I am filled with joy and gratitude this weekend! I was ordained as a deacon hours ago at the Cathedral and have the privilege of serving you, our larger civic community and the local church of the Archdiocese of Dubuque through ordained ministry.

I know many of you, but not *all* of you. This is, after all, the largest Catholic Christian faith community in the archdiocese. Going to a different Mass time can almost feel like attending a new parish because of our great size. For those of you who already know me and my amazing wife Sadie, there is no shame in skipping the next two paragraphs. Go ahead...no one will ever know...

I first came to Resurrection 17 years ago while attending St. Ambrose University as part of a visit to my then girlfriend's hometown. Spoiler alert: that girlfriend was Sadie. We became parishioners in 2007 and were married here in 2008. We have three children, Stella (8), David (5) and Jonah (3).

I grew up about 2 ½ hours south of Dubuque in Monmouth, IL. I quickly became a fan of Dubuque and just as quickly recognized that there was something special about the Church of the Resurrection. Sadie and I would make frequent trips back to Dubuque and Res throughout college to visit her immediate and extended family. Her parents, Karen and Merle Meyer, are long-time parishioners. Her aunt and uncle, Amy Gilligan and Michael Shubatt, are as well.

I suspect most of us would say that we are not the same person that we were 17 years ago. Perhaps it depends on one's stage of life but that is certainly true for me. When I was in my early 20's, I couldn't say with confidence that I had a relationship with Jesus. My Catholic faith was something like a hobby but it wasn't one of the primary ways in which I would have described myself. That's where I was on my spiritual journey.

There are certain past moments in my walk with Jesus that stand out. Moments of encounter that propelled me to new depths of love for him. Perhaps future pastoral opportunities will permit me to share some of these "God moments" of mine and, more importantly, learn about yours. There have also been countless moments in which you, as a vibrant community of disciples, have witnessed your faith and inspired mine. For this witness, I am grateful. For your support and generosity, I am grateful.

Know that I want to serve you and journey with you. During a particularly difficult time in my diaconal discernment, I frequently reflected on what it means to follow the Lord's command to pick up one's cross and carry it. Among other important themes, I felt Jesus remind me in prayer that our crosses are not only made up of our own burdens but also those of others. My cross is to include your concerns and struggles. We are to be like Simon of Cyrene (bearing each other's burdens) and Veronica (offering moments of quiet compassion during life's storms) for one another. I bring with me the experiences of losing a parent as a child, being angry at God during most of my teenage years and losing two children through miscarriage. Fortunately for us, the Christian experience includes the joy and hope of the Resurrection! So, I also wish to share your delights and celebrations. I bring with me the joys of being a husband and father and knowing the love of God as his beloved child. I am here to journey with you and am thankful for the example set by you, my family, friends, and our past and present deacons and priests.

Thank you for praying for Sadie, our children and me as we begin this new journey as a young family. Know that we are praying for you and your loved ones.

FRAUDULENT EMAILS

The archdiocese has received reports of fraudulent emails that appear to be coming from pastors. These emails are part of an international scheme that has emerged over the past few years in which parishioners are tricked into believing that their pastor is requesting money or gift cards for various needs through a series of messages.

Again, these are fraudulent emails. Official priest email addresses end in @dbqarch.org. These emails come from different addresses, often disguised to look like personal Gmail accounts. The body of these messages are generic and include phrases like "Are you in the office now?" and "How are you? Please contact me."

Neither Fr. Phil nor any of the staff would ask for gift cards, especially not by email, so please ignore these emails if you receive one, it is a scam.

MISSIONARY COOPERATION APPEAL

Next weekend we will host Fr. Chris Aleti, mission office director at the Chicago Comboni Mission Center. The Comboni Missionaries of the Heart of Jesus serve in over thirty countries, caring for the poor and most abandoned people in any area of the world that the "Holy See" may want to entrust to them.

Funds collected during the Missionary Cooperation Appeal go mostly into "small mission projects fund" that sponsors people related projects in Africa and Latin America. Currently, many of these projects are directed to refugee settlement in the Sudan (Darfur included), Uganda and Congo, AIDS prevention and AIDS orphan assistance, training of local missionaries both lay and religious, women's education at secondary level, establishing wells and other sources of safe water for the desert dwellers in Ethiopia, Eritrea and Kenya.



GREEN TEAM

Pope Speaks: DIRECT EFFECTS OF GLOBAL INACTION

To Finance Ministers of many nations gathered at the Vatican, May 27, 2019:

"You are here to help stop a crisis that is leading the world towards disaster....The effects of global inaction are startling.several scientific research centres recorded the **concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere** – one of the key global causes of global warming linked to human activity – **as having reached 415 parts per million, the highest level ever recorded. Around the world, we are seeing heat waves, droughts, forest fires, floods and other extreme meteorological events, rising sea levels, the emergence of diseases and further problems that are only a dire premonition of things much worse to come, unless we act and act urgently.**

- to put an end to global dependency on fossil fuels
- to open a new chapter of clean and safe energy; renewable resources such as wind, sun and water
- to act prudently and responsibly in our economies to actually meet human needs, promote human dignity, help the poor and be set free of the idolatry of money that creates so much suffering.

It is my prayerful hope that, as stewards of the world's finances, you will agree upon a common plan that accords with climate science, the latest in clean energy engineering, and above all the ethics of human dignity. I ask you to invite your fellow finance ministers around the world to join your efforts and plans. May your work with scientists, technicians and the peoples of your nations, especially the poorest, achieve the Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Climate Agreement."


