has been encouraging parishes to shift to a family-centered formation model for 3 years. In the past, we have highlighted Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS). CGS will still continue at Bishop Flaget. CGS is wonderful; the only thing it lacks is a fruitful way to involve the family as a whole. This integration of our faith into family life is where Pathways excels.

We are actively seeking out volunteers to support our families who are helping their children prepare for the sacraments.

If you are a parent who has adult children and can support young families in our parish, please contact me to ask about what this ministry looks like. More than ever before, we need to support our families. They are the bedrock of our nation and our world.

This Year's Tanzanian Trip by Deacon Reed Hauser

As you may already know, Bob Lagnese (from Waverly) and I have been traveling to Tanzania for the past 4 summers, each for a couple of weeks, with Fr. Milton (remember him?) We have been working projects at Mrawi Primary School, which is on the outskirts of a city called Moshi.

Folks have been asking about our trip, so here are some highlights. Also on the trip were several parishioners from Fr. Milton's current parish in Grove City, two ladies who knew Fr. Milton during his days up in Canton, and Dr. Eric L. Bachrach ("Dr. Eric"), who works at the VA in Chillicothe. Seminarian Chris Dixon, who was with us in Chillicothe a couple of summers ago, was also in Tanzania.

Part of the group went on a 5-day safari in western Tanzania, while Dr. Eric climbed Mt. Kilimanjaro. Dr. Eric also examined students at the school for ringworm and paid for medicine to treat it. Parishioners here and in Grove City have been very generous in their financial support of the projects which Fr. Milton has managed at the school. Over the past several years, the improvements at the school have included:

- *A playground/soccer field (with new grass) and purchased playground equipment
- *Most of the campus has been paved with concrete (helps keep the classrooms clean)
- *A former storage area was turned into a new principal's office
- *Plumbing, countertops, and lighting in the kitchen
- *New concrete floors, windows, and LED lighting for the classrooms and offices
- *A large social hall is being completed for the students to meet, which will include living space for a student teacher
- *A small addition is being built to hold supplies for school
- *Roofs of the buildings were coated to prevent leaks

This year, we built a basketball court at the school. See below for pictures of the project! The backboards had to be locally welded together. A 10-ft high hoop and backboard and a 6-ft hoop and backboard were bolted and attached to each post. The backboards can be moved if necessary.

The principal of the school told me that no other primary school in the area has a basketball court, and that the closest basketball court was the nearby Catholic university. Below are some images of the completed court, already being used.

To sum it up: it was a fun, successful trip. And most importantly—everyone returned safely!















Why Latin, Gregorian Chant, and Polyphony Still Belong in the Mass

Why does our parish still use Latin, Gregorian chant, and polyphony in the Mass? These are not merely artistic choices—they reflect the deep and lasting guidance of the Church on the sacred nature of music in the liturgy.

The Second Vatican Council's document *Sacrosanctum Concilium* teaches us that: "The Church acknowledges Gregorian chant as specially suited to the Roman liturgy: therefore, other things being equal, it should be given pride of place in liturgical services" (SC §116).

Gregorian chant is not just one option among many—it is the Church's own native music. Its melodies are prayerful, simple, and timeless, uniquely capable of helping us enter the mystery of the Eucharist.

Similarly, the Church teaches that Latin is to be preserved in the liturgy: "The use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites" (SC §36.1).

Latin reminds us that the Mass is not something we create each Sunday—it is something we receive from the universal Church. It expresses unity across the world and the centuries.

Sacred polyphony—like the choral works of Palestrina and other Renaissance composers—is another musical treasure promoted by the Church. These works beautifully elevate the sacred texts and draw our hearts upward toward God. As Pope St. Pius X wrote in *Tra le Sollecitudini* (1903): "Sacred music must... possess in the highest degree the qualities proper to the liturgy, especially sanctity and goodness of form."

Gregorian chant and polyphony meet these standards in a unique way. They are music for the liturgy—not performance pieces, but specific prayers integral to the Mass, set to music.

In our parish, we honor these instructions by incorporating Latin, Gregorian chant, and polyphony regularly at Mass. We do this not out of nostalgia, but because the Church continues to hold up this music as an ideal.

This sacred music helps us worship with greater reverence and awe. It lifts our hearts, focuses our attention, and joins our voices to the universal Church—past, present, and future.

As Psalm 96 reminds us: "Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth!" Let us continue to sing with beauty, unity, and faith—always for the glory of God.

What makes music truly "sacred?"

The Church teaches that Sacred Music must possess three essential qualities: sanctity, goodness of form, and universality.

- 1. **Sanctity**: Sacred music must be holy in itself and free from anything secular or profane. It should inspire prayer and reverence. Gregorian chant, for example, was developed solely for use in worship and is inseparably linked with the liturgical texts it serves.
- 2. **Goodness of Form**: This refers to the intrinsic beauty of the music—its craftsmanship, structure, and harmony. Sacred music should be artistically worthy of the divine mysteries it accompanies. It should be solemn and noble, not flashy nor theatrical. The music should never draw attention to itself or to the performer, but lead the listener to God.
- 3. Universality: True Sacred Music transcends culture and time. It is not bound to fleeting styles or trends. Gregorian chant and classical polyphony, for instance, are able to speak to Catholics of all ages and backgrounds because they are rooted in the timeless worship of the Church.

Pope Benedict XVI echoed these teachings when he wrote: "An authentic updating of sacred music can take place only in the lineage of the great tradition of the past, of Gregorian chant and sacred polyphony" (Sacramentum Caritatis* §42).

These qualities help us to discern whether a piece of music is truly fitting for the Mass. Sacred Music is not meant to entertain—it is meant to *sanctify*. It is music that participates in the action of the liturgy itself, giving voice to the Church's prayer.

This is why we continue to prioritize Gregorian chant, Latin, and sacred polyphony in our parish liturgies. These forms fulfill the Church's vision for Sacred Music and help us all to pray more deeply, to sing with greater unity, and to worship God with the reverence He deserves.
