**DEAR PARISHIONERS,**

"I have reason to be angry...angry enough to die." Jonah 4:9
(From the daily Mass readings this Wednesday, October 9)

On the website MentalHelp.net, in an article entitled *Anger Management* written by noted psychologist Dr. Harry Mills in June of 2005 he stated the following: "Anger is both a physiological and psychological process. Because of this, anger can have a negative impact on your physical and your emotional health. This is particularly true of the relationship between anger and heart disease."

The evidence from numerous studies is clear: constant chronic anger, hostility, and aggression raise your risk of developing various deadly forms of heart disease by as much as five times the normal rate. The more hostility you tend to express, the more prone to heart disease you are likely to be. If you find that you immediately get angry when you have to wait in traffic or when confronted with a long line at the grocery checkout, or if you find yourself constantly yelling at your loved one, you may be slowly killing yourself.

"I have reason to be angry, Jonah said, angry enough to die."

We have all experienced that emotion of anger in one form or another from mild frustration to out-of-control rage but I honestly can say that I have never felt anger to the extreme of wanting to die. I have to admit that it is unusual but not impossible for me to lose my cool, blown my top and even simmer in cynicism but wanting to die as a result of anger never even crossed my mind.

So, I am not sure whether it was an act of survival or an expression of passive aggressive anger that Jonah displayed when he received his first call from God to go to Nineveh and prophesy. Jonah ran away. He "fled to Tarshish" because he did not want to go to the wicked inhabitants of that city. He would rather have had God destroy that city and all its inhabitants.

In spite of Jonah's anger, God continues to pursue him. Through the violent storm at sea, being cast overboard; being swallowed by a big fish and remaining in its bowels for three days; going through an apparent conversion; and then being spewed forth upon the sea shore, God's call does not relent, but neither does Jonah's anger. All this comes to a point in which God asked the question, "Have you reason to be angry?" God avails himself to listen in order to see if there may be any sound reason for Jonah's irrational anger. God listens and then through the voice of reason cooler heads prevail.

Anger is within each of us as well as all around us. Anger seems to be a very prevalent emotion nowadays, sometimes to the point of being downright scary, to the point of rage and violence. Why?

Perhaps we can gain some insight from Jonah in his anger. Jonah, a Jew, is operating out of a perspective that is narrow and exclusive. According to Jonah, God's favor is only to be shown upon the "chosen ones" his nation, his interests, and his identity. In other words, God's favor should be Jonah's favor. Jonah, for lack of control over God to meet his needs, is frustrated when he does not get what he wants. He is angry, much like a two-year-old who does not receive a cookie or a piece of candy. His anger is not righteous or rational. It is, rather, irreverent and disrespectful to the authority in his life – God, in this case – and to others that surround him.

It is only when God questions him, "Have you reason to be angry?" and then listens to him, and rationalizes with him that Jonah's anger is abated. In an article published in *Psychology Today* entitled *The Primacy of Anger Problems* in January of 2009 Dr. Stephen Diamond states, "In psychotherapy, the single most powerful and healing intervention the clinician can offer is to listen to the angry patient, and to acknowledge and accept his or her rage. Anger and rage have to first be validated, expressed and understood before the underlying affects or cognitions can be effectively addressed."

Are you an angry person? Is anger a constant and chronic part of your everyday life to the point that it has affected your well being and your relationships? Then might I suggest that you not only pray to God but also...go talk to someone, be that a counselor, friend, or physician. If you know of someone – a friend or family member – who is angry...then go to them and listen. Be the presence of God to them and ask if they have reason to be so angry? Help to diffuse that toxic emotion so that they may live.

In his letter to the Ephesians (4:26-27) Paul informs them, "Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun set on your anger, and do not leave room for the devil." Anger is part of our lives but it should not rule our lives. It's okay to be angry but, contrary to Jonah, not angry enough to die.



KEEP AN EYE ON AMAZON SYNOD AT THE VATICAN

Over 180 bishops of South America and other countries began meeting last Sunday, Oct. 6, at the Vatican for the Synod of Bishops to discuss environmental problems of territory and inhabitants in the Amazon region. Lasting until Oct. 27, Pope Francis convened the synod meeting to discuss environmental and religious issues in the Amazon and give special attention to the needs of indigenous communities there.

- At the opening session, Pope Francis said that the synod's way is to "bring us close to consider the Amazon reality with this pastoral heart, with the eyes of disciples and missionaries."
- Francis requested that synod member's move "close to the Amazonian peoples on the tip of our toes, respecting their history, their cultures, and their style of good living [but] not in the social sense which oftentimes damages them."
